Superior court rules Bill 40 abolishing **English boards unconstitutional**

Although it took a long time, the decision rendered Wednesday by Quebec Superior Court Justice Sylvain Lussier was worth the wait.

It recognized that Bill 40 infringes the anglophone community's Section 23 rights and nullified parts of the law. It's a legal victory for Englishspeaking Quebecers, local democracy and the autonomy of schools.

"(Bill 40) does not allow the anglophone minority of Quebec to fully exercise its rights," Lussier wrote. "The linguistic minority transcends the restrained group of individuals whose children are registered in school. The transmission of the culture is at stake with the scholastic project, which is not limited to classrooms. The community recognize itself in its must representatives. At first glance, you could

mistakenly believe you are somewhere in South Korea.

But these firefighters are in Lebel-sur-Quévillon, a small city in the north of Quebec that's been evacuated twice already this summer due to the threat of wildfires.

Now that it is again time to go back to school, the same age-old questions about quality, efficiency and relevance of education will be interesting topics. However, it appears that It is quite more interesting to underscore the significance of the Superior Court's ruling stating that some provisions of Bill 40 violate the rights of which are minorities clearly unconstitutional. The Liberals have stated: "... that future changes to English school governance be subject to a political and institutional consensus, and are urging the CAQ to act on issues directly affecting school success: high dropout rates, hordes of students failing written French exams, presence of more than 30,000 legally unqualified teachers, and the rising number of dilapidated schools" instead of appealing the decision.

Bill 40 adopted at the National Assembly in the early hours of February 8, 2020 converted French school boards into school service centres, resulting in the abolition of Councils of Commissioners, replaced with board of directors. The QESBA was awarded a stay of legislation, therefore making Bill 40 inapplicable to the nine English school boards until the case was heard on its merits. 

Court's extensive 125-page judgment has found that many provisions of Bill 40 are unconstitutional and infringe upon section 23 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, safeguarding minority language education rights.

Many writers applaud Superior Court Justice Lussier's decision and hope the government will not waste any more time and money to make any appeal. They have noted that abolishing school boards will only put more power in the hands of the Minister of Education but not improve the educational system nor tackle the problems that must be solved such as teacher shortage, the disconnect between the needs and the services provided to learning disabled students. Abolishing school boards that have managed to provide educational services faithfully for the past 175 years does not solve the real problems in the efficient delivery of educational services to the most vulnerable and the development of the full potential of every individual.

Indeed, it would be better to have government leaders adopt policies that would promote peace and harmony in a democratic society rather than weaken the minority communities' rights to run their own educational institutions.#



America's richest 10% are responsible for 40% of its planet-heating pollution, new report finds

America's wealthiest people are also some of the world's biggest polluters – not only because of their massive homes and private jets, but because of the fossil fuels generated by the companies they invest their money in.

A new study published Thursday in the journal PLOS Climate found the wealthiest 10% of Americans are responsible for almost half of planet-heating pollution in the US, and called on governments to shift away from "regressive" taxes on the carbonintensity of what people buy and focus on taxing climate-polluting investments instead.

"Global warming can be this huge, overwhelming, nebulous thing happening in the world and you feel like you've got no agency over it. You kind of know that you're contributing to it in some way, but it's really not clear or quantifiable," said Jared Starr, a sustainability scientist at the University of Massachusetts Amherst and a report author.

This study helps build a clearer picture of individual responsibility by going beyond what people consume, he told CNN.

To do this, the researchers analyzed huge datasets spanning 30 years to connect financial transactions to carbon pollution.

They looked at the planetheating pollution produced by companies' direct operations, as well as those relating to companies' climate impacts further down the supply chain – for example, the bulk of an oil company's emissions comes when its customers burn the oil it extracts.

That gave a carbon footprint for each dollar of economic activity in the US, which the researchers linked to households using population survey data that showed the industries people work for and their income from wages and investments.

They found the wealthiest 10% in the US, households making more than about \$178,000, were responsible for 40% of the nation's human-caused, planet-heating pollution. The income of

the top 1% alone – households making more than \$550,000 – was linked to 15% to 17% of this pollution.

The report also identified "super-emitters." They are almost exclusively among the wealthiest top 0.1% of Americans, concentrated in industries such as finance, insurance and mining, and produce around 3,000 tons of carbon pollution a year. To put that in perspective, it's estimated people should limit their carbon footprint to around 2.3 tons a year to tackle climate change.

"Fifteen days of income for a top 0.1% household generates as much carbon pollution as a lifetime of income for a household in the bottom 10%," Starr said.

Climate impact is not just about the size of the people's income but the industries that generate it. A household making \$980,000 from certain fossil fuel industries, for example, would be considered a super-emitter, according to the report. But a household making money from the hospital industry would need to bring in \$11 million to produce the same amount of planet-heating pollution.

The report's authors call on policymakers to rethink how they use taxes to tackle the climate crisis.

Carbon taxes that focus on what people buy – the food we eat, the cars we drive, the clothes we buy – "disproportionately punish the poor while having little impact on the extremely wealthy," said Starr. They also miss the chunk of wealth rich people spend on investments rather than buying things.

Governments instead should focus on taxes that target shareholders and carbon-intensive investments, the report said. Although it will be "a hard political ask," Starr acknowledged, especially as the wealthiest tend to have disproportionate political power.

Many ideas for taxing carbon have been floated around the world including windfall taxes on fossil fuel companies and wealth taxes, but few have been politically viable.



MP Rechie Valdez becomes Minister of Small Business in the latest Cabinet shuffle by Prime Minister Justin Trudeau



Ontario MP Rechie Valdez is the new minister of small business, taking over a portfolio previously under Minister of International Trade and Export Promotion Mary Ng. The Honourable Rechie Valdez was elected as the Member of Parliament for Mississauga-Streetsville in 2021. She has been a member of various parliamentarv committees and associations, including the Standing Committee on Veterans Affairs and the Parliamentary Canadian NATO Association, as well as the Chair of the Parliamentarv Canada-Philippines Friendship Group.

Minister Valdez is a Canadian entrepreneur, television personality, and community advocate. She is the first Filipino-Canadian woman elected as a Member of Parliament and appointed to Cabinet, and is committed to ensuring the diverse voices of her community are heard.

Before entering politics, Minister Valdez owned and operated a small business, and dedicated herself to growing her online business avenues. The judgment only pertains to Bill 40. But it nevertheless offers many pearls of wisdom that speak to the broader context in which minority rights are under attack in Quebec.

Whether it's Bill 21, banning civil servants in positions of authority like teachers and police officers from wearing religious garb, or Bill 96, turning English-speaking Quebecers into second-class citizens, the CAQ unapologetically governs by majority rule. And in shielding the discrimination resulting from both laws pre-emptively using the by notwithstanding clause, it has demonstrated that it just doesn't care about the collateral damage.

But the decision makes it clear that this kind of attitude just isn't acceptable in a free and democratic society where the rule of law prevails. The judge calls out the government for willfully ignoring minority rights, all while pretending to listen.

"Governments are obligated, not only to find out what the needs and concerns of the linguistic community are, but to take them into account in the measures it adopts," Lussier wrote. "In acting without finding out what these needs are, and without taking them into account once informed, the government risks seeing its measures invalidated."

This requires much more than consultation, he added. And it certainly extends beyond the disingenuous dialogue that has become a pattern under the Legault government when it comes to all manner of policies and legislation.

"It's not sufficient, for the representatives of the anglophone community were heard out of politeness. A real consultation comes with obligations," Lussier noted about Bill 40. "The court concludes from the evidence that the government did not respect the rules of meaningful consultation. It did not make efforts to retain the concerns of the anglophone community. It didn't provide crucial

information in a useful amount of time to allow representatives to know the intentions of the government and to react. It did not collect information allowing it to understand the needs of the minority."

The judge also expounds on the delicate balance between individual and minority rights and collective ones, which Legault often uses to justify various draconian measures:

"Minorities don't have a veto, of course, but they do have an expectation of having their rights respected. And the majority must have a reasonable justification for overriding the concerns of the minority."

Lussier also sagely points out that no matter how laudable it is to preserve the French language and identity in the English sea of North America, it's not a licence to run roughshod over the interests of others.

"That the protection of French remains a legitimate and urgent concern in Quebec doesn't factor into the present file," he said. "It is not sufficient to justify the measure through an otherwise legitimate legislative objective for the majority. It must be justified for the minority.

Observers worry about impact of Métro Média closure on local democracy

The abrupt closure of Quebec newspaper publisher Métro Média will end news coverage of local government in parts of the province's two largest cities, media observers say.

Andrew Mulé, Métro Média's president and CEO, announced the immediate suspension of operations at the company's more than 30 hyperlocal publications — including 17 print newspapers — in a statement sent to employees, colleagues and contributors late Friday afternoon.

He said he was informed Wednesday that the company no longer had the liquidity to continue, despite what he described as a "healthy balance sheet."

"Time was my worst enemy and what I

feared has unfortunately arrived, in an abrupt and sudden manner," he wrote.

Jean-Hugues Roy, a journalism professor at the Université du Québec à Montréal, said the end of the company's operations was a tragedy, even if it was expected.

"It's an atomic bomb for local news in Montreal and Quebec City," he said in an interview. "It's a piece of journalistic history, but also the history of certain neighbourhoods that's disappearing."

One of the company's papers, Métro Verdun (formerly Le Messager de Verdun), celebrated its 110th anniversary this year, he said.

"These are communities that counted on their newspapers as sources of information."

His colleague Patrick White, who also teaches journalism at UQAM, said the closure will create "news deserts" in Quebec's two largest cities.

Trudeau overhauls his cabinet, drops 7 ministers and shuffles most portfolios

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau today dropped seven ministers and changed nearly three-quarters of his cabinet, overhauling his team at a time of heightened tensions overseas and scandals at home.

Trudeau unveiled a new cabinet team meant to have a renewed focus on economic priorities, such as housing, during a ceremony at Rideau Hall Wednesday morning. The shuffle promotes seven new faces and tasks more than a dozen ministers with new roles, including a new minister of defence and public safety.

Reporters asked the prime minister repeatedly whether the shakeup amounts to an admission that his nearly eight-year-old government is slumping.

"It's very, very bad news for local democracy," he said in a phone interview. "It's the end of hyperlocal coverage in Montreal and Quebec City. There's going to be no coverage of borough councils."

Montreal and Quebec City's boroughs are responsible for a wide range of municipal services, including urban planning, waste collection and maintenance of local roads and parks.

A large Quebec media union, Fédération nationale the des communications et de la culture, is calling for government action to preserve local news on Montreal Island.

Union president Annick Charette said the labour organization worked with Métro Média's owners and met with investors and the city of Montreal to try to find solutions.

"I hope that this closure will only be temporary," she said.

Métro Média was created in 2018 when Montreal businessman Michael Raffoul acquired 30 publications, including the daily free newspaper Métro and 29 weekly community papers, from printer Transcontinental Inc. Several


Amid those global challenges, Toronto-area MP Bill Blair takes over the defence portfolio from Anita Anand, who becomes president of the Treasury Board.

Blair, a former police chief who was most recently the minister of emergency preparedness, becomes the country's point person at NATO and will be responsible for Canada's response to the war in Ukraine.

The Canadian Armed Forces is also reeling from a sexual misconduct scandal; Blair is now responsible for overseeing the military's attempt to change its culture.

New Brunswick's Dominic LeBlanc will now lead public safety, an often-challenging portfolio that includes the Canadian Security Intelligence Service and the RCMP. He also takes on the democratic institutions file and will continue to serve as intergovernmental affairs minister.

LeBlanc, who represents Beauséjour, will play a key role in determining how the government responds to allegations that China interfered in the past two federal elections, and to the damning report on the Mounties' handling of the 2020 mass shooting in Nova Scotia. He'll also have to stickhandle negotiations



predecessor, His Marco Mendicino, was dropped from cabinet. His demotion ends a tenure at the cabinet table plagued by multiple controversies, including the government's poorly received gun control legislation and lingering questions on the foreign interference file.

More recently, Mendicino was under intense pressure due to the controversy over the transfer of serial killer Paul Bernardo to a mediumsecurity prison.

Along with the new names heading up security and intelligencerelated portfolios, the Prime Minister's Office announced Wednesday it will follow the example of its Five Eye allies and set up a cabinet committee on national security and intelligence. The lack of one has been cited by the national security community as an oversight in light of recent controversies.

A PMO spokesperson called the new National Security Council a "forum for ministers to deliberate on and address issues of pressing concern to Canada's domestic and international security."

Mulé said the company "couldn't suffer a sudden, devastating revenue loss and follow our ambitious and costly digital road map without external financial assistance."

"We are, after all, a small business without financing, and the premature end of our print media made it so that we had no means to rapidly finance our future without a major investment."

Montreal Mayor Valérie Plante issued a post on X (formerly Twitter) saying the closure was a major loss, but she didn't respond to Mulé's criticisms that her decision to limit the distribution of flyers led to the closure.

'The radical transformation of the media's business environment requires urgent consideration and collective solutions," she wrote.

Mulé responded to her post saying that "the beauty of communicating on social media is total control of the message when you publish it, without the need for independent fact-checking. Good luck with that, Montreal."#

From Page 1 Quebec forest fires News over 3,700 foreign firefighters have travelled to Canada to help battle the historic forest fires this summer including 140 South Koreans, the first-ever team sent from there to help battle the blazes.

The South Korean foreign ministry told CBC News their team was selected after a competitive process, and those who made the cut are the best of the best. The team includes former spies sent to infiltrate North Korea, special army forces and Navy SEALS.

They've been camping next to a golf course in the small town that's about 625 kilometres northwest of Montreal, with a population of 2,000 people.

They've spent their days here since the beginning of July, waking up around 5 a.m., travelling an hour or two on yellow school buses to the fires, then coming back to the campsite, exhausted and covered in bug bites.

One of their tasks is digging up the earth still smoldering below ground, and extinguishing it. It's a kind of firefighting none of them are used to.

"None of us believed it at first. But putting out fires here, we saw how the fires are burning through the roots of the trees," said Jang Puruensol, a 28-year-old firefighter from Gwangju, in the country's southwest, who left behind his fiance to fight fires in Quebec.

"We're used to going several kilometres, putting out fires as we go," he continued in Korean.

When the team got to Quebec, Jang says Quebec's forest fire prevention agency told them they would only be able to advance around 600 metres in a day. Working together

Canadian wildfires are burning at an unprecedented pace this year. There were 1,004 fires across Canada as of Friday, according to the CIFFC, burning 12.3 million hectares – a total area larger than South Korea, itself.

Kim Dae Hyun, 36, is getting married next month. He says his fiance has been worrying about him. He, too, worries about loved ones back home, as heavy torrential rains have claimed dozens of lives there.

"The situation in Korea right now is quite bad, and on that point I want to go back and help, too, but I also know that it's important for me to be here and help out," said Kim.

Wildfires likely to get worse


It's possible Canada will need their help again. Scientists say wildfire seasons are likely to get more intense in the future.

Quebec Liberals urge government to drop any plans to appeal Bill 40 ruling

QUEBEC — There is more pressure – this time from the Quebec Liberals - for the Legault government to forget about appealing a Superior Court decision declaring sections of Bill 40 on school boards unconstitutional.

In a letter to Education Minister Bernard Drainville and Justice Minister Simon Jolin-Barrette, three Liberal MNAs urge the government to not launch an appeal of the ruling issued last week by Superior Court Judge Sylvain Lussier.

They also urge the government to set aside legal procedures and focus on more concrete education issues, such as lowering the dropout rate, improving the quality of education, finding qualified teachers and improving the quality of school infrastructure.

"While respecting the ruling rendered and in the interest of not compromising the constitutional rights that English-speaking Quebecers and francophones outside Quebec benefit from equally, we ask you to not appeal the judgment," the letter states.

"And any future changes affecting governance of the Englishlanguage school network should be the subject of a large political and institutional consensus."

The letter is signed by education critic Marwah Rizqy, justice critic André Morin and Gregory Kelley, the Liberals' spokesperson for relations with English-speaking Quebecers.

In addition to Drainville and Jolin-Barrette, a copy of the letter was sent to Eric Girard, the Coalition Avenir Québec minister responsible for relations with English-speaking Quebecers.

The letter follows a similar request by Conservative Party of Quebec Leader Éric Duhaime, who argued any appeal of the ruling would be a waste of money and time, and would exacerbate the government's already poor relations with the anglophone community.

In a 125-page judgment, Lussier invalidated many clauses of Bill 40, which was adopted in 2020 by the Legault government, but whose application for English school boards had been suspended pending a decision on its merits.

In his decision, Lussier said: articles covered by this action infringe upon the rights of Article 23 and that these infringements are not justified."

Article 23 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms grants parents belonging to a province's linguistic minority the right to education in their language anywhere in Canada.

Lussier wrote that "it is not only parents with children enrolled in English schools who enjoy the rights, but also

those who have the right to enrol their children there, or who have had their school-age children enrolled there, or had the right to do so."

In other words, Lussier ruled that Quebec erred in trying to limit the rights related to education only to parents whose children attend English school. These rights, he said, extend to the entire English-speaking community.

The Liberals say in their letter that Bill 40 was flawed from the get-go, which is why they voted against it. Instead of putting the emphasis on student success, they write, the government chose through the bill to focus on governance.

"Bill 40 did not attack the shortage of labour which compromises the delivering of services which students are entitled to and which, ultimately, make the difference between success and failure," they write.

"The changes imposed in the functioning of anglophone school boards included in this law have the direct effect of reducing and limiting the right to control and exclusively manage education institutions by the Englishspeaking minority, a view which was clearly expressed even before it was adopted."

The letter urges the government to take "concrete action" to ensure the educational success of students, and says it's clear Bill 40 failed in that regard. The proof, the Liberals argue, is that in June the government tabled another piece of legislation, Bill 23, which corrects the shortcomings of Bill 40.

The English-speaking community has also criticized Bill 23 because it means an even greater loss of autonomy for anglophone boards.

The government has yet to decide whether it will appeal the ruling on Bill 40.

"The analysis of the ruling is continuing," said an official in Jolin-Barrette's office. "The government will make known its intentions in due time. We will not comment further for the moment."#

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Quebec teachers' unions call for better working conditions to address staff shortages

Teachers' workloads have become unsustainable, unions sav

Unions representing Quebec teachers are calling on the provincial government to address staff shortages by improving working conditions, after a recent report indicated as many as 5,000 positions were vacant ahead of the start to the school year.

Labour leaders held a joint news conference on Monday morning to issue what they characterized as an urgent plea for the government to better support school employees, including teachers, administrators, psychologists, speech therapists and other professionals.

The appeal came as teachers' unions renegotiate a collective agreement with Quebec that expired at the end of March.

Josée Scalabrini, president of the Fédération des syndicats de l'enseignement, an association of 34 Quebec teachers' unions, told reporters that classrooms have become unmanageable due to chronic neglect by successive governments over the past two decades.

"We've been saying for a long time that the composition of classes in Quebec no longer makes any sense," she said, pointing in part to a lack of resources to manage the number of students who have learning difficulties.

Teachers' workloads have become unsustainable as a result, she explained, calling on Quebec to "lighten the load before we let go."

Scalabrini insisted that negotiations should focus on classroom conditions to encourage teachers to stay in the profession and help them "rediscover" their calling — a passion she said has been "uprooted" by government inaction.

Monday's news conference followed findings from an organization representing Quebec school administrators — the Fédération des québécoise directions that suggested as many as 5,000 fulland part-time teaching positions were still vacant in the province ahead of the start of the school year next week. 1 adult per class, says minister

Quebec Education Minister Bernard Drainville has reportedly

conceded that it will not be possible to find enough fully qualified teachers by then. The minimum goal, he has told reporters, is to instead have one adult per class.

But tapping unqualified individuals to lead classrooms could just make the situation worse by further straining existing teachers, according to Steven Le Sueur, president of the Quebec Professional Association of Teachers, a union with more than 8,000 members.

"It's definitely not a good idea," Le Sueur said in a phone interview. "When we get somebody that doesn't know what they're doing," he said, "we have a bigger burden on the other teachers in the schools that are going to step up and help that person.

"It's just a heavy burden, all around."

Sueur agreed the

government needs to improve working conditions to address the root cause of the staff shortage in schools. He, like Scalabrini, pointed to a "lack of support for our special needs and atrisk kids."

The result, he suggested, has been a vicious cycle that has gutted the labour force and discouraged students from entering education programs.

"We're in crisis," Le Sueur said. Teaching, he added, is "just becoming less and less attractive.#





With Quebec short more than 5,000 teachers, education minister hoping for 'one adult' per class

Quebec Education Minister Bernard Drainville says there will be "a lot of unqualified teachers this year" due to a severe shortage of educators across the province.

Accordina to survey а by conducted the Fédération québécoise des directions d'établissement d'enseignement (FQDE), 5,000 full-time and part-time teaching positions have yet to be filled about three times as many as last vear.

The number doesn't include positions in schools on the island of Montreal.

With the start of the school year fast approaching, some 1,440 special education technicians, 1,608 daycare educators and 912 speech therapists and other types of special educators are also missing from the education system.

"Of course, there will be unfilled positions," said Drainville during a news scrum Wednesday in Quebec City.

He said he's hoping for at least one adult in each classroom at the start of the school year.

"The first priority is to have a legally gualified teacher in the class. that's No. 1. If we are not able to have a legally qualified teacher, then we have to accept an unqualified teacher ... and in certain cases ... we hope to have one adult," he said.

He said the adult would ideally have a bachelor's degree, but it's not a requirement.

As of Friday, Montreal's main French school service centre, the Centre de services scolaire de Montréal (CSSDM), said 500 full-time and part-time positions were vacant.

'You can't just wing being a teacher'"

FQDE president Nicolas Prévost says the situation heading into the new school year is far from ideal for students.

"Is it normal to see people without a bachelor's degree teaching in schools? We can't accept that. Our students are entitled to optimal service by having qualified people in their classrooms," he told Radio-Canada in an interview.

"You can't just wing being a teacher, so ... this will certainly have long-term repercussions. It's a worrisome start to the school year."

Josée Scalabrini, president of the Fédération des syndicats de l'enseignement (FSE-CSQ), says she's not at all surprised by the extent of the teacher shortage.

"We've been saying for years that the teaching profession has been



Education Minister Bernard Drainville undervalued, ... and that we need to negotiate quickly and intelligently to send a positive message to teachers who want to leave the profession, but that hasn't been done. Now we've hit a wall," she said.

Quebec's new education minister unveils plan to improve French in schools, fast-track teacher training

Quebec education minister skewered for suggesting teachers don't deserve same pay hike as MNAs Scalabrini, whose federation

represents some 87,000 teachers in school service centres and school boards, says it's imperative that the province works to revalorize the profession to encourage those in the system to stay in the field.

"We want to improve working conditions, and that means class composition, lessening duties and, inevitably, upping compensation, which ultimately also has an influence on all that," she said.

Scalabrini says 25 per cent of young teachers leave the profession within the first five years, and, in recent years, even more experienced teachers have been leaving at higher rates.

She's calling on the government to "seize this opportunity" to respond to teachers' demands by entering into "real negotiations ... with the aim of improving their working conditions."

Drainville's office did not respond to Radio-Canada's request for comment.

In January 2022, the Quebec government said it wanted to recruit and train 8,000 teachers over the next five years to counter the labour shortage in education - an objective it intends to achieve, in part, by calling on retirees.

government The had promised a lump sum payment of \$12,000 in May to teaching staff eligible for retirement if they volunteered to remain on the job full time or return to classroom.

A survey conducted by Radio-Canada in July, however, showed that fewer than 100 people had accepted the offer to date.#





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

Directions Cut thickest portion of salmon loin into a rectangle 8 inches long and 3 inches wide; trim and remove thin section of flesh. You will have a 14ounce piece of salmon left; reserve trimmed salmon for another use.

Bring a medium pot of water to a boil. Stir in 1 tablespoon salt. Prepare a large bowl of ice water. Add cabbage leaves to boiling water, pressing to submerge. Cook until wilted and pliable, about 2 1/2 minutes. Transfer leaves to ice water to cool. When leaves have cooled, transfer to a baking sheet covered with a few layers of paper towels to drain, shaking off excess water. Remove 2 to 3 inches of the thick stalks on bottom of each leaf by cutting on either side to remove. Pat cabbage dry.

Place a large sheet of plastic wrap on a work surface. Arrange cabbage on plastic, forming an 8- x 8inch square completely covered with an even layer of cabbage. Using an offset spatula or spoon, spread shrimp mousse evenly on top of cabbage to a thickness of 3/4 inch. Place salmon in center. Use kitchen scissors if needed to trim cabbage to match the length of the salmon. Roll cabbage around salmon, using plastic wrap overhang as an aid while rolling. Wrap salmon roll in 5 layers of plastic wrap, forming a firm, tight cylinder. Freeze 30 minutes.

Place another large sheet of plastic wrap on a work surface. Place 1 sheet of puff pastry on top. Roll out slightly into a 9-inch square. Lightly brush pastry with egg yolks. Remove plastic wrap from salmon roll and place salmon in center of pastry. Roll the pastry over, pressing seam to seal; trim off any excess pastry and press ends to seal. Roll Wellington tightly in plastic wrap and freeze 30 more minutes. Cover and refrigerate remaining egg yolks.

Preheat oven to 425°F. Unwrap Wellington and place, seam side down, on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Chill in refrigerator 30 minutes.



Yet, it appears that not enough coverage by major media outlets is devoted to climate change stories, with the exception of the recent Maui wildfire that has been cited everyday on TV news and other newspapers for over a week since it happened.

Some important questions we may ask ourselves are: How do we diseeminate important information and encourage people to do their part in fighting climate change? How do we balance factual reporting that will prevent fear-mongering?

Media coverage of climate change has had effects on public opinion on climate change, as it conveys the scientific consensus on climate change that the global temperature has increased in recent decades and that the trend is caused by human-induced emissions of greenhouse gases.

professor of sustainability science at Lund University in Sweden, who was not involved in the report, said the study helps reveal how closely income, especially from investments, is tied to planet-heating pollution. Sometimes when people talk about ways to tackle the climate crisis, they bring up population control, said Mark Paul, a political economist at Rutgers University who was also not involved in the study. But studies like this "shine light on the outsized responsibility that the rich have in generating and perpetuating the climate crisis," he told CNN.

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Bulgaria Ukraine and discuss cooperation to secure Black Sea "grain corridor" after Russia quits deal

Leaders of Ukraine and Bulgaria have discussed their countries' cooperation on the Black Sea to secure a "grain corridor" in the wake of Russia's withdrawal from a crucial deal that has led to growing fears about global food security.

The withdrawal of Russia from the grain deal negotiated by Turkey and the United Nations has had a chilling effect on merchant shipping using the

Some context: Kyiv is in talks with some of the world's biggest insurance companies to cover ships traveling to and from its ports in the Black Sea — a crucial step toward a full resumption of vital grain exports around the globe.

Work on an insurance mechanism follows Russia's withdrawal from the Black Sea Grain Initiative last month, which threatens the safe passage of ships carrying grain to and from Ukrainian ports.

The collapse of the deal brokered by Turkey and the United Nations a year ago - has already pushed up global food prices and

Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelensky met with Bulgaria's Prime Minister Nikolai Denkov to talk about the corridor on the sidelines of Ukraine-Balkans Summit held in Athens, Greece on Monday.

The two leaders "discussed cooperation between the Black Sea states to ensure sustainable security in the Black Sea and the functioning of the "grain corridor" in alternative ways," Zelensky's office said.

Zelensky thanked Denkov for the recent Bulgarian decision to provide defense support to Ukraine, according to the office.

IMF to revise PH growth forecasts

THE International Monetary Fund (IMF) will be revising its growth outlook for the Philippines following the second quarter's steeper-thanexpected slowdown.

"In light of the second-quarter gross domestic product (GDP) estimates and considering the challenging outlook for the global economy, it may prove difficult to reach the 6.0- to 7.0-percent growth target for 2023," IMF Resident Representative Ragnar Gudmundsson told The Manila Times on Wednesday.

The Washington-based multilateral organization, which just last month revised its 2023 and 2024 projections for the country to reflect the first quarter's surprisingly strong results, is now looking to again change its outlook.

"We will be revising them (the growth forecasts) based on the
