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Liberal leadership candidates reveal their policy platforms as election day nears

As Canada has been plagued with urgent economic and political issues, the five confirmed candidates for the Liberal Party leadership have gradually revealed what they would do if elected to the leadership position and what they would do if elected as prime minister.

Frank Baylis

Out of the five candidates, only Frank Baylis has so far responded to the call for a town hall meeting via zoom organized by the United Against Hate Canada headed by Marvin Rotrand, Director General, which was held on February 13. Rotrand has offered all the candidates the same opportunity to speak to an audience that is open to everybody who wants to hear what a candidate has to say. There were several speakers during the zoom meeting who endorsed Frank Baylis as they had worked with him for many years.

The first person to declare an intention to replace Trudeau. Montreal business leader Frank Baylis said his campaign is focused on three pillars: affordability, health care and modernizing government. He would like Canada to have the best health care system in the world.

The former MP suggests boosting the economy by investing in Canadian universities, businesses and incubators decreasing government debt.

Last week, he held a news conference in Ottawa where he presented a three-point government reform plan, which would limit terms for senators and MPs to 10 years, create a second chamber for debate in the House of Commons and redistribute power to MPs rather than party leaders. He has also called for Canada to recognize Palestinian

statehood and to invest in rebuilding efforts in Gaza.

When asked by Marvin Rotrand during the zoom town hall meeting what he would do if he does not win, he replied that he would be ready to do what needs to be done if he would be asked to help the country in areas where he can apply his business management experience See Page 4 Liberal Party leadership

By: Gus Mercado Who's afraid of a Trump dictatorship?



The idea of a "Trump dictatorship" is a significant concern in U.S. political discourse, eliciting various reactions from different groups.

Liberals and progressives, alarmed by Trump's perceived dismissal of democratic norms and civil liberties, fear the erosion of democratic integrity and potential scapegoating of marginalized communities.

Moderates and centrist Republicans share unease over Trump's governance, struggling with party loyalty while valuing democratic principles and the need for unity over divisive politics.

International observers and human rights advocates worry about Trump's impact beyond U.S. borders, concerned about weakened global alliances and threats to democracy. Minority communities, including racial and ethnic minorities, LGBTQ+individuals, and women, feel particularly vulnerable due to Trump's rhetoric, heightening their urgency to protect their rights.

Counterpoints to a Potential Shift to Dictatorship in the U.S.

While concerned Americans are gnashing their teeth in fear of a Trump dictatorship, there are also voices of calm and optimism that are surfacing, some of them from unlikely sources. A brilliant and pragmatic Chinese immigrant, Miss Li Nanxi who was born in Hangzhou and who lived most of her life under an iron-fisted Chinese authoritarian regime, came to the U.S. to study at the University of Southern California and since then has embraced American democracy and way of life. She came up with the following 7 counterpoints to allay our fears of a Trump dictatorship.

She says even if Presidentelect Donald Trump controls the Senate, the House of Representatives and the Supreme Court, the United States will not necessarily fall into dictatorship for the following reasons:

1. Checks and balances. The American political system is based on checks and balances. Even if a president has strong influence, there are other institutions in the Federalized system of government such as the state and local governments, the decentralized judiciaries, and the

national local media that can still restrict his power. About half of the state governments are currently run by Democrat governors including most of the largest states. And at least 50% of the population are Democrats. And the military, whose leaders are sworn to the Constitution and not to political leaders, is politically neutral. A free media, even with new restrictions and attempts to monopolize the industry, can still sway a very fickle electorate. All of these powerful forces combined will make it very difficult for the country to move to a dictatorship form of government.

Public opinion in a democratic system. Public opinion and the reaction of voters are very important. If Trump's policies are proven to be harmful and become widely opposed, the situation may trigger massive protests and opposition movements, which will affect his ability to govern. Collective adverse reaction from governments and the people is powerful and can deter any budding move towards authoritarianism. The very foundation of this great nation lies in the importance and power of the people. This concept has been deeply rooted in the hearts and minds of Americans for more than 200 years and will not change overnight as a result of one election and the resurgence of an aspiring tyrant.

3. Freedom of media and speech. Free media and free speech are the essential pillars of democracy. Powerful media objections and public opposition can effectively restrict the abuse of power. If Trump tries to move towards dictatorship, his administration will face intense pressure from public opinion, supported by negative reactions from the international community which an aspiring tyrant will have difficulty fending off.

electoral system. The US electoral system allows for regular elections, ensuring that citizens will have the opportunity to express their opinions and change leaders every four years, barring a Constitution overhaul which is unlikely. Therefore, even if an administration adopts a more centralized form of governing and becomes unpopular with the volatile electorate, it can be replaced in

the next election.

5. Social movements. The fiber of the American psyche has always been averse to communism and dictatorship. It views America as the beacon of freedom and democracy, Ronald Reagan's "shining city on a hill." Massive social movements and activism among non-governmental organizations have played an important role in American history. The vigilance of civil society can force the government to be more trans-parent and accountable, exposing threats to America's role as the beacon of democracy in the world.

6. Dictatorships rise and fall. Dictatorships inevitably end, sometimes in a bloodless uprising of the people as what happened in the Philippines some decades back, or violently and swiftly as recently witnessed in Syria.

7. International influence. Last but certainly not the least factor that will not make it easy for an aspiring dictator to be successful is the international community which will not favor and will not support a dictatorial government in the United States. As the biggest and most powerful superpower in the world, the United States is far ahead of other nations in the economic, military and technology spheres. The U.S. under a dictatorship regime could cause major global conflicts in our international economic and military alliances and treaties that could have devastating consequences. The international community, whether allies or adversaries would prefer the status quo in the U.S. system of government.

Conclusion: Overall, fears of a Trump dictatorship stem from a complex mix of long standing ideological beliefs and experiences that have been threatened by open declarations from President Donald Trump that he will govern as a dictator on Day 1, as well as the not-too-secret 900-page Project 2025 governing blueprint of the Republican party which points to many tenets of authoritarian rule

Fortunately, there are many

arguments and counterpoints that give assurances that a sudden shift to dictatorial system of government is still far-fetched at this time. Nonetheless, freedom-loving individuals communities must unite to confront these challenges proactively and as quickly as possible. It becomes increasingly imperative to foster active dialogue and cooperation among Americans of all ages, concerned communities of nations, state and local governments and groups, NGOs and the powerful free media to uphold the democratic values that have defined American society for almost 250 years.

A view of the Canadian economy in 2025

With all the headline news almost everyday about Donald Trump's tariff threats and his rhetoric about making Canada the 51st state, it maybe a worthwhile exercise to learn about the Canadian economy and how it stands with the rest of the world. Perhaps, this will allay some of our fears that we are not about to lose our sovereignty and that we will still be able to cope with all the challenges that come our way.

According to the World Bank data, Canada is one of the biggest economies in the world. In fact, it is in the 9th position among the advanced economies (see Global Outlook projections chart) but it is highly dependent on international trade with exports and imports of goods and services each comprising about onethird of GDP (Gross Domestic Product) which is the most common measure for the size of an economy that measures the value of total final output of goods and services produced in a specific period of time.

Although we have a lot to be grateful for as we live in one of the best countries in the world, we have to be aware of significant challenges facing the Canadian economy - from housing prices to inflation, but one critical and lesser-known problem is the declining growth in labor productivity according to a recent study (see labor productivity chart showing the downward trend). If this issue is not addressed, productivity regression threatens to hinder economic growth and diminish living standards across the country.

Labor productivity is important because it is one of the best indicators for forecasting future economic performance. A higher productivity rate means that the workforce produces greater output with fewer resources, which enhances competitiveness and economic growth and, in the long term, results in higher wages and improved living standards. Conversely, low productivity leads to slow wage growth, diminished economic expansion, and challenges in controlling inflation through monetary policy.


The International Labor Organization ranks countries by labor productivity levels. The United States is ranked 13th, and Canada is ranked 26th, tied with Spain and Hong Kong. The United States maintained high productivity in the pandemic's aftermath, a phenomenon that remains somewhat of a mystery policymakers.

The substantial integration between US and Canadian economies means that lagging Canadian economic productivity will have a direct impact on the United States. If this issue worsens, it could negatively affect sectors reliant on cross-border trade and investment.

Addressing Canada's productivity lag demands comprehensive strategies. Economists advocate for the public sector to redact interprovincial trade barriers, streamline regulations to eliminate inefficiencies, and implement tax reforms to incentivize domestic investment. The public and private

sector prioritizing innovation in AI and critical industries as well as capitalizing on Canada's highly educated workforce and abundant natural resources offer further avenues for productivity growth. However, the impact of these policies on businesses and workers will vary; the benefits will only be felt throughout the economy if they are equitably shared with workers.

Additionally, Canada can look to other countries for solutions, such as Australia, which in recent years has boosted their productivity levels, through a government-led productivity commission to provide frameworks for policy reform.

To improve the Canadian

economy in 2025, key strategies include: fostering innovation in key sectors, increasing skilled immigration address labor shortages, to modernizing regulations, prioritizing infrastructure major projects, streamlining the tax system, promoting small business growth, strategically diversifying export markets to reduce reliance on commodities.

Canada's economic prospects will brighten but not without challenges. Needless to say, we will need a leader with the foresight and vision to guide the country to overcome them.#

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From Page 1 Liberal Party leadership spent the first half of the race fanning across the country, promising to bring a centrist focus on the economy if he's successful in replacing Trudeau.

Since launching his campaign, Carney has dropped hints about the policies he'd bring in. But so far he still has to provide more details.

During a news conference last week, he said he would cut middle-class taxes, scrap the Trudeau government's capital gains tax increase, up defence spending to hit the NATO target by 2030 and "boost" the incomes of young Canadians.

He also said a Carney-led government would cut the red tape on building projects and address provincial trade barriers. On Thursday, the former Bank of Canada governor suggested he would get new homes built and lower building costs, "by including steps to promote innovation and increase productivity in the construction industry."

How all those new programs would work is still unclear. Carney's campaign has so far provided few details, including how much they would cost

Earlier this week, Carney was asked why he has not released more concrete policy details. Carney rejected the premise of the question.

"I've spent a substantial portion of my life in policy," he said.

"What I'm saying out here in ways that Canadians can understand and relate to their day-to-day life is all backed up by detailed policies. [There's a] time and place to reveal all of that."

His website currently has just one policy heading: climate.

Carney, once a vocal proponent of carbon pricing, has said he would replace his party's consumer carbon tax with an incentive program that he promises will reward Canadians for making green choices. He has vowed to keep the output-based pricing system levied on large industrial emitters.

When it comes to responding to Trump, Carney has popped up on international platforms — The Daily Show, CNN and BBC Newsnight — to underscore that Canada will stand up to Trump.

If Trump follows through on his tariff threat, Carney has said he supports dollar-for-dollar retaliatory tariffs. In the longer term he has repeatedly pushed the need for Canada to attract investment, diversify trade and ease internal trade barriers in the face of an increasingly protectionist White House.

According to a recent poll, what he's saying appears to be resonating.

A recent Leger survey suggests that if Carney wins the Liberal leadership race, he would erase the massive lead the Conservatives have enjoyed for the past year and a half.

The same survey suggests support for a Liberal Party led by Chrystia Freeland would slide three points to 28 per cent, with Conservatives at 39 per cent.

(The online poll reached 1,590 adults between Feb. 7 and Feb. 10. The polling industry's professional body, the Canadian Research Insights Council, says online surveys cannot be assigned a margin of error because they do not randomly sample the population.)

Chrystia Freeland

Chrystia Freeland the candidate has spent the first half of the race distancing herself from Chrystia Freeland the former finance minister.

Out of the gate she promised policy shifts that put her at odds with the government she once held a key role in, including scrapping the carbon tax — the Trudeau government's marquee environmental policy — and abandoning changes to the capital gains tax.

Freeland — who led Canada's response to Trump during his first term — has angled herself to voters as a tested negotiator to take on the president during his second term.

This week she renewed her calls for Canada to take a more aggressive stance to deal with the U.S. administration, including dollar-for-dollar retaliation on any tariffs and 100 per cent tariffs on Teslas, the electric vehicles made by key Trump adviser Elon Musk.

In an op-ed in the New York Times, she suggested a retaliation list should be published "immediately to allow for maximum pressure on the administration from the American industries and workers we will target." She also spoke to CNN this week.

Since resigning from Trudeau's cabinet in December, Freeland has pitched herself as someone who would have a steadier hand on the economy than her former boss.

In her searing resignation letter in December, she took aim at what she called Trudeau's "costly political gimmicks."

Earlier this week, she rolled out a suite of proposals aimed at improving the cost of living for Canadians, including an income tax cut for millions of people and policies she says will lower the price of groceries and reduce credit card debt.

On Thursday, she proposed a plan she said would entice Canadian doctors and nurses practising in the U.S. to head north. Her campaign says if Trump moves ahead with his tariff threats, she will offer doctors \$200,000 and nurses \$100,000 to return home to Canada and pay off a portion of their U.S. student loans.

Last week, she unveiled a 10-point economic growth plan that promised to eliminate trade barriers on agriculture, transportation and alcohol, leveraging federal transfers to do so. Her plan also calls to fast-track at least 10 major projects a year and enhance tax incentives for those in the critical minerals sector.

When it comes to defence, she said she would meet the NATO spending target of two per cent of gross domestic product by 2027 — five years ahead of the federal government's stated plan.

Most of Freeland's policy announcements have been made

through written statements with no news conferences, meaning reporters haven't been able to ask questions.

Her campaign did not respond to a CBC News request for the costing of all her policy proposals.

Karina Gould

Former government House leader Karina Gould has been one of the most active campaigners when it comes to rolling out policies and doing interviews with Canadian media.

The 37-year-old has presented herself as a younger, "fresh" voice for the party, who listens to the grassroots.

"We have to be honest about the fact that Canadians have lost trust in our party," Gould said last month after officially entering the race.

On Thursday, she promised to widen the eligibility for Canada's employment insurance system and introduce a universal basic income program.

When it comes to addressing Canadians' affordability concerns, an area the Liberal government is widely seen to have struggled with, she has said she would temporarily cut the federal sales tax on goods and services to four per cent for one year.

She's also promising to lift the GST on children's clothing, diapers, strollers and car seats permanently.

When it comes to housing, Gould said she would offer interest-free loans to first-time homebuyers worth up to 50 per cent of the home's purchase price. Previous iterations of the program had limited the loans to about 10 per cent.

Other policy promises include:

- Pausing the increases on the consumer carbon tax.
- •Permanently increasing the corporate tax rate from 15 per cent to 17 per

cent — on companies that make more than \$500 million per year in profits.

- Exempting supply management from any future trade negotiations.
- •Bolstering the powers of the Competition Bureau to better investigate reports of price gouging and over-pricing

Ruby Dhalla

Former MP for Brampton-Springdale, Ruby Dhalla, has returned to politics after losing her seat in the 2011 federal election and says she's 'here to save Canada.' She tells Power & Politics that she has what the other leadership hopefuls don't.

Dhalla is billing herself as the true outsider in the race, is running to the right of her opponents.

The Paul Martin-era Liberal MP has kept most of her campaign so far online, posting her policy planks on social media.

Among them are promises to deport illegal immigrants and impose life sentences for possession of hard drugs. Dhalla has also called for an economic czar to identify waste and overspending and a new health czar to review the health-care system.

(News update: Feb. 22nd, Dhalla has not been permitted to run due to violations of the Liberal Party election rules).

What's next in the race?

The candidates need to pay the final instalment of the \$350,000 entry fee on Monday, Feb. 17. With \$125,000 due, it could see some candidates wiped off the ballot if they can't meet the fundraising goal.

The party will hold its official French and English debates on Feb. 24 and 25 in Montreal.



West Island Mission Brings Essential Aid to DDO Residents

Dollard-des-Ormeaux, QC - In the heart of the West Island, a vital organization is making a difference in the lives of hundreds of families struggling to make ends meet. The West Island Mission, which recently expanded into Dollard-des-Ormeaux (DDO), is committed to providing food assistance with dignity, ensuring that those in need can shop for their essentials rather than simply receiving pre-packed food boxes.

one goes hungry. To qualify, applicants must demonstrate financial need by providing proof of income and residency, ensuring that resources are directed to those who require them most.

Beginnings and Humble **Mission to Grow**

Founded in 2005 as a grassroots initiative, West Island Mission began as a small-scale food delivery service operated out of private

Unlike traditional food banks, West Island Mission operates on a unique color-coded system that allows individuals and families to select items based on their household size. With categories ranging from single individuals to large families, the initiative ensures that clients receive the appropriate quantity of food items. Every visit costs a nominal fee of \$5, vet families leave with food valued between \$100 and \$200.

A Growing Demand for Support

The need for food assistance has surged significantly, especially since the start of the year. The organization, which was aiding approximately 350 families during the Christmas season, now serves over 430 families. Notably, single-income households and seniors on fixed incomes comprise a substantial portion of those seeking help. The rising cost of rent, medication, and daily necessities has made it increasingly difficult for many to stay afloat.

Immigrants, including refugees and asylum seekers, are also welcomed by West Island Mission. While some newcomers face waiting periods for social services, the organization steps in to provide immediate assistance, ensuring that no

homes and vehicles. Over the years, it transitioned into a client-choice shopping model, recognizing that individuals prefer selecting their own groceries.

The organization's recent expansion into a bigger facility has significantly increased its ability to store and distribute food supplies.

Funding and Challenges

Despite its success, West Island Mission faces ongoing challenges, particularly in securing consistent funding. Unlike government-funded programs, the organization relies on grants, corporate partnerships, and individual donations. Major corporate supporters such as Brother, Pfizer, and Medtronic contribute both financially and through volunteerism. However, sustaining operations, especially in the face of increasing rental costs, remains a pressing concern.

One of the hardest sacrifices has been the organization's inability to continue purchasing milk and eggs, a staple it previously provided. With rent costs now four times higher than in previous locations, West Island Mission is working tirelessly to find new funding sources that will allow it to continue providing comprehensive assistance.

Support from the City and growing seasonal demand. **Future Initiatives**

While the city of DDO has welcomed West Island Mission, financial support from the municipality still pending. Other local governments, such as Pierrefonds-Roxboro, Pointe-Claire, and Kirkland, have contributed, and the organization remains hopeful that DDO will follow

Looking ahead, the organization is preparing for its next major initiative. "Hunger Doesn't Take a Vacation." which aims to address food insecurity during the summer months.

Parent groups and workshops are available for families to learn about past and present Indigenous history, understand the experiences of other Indigenous people who were in foster care and how to support and connect with their children.

In the future, Tasiutigiit expects to continue contributing to the Indigenous community by creating more opportunities and services for the youth, expanding the program outside of Montreal, collaborating with other partners to provide needed resources and continue supporting the voices of the Indigenous youth in the organization. Tasiutigiit benefits youth and foster adoptive families by providing them with an opportunity to learn about Inuit and First Nation culture which enable them to connect with their cultural identities and meet a community of people who they can forge relationships with.

Moisson Montreal provides food security for the island of Montreal

Moisson Montreal is a nonprofit organization that aims to provide community organizations with food and hygienic products which are distributed across the Island of Montreal for those in need. Maggie Borowiec, the Director of Philanthropy of Moisson Montreal states, "Our them as much food as they need so that they can be offering the services out to the population". Another achievement is in 2023,

Moisson Montreal began an urban agriculture program with two other organizations, increasing the quality of fresh produce. This

mission is to provide an optimal food supply for community agencies that are serving Montreal's most vulnerable people while actively participating in the development of sustainable solutions to promote food security". This organization indirectly supports the population through the nearly 300 community agencies on the Island of Montreal. To support a wide variety of individuals, the agencies allocate resources amongst several charity initiatives such as meal programs, grocery assistance, shelter programs and programs designed to aid seniors and children.

The organization began as a result of the founder, Pierre Legault, realizing that there were high levels of food insecurity amongst the younger generation during his work as a psycho-educator. Last year, Moisson Montreal marked its 40th anniversary after opening in 1984. The main people involved in this organization are the employees and the volunteers ranging from retired volunteers, corporate groups, schools, social clubs and the general public. In 2024, there were around 8,000 individuals who volunteered in the warehouse. This was equivalent to 84,000 volunteer hours and 46 full-time positions. The help of the community both directly and indirectly allows the organization to continue aiding the vulnerable population.

Throughout the years, Moisson Montreal has been able to improve and maintain its goals as a food bank organization. One achievement, Boroweic mentioned, is the survey of satisfaction used to ensure that needs are being met. She states, "We're happy when our agencies are happy because that's our whole reason for being to serve them. It is important for us to be able to give

collaboration enabled organic vegetables to be grown on fields in and outside of Montreal. The expansion of hubs in East Montreal was also highlighted so agencies could easily access the distributed goods. Obstacles that Moisson Montreal have faced are related to the growing need for food assistance and the difficulty of keeping up with this increase. The rising food insecurity has led to the need for more partners, food donors or individuals to provide more food.

In June 2025, Moisson Montreal will host its annual golf tournament. This fundraising event encourages individuals, business groups and other communities to join as sponsors or as participants. To raise money for the organization's mission, participation and direct donations or involvement by contacting Moisson Montreal directly is greatly appreciated.

Moisson Montreal aims to provide relief for those suffering from food insecurity across Montreal. Maggie Boroweic says, "We are so grateful for everyone who supports us; we are very fortunate that people are very generous. We find that in Montreal, people care about their neighbours and they have a lot of compassion, so we're very grateful to all the people who get involved, whether as money donors or as volunteers, because we can't really do it without community". according to Moisson Montreal's 2024 Hunger Count, the organization has distributed 19.3 million kilograms of food, serving 300 community agencies in combating food insecurities that have helped nearly 158,000 people in Montreal.



Jennilee Austria Bonifacio's story - Empowering Newcomers to Canada

For over 20 years, Jennilee Austria Bonifacio has been a dedicated settlement worker for newly arrived students and the Filipino youth in Ontario. As a consultant with several Ontario school boards, she is the founder of FilipinoTalks, a researcher, a tour guide in Little Manila, a founding member of Salaysay (a community of Filipino-Canadian authors) and a notable author who aims to provide readers with a deeper understanding of Filipino immigration.

Jennilee Austria Bonifacio was born in Sarnia, Ontario. At age 13, she began her involvement within the Filipino community through a Filipino association that had dance troops for tinikling (a folk dance). When she later moved to Toronto, she began



immersing herself within the Filipino community She completed her degree for a BA in International Studies from Trent University and an MA in Immigration Settlement Studies from Toronto Metropolitan University. She also received a graduate certificate from Humber School for Writers and finished the Emerging Writings Intensive program at Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity. Later on, she worked with newcomer students and she began to see common trends and issues among them. She learned why there was a common increase in dropouts, lack of academic efforts and familial issues that the students experienced.

Her personal observations kickstarted the project with the York Center for Asian Research where they spoke to 1200 Filipino students in Montreal, Toronto, Vancouver and Winnipeg. These student interviews revealed that a lack of role models was the main problem which led her to create Filipino Talks, an educational workshop for newcomers, their parents and teachers to help them understand the Filipino community. She says: "People don't understand how much difficulty students have in a new country because there are many things that are unfamiliar - new school, new language, and maybe also a new mom. And that is a lot for any newly arrived high school student."

After working with the community for several years, Jennilee

decided to publish her debut book entitled "Reuniting with Strangers: A Novel which highlights the struggles and triumphs of immigrating as a Filipino. It has received several recognitions such as CBC's Best Books of 2023, a finalist for the Jim Wong Chu Emerging Authors Award, won silver in Multicultural Fiction at the 2024 Independent Publisher Book Awards, a finalist of the Toronto Book Awards and was long listed for Canada Reads 2024. A chapter in the novel, "Seven Steps to Reuniting with your Teenage Daughter," is also featured in Magdaragat: An Anthology of Filipino-Canadian Writing.

Jennilee's achievements are in terms of watching the relationships and involvement of the Filipino youth grow after the leadership training in Filipino Talks. She explains, "There' are times when I work in a school and they call down all the Filipino students to come to the cafeteria but they don't even realize how many of them will be there until that moment." Obstacles in her work are mainly related to schools not wanting Filipino-specific programs, however, she considers her job very rewarding as she is able to connect with others in supporting newcomers to Canada.

Jennilee believes in the importance of teachers understanding that newly arrived students may have been separated from their parent(s) for many years. This situation is something that should be taken into consideration especially if they show academic or behavioral struggles. She wants to forge connections and to bring empathy to people who aren't Filipino, so they can better understand and ensure that the students are not left alone. She states: "It's going to be really hard at first and you might feel guilty about the fact that you're not so happy to be here. People are going to say, 'Oh, you should be grateful, and now you're abroad, you're in Canada.' It's totally normal for you to want to come back home or regret coming here, but it'll only get better the more you reach out (...) as you're not alone."

He emphasized his response to President Donald Trump's tariff threats and said that he would make Canada strong and free. Thai - Cashew Chicken

Ingredients Cups Metric

2 tbsp peanut oil (or canola or vegetable oil)

1/2 cup raw cashews , unsalted (Note 1 for roasted)

1 garlic clove, finely minced

1/2 onion (brown, yellow, or white), cut into thin wedges

200g/7oz chicken thighs , skinless and boneless, sliced into 1cm / 1/3" thin strips (Note 2)

2 green onions , cut into 2.5cm / 1" lengths, white part separated from green part

1/2 red cayenne pepper, deseeded and finely sliced on the diagonal (omit or reduce if preferred) (Note 3)
Sauce:

1 tbsp oyster sauce (Note 4)

1 tsp dark soy sauce (Note 5)

2 tsp fish sauce (Note 6)

1 tsp white sugar

3 tbsp water

Serving:

Red chilli , finely sliced (optional garnish)

Jasmine rice , for serving (or other rice of choice)

Cook Mode

Prevent screen from sleeping Instructions

Sauce: Mix all the Sauce ingredients in a small bowl.

Cook cashews: Heat oil over medium heat in a wok or large skillet. Add cashews and cook for 5 minutes until they become a dark golden colour and crunchy (yep, you might have to eat one to check!). Remove from skillet with a slotted spoon.

Garlic & onion: Turn heat up to high. Add garlic and onion. Cook for 30 seconds. Chicken: Add chicken. Cook for 1 minute until the outside changes from

pink to white.

White part of green onion & chilli: Add white part of green onions and chilli.

Cook for 1 minute until chicken is just cooked through.

Add Sauce: Cook for 1 minute until it reduces down to a syrup, coating the

chicken nicely.

Green onion & cashews: Add green part of green onions and cashews. Toss for 30 seconds.

Serve: Transfer to serving dish. Serve with jasmine rice, or other rice of choice, garnished with extra red chilli (if you can handle the heat!).

Recipe Notes:

1. Cashews – Pan-toasting raw cashews has the most superior flavour. But if you only have roasted cashews, that's fine too. Just cook for around 1 1/2 minutes until they are lightly golden and they smell nutty.

Do not use salted cashews, it will make the dish too salty.

2. Chicken – Thighs will yield a juicier result than breast. But breast will also work just fine. Consider tenderising the breast the Chinese way. It makes it so much softer and juicier! (No need to do it for thigh).

3. Chilli – A golden rule is the larger the chilli, the less spicy it is (usually!) I've used large red cayenne pepper here which is not that spicy but still has a decent kick to it. You can omit or reduce the chilli if you wish. If you want spicier, consider using Thai birds-eye chillis –

4. Oyster sauce – This can be substituted with vegetarian oyster sauce, sold in some large grocery stores. It's actually not bad (no offence to veggo's)!

5. Dark soy sauce – This soy has a more intense colour and flavour than light soy and all-purpose soy. It stains the chicken an appealing mahogany colour. If you use light or all-purpose soy, the dish colour and flavour will not be as good! More on different soy sauces here, and when you can sub with what.

6. Fish sauce – Fish sauce is a traditional ingredient in Thai cooking, and has more complex flavours than soy sauce. You can sub with more soy sauce, but the flavour will not be quite as good. (The oyster sauce still goes some way to compensate if you don't use fish sauce, as it too is packed with umami!).



Beef Sukiyaki

Sukiyaki features vegetables, noodles, tofu, and steak served in a steaming, flavorful broth made with dashi, mirin, and soy sauce. This Japanese dish is traditionally cooked at the table in a pot of simmering broth. In this recipe, it's cooked on the stovetop for convenience.

Ingredients:

Ingredients

For the sukiyaki sauce:

2 tablespoons sake

1/4 cup mirin

1 tablespoon brown sugar

½ cup soy sauce

To prepare the sukiyaki:

½ block firm tofu

(sliced into ½-inch/1cm thick slices) 5 dried shiitake mushrooms (rehydrated)

1 package enoki mushrooms (ends trimmed and rinsed)

2 cups napa cabbage (cut into 2-inch/5cm pieces)

2 cups tong ho (chrysanthemum greens, washed)

2 scallions (white and green parts separated)

1 bundle dried mung bean vermicelli noodles (or shirataki noodles)

1 tablespoon vegetable oil

12 oz. thinly sliced fatty beef

2 cups dashi stock (mushroom soaking liquid, or chicken stock)

2 cups steamed rice

2 egg yolks (pasteurized, optional) Instructions

In a pot over a portable electric or gas cooktop (or just your regular stove) over medium heat, add 2 tablespoons sake, ¼ cup mirin, 1 tablespoon brown sugar, and ¼ cup soy sauce in a saucepan. Bring to a boil, turn off the heat, make sure all the sugar is dissolved, and transfer to a bowl. Then prepare all your sukiyaki ingredients—the tofu slices, rehydrated shiitake mushrooms, enoki mushrooms, napa cabbage, tong ho, and scallions. Set aside on a plate. Soak the dried vermicelli noodles in water for 10 minutes.

Heat 1 tablespoon vegetable oil in the pan. Fry the white parts of the scallions in the oil for 2 minutes. Chop the green parts of the scallions finely and set aside.

In the pan with the scallions, add the sliced beef. Sear the beef for 10 seconds, and add a drizzle of your sukiyaki sauce. Fry the meat until it just begins to brown—it should still be a bit pink. Remove from the pot and set aside.

Add the rest of your sukiyaki sauce and 2 cups stock. Bring to a boil, and add the tofu, mushrooms, napa cabbage, and tong ho to the pot in sections. Also drain the vermicelli noodles you soaked and add them to the pot. Cover the pot and bring to a boil. Simmer until the ingredients are cooked through, about 5-7 minutes.

Remove the cover, add the beef back to the pot. Sprinkle with the chopped scallions, and enjoy with rice and egg

Cook chicken: Heat a large pan or wok on high heat. Add 1 tablespoon oil. Season chicken with salt and pepper and add to hot pan. Sauté until cooked through, then remove to a plate. Cook Veggies: Add another tablespoon

of oil. Once hot add cabbage, carrots, celery, and the whites of the chopped green onion. Stir fry over high heat for 1-2 minutes. Add the garlic and ginger and cook for 30 seconds, then remove everything to a plate.

Noodles: Add last tablespoon of oil to the pan and add the noodles. Cook for 1 minute. Add the sauce and cook, tossing to coat. Return veggies and chicken to the pan, along with fresh bean sprouts.

Serve immediately, garnished with green onion.

(CBC News, January 31, 2025) In addition to the roughly 2,000 employees laid off by Amazon after the company announced it would be closing its Quebec warehouses, more than 2,500 other people employed by smaller carriers subcontracted by the company have also lost their jobs.

The shockwaves from the announcement last week by the U.S. online retail giant continue in the province as the closures are expected to take place over several weeks, concluding on March 22.

Quebec's Labour Ministry says it's received notices of mass companies linked to Amazon, known as delivery service partners (DSPs).

According figures compiled by Radio-Canada, the total number of layoffs resulting from Amazon's closure of its seven Quebec warehouses has risen to

The company encourages the creation of these kinds of smaller delivery companies on its website, boasting startup costs as low as \$15,000 with profits of between \$75,000 and \$175,000. The website also says 4,400 DSPs have been created since 2018, employing more layoffs from 23 logistics and transport than 390,000 people in 20 countries.

As of Friday, Quebec is still on the list of available locations for those interested in applying for the DSP program.

Amazon has denied any link between the closures and the unionization of 250 employees at the DXT4 warehouse in Laval, Que., in recent months.

But labour experts have said they believe otherwise.

In an interview with CBC News last week, Adam King, an assistant professor in the labour studies program at the University of Manitoba, said Amazon had tried to contest the certification of the union's bargaining unit and lost.

"I think essentially what's happening here is that the clock was ticking down on a first collective agreement," King said.

A collective bargaining agreement could have led to the union expanding to other facilities in the province. King suggested.

Amazon told Radio-Canada it had decided to return to "a third-party delivery model, supported by small local businesses, similar to the one we had until 2020," the year it began to build the massive warehouses in Quebec.#

'Made in Quebec' shop sales exploding after **Amazon closures, tariff** threats

Following threats of U.S. tariffs and Amazon's departure from Quebec, many in the province are looking to buy local.

A company in Brossard on Montreal's South Shore wants to become the province's go-to for ecommerce, selling everything from condiments to candles to jewellery, all made in Quebec.

Signé Local co-owner Dawei Ding said Quebec-made products are everywhere, but what's missing is a better way to buy them.

"Right now, Quebec lacks a platform that's easy accessible where we can find all Quebec made products," said Ding.

Ding and Louis Lesperance own the shop selling thousands of products from around 200 suppliers. The chain has four locations: three in Montreal, and one in Quebec City.

Their main hub at Dix-30 handles all the online orders, but that's about to change.

Before the end of February, Signé Local is launching its own online marketplace.(With files from the Canadian Press, Feb 9, 2025).

Campaigning Begins in Philippine Midterm Election Amid Vice-Presidential **Impeachment Drama**

(February 11, 2025) The 90-day campaign period for the Philippines' midterm elections opened today, against the backdrop of a bitter political feud that culminated in last week's impeachment of Vice President Sara Duterte.

A total of 18,280 seats will be up for grabs in the May 12 polls, including all 317 seats in the House of Representatives, half of the 24 seats in the Senate, 82 governorships and vice-governorships, and thousands more executive and legislative positions at the regional and municipal level. (Official campaigning for local positions begins on March 28.)

But the election is set to be dominated by the bitter political feud between Duterte and her one-time ally, President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. - one that political analyst and former presidential adviser Ronald Llamas likened this week to "an unfolding saga that could rival any Netflix series." After aligning to remarkable effect ahead of the 2022 presidential election, the relationship between the two Schedule: March 27, 28, 29, 2025 - 7 PM top leaders has deteriorated sharply. The resulting rivalry fed into last week's sensational House vote that impeached Venue: Tangente - Espace Orange the vice president, accusing her of "violation of the constitution, betrayal of public trust, graft and corruption, and other high crimes.'

> Duterte, the daughter of pugnacious former President Rodrigo Duterte, is currently the subject of a House investigation into her alleged misuse of more than 612.5 million pesos (\$10.5 million) of confidential and intelligence funds, both as vice president and



education secretary. She has also been accused of amassing unusual amounts of wealth and threatening the life of President Marcos, his wife, and his cousin Martin Romualdez, the current speaker of the

Among the most prominent of the 64 senatorial aspirants are allies and supporters of both Marcos and Duterte. Marcos has endorsed a number of prominent figures, including three former movie actors, the daughter of the country's richest man, and former boxer Manny Pacquiao, who ran against him in the 2022 presidential election.

The impeachment has now added an extra weight of political significance to the battles for the 12 Senate positions. As Reuters noted in a report today, the May 12 election will "effectively decide half of the jurors" for the Senate trial that will decide whether to impeach Duterte and remove her from office, something that would also bar her from running for elected office for life, including for the presidency.

Trump's Election is a Crisis like No Other, Not Only for the U.S. But For the World

Not the probable dementia, the unfathomable ignorance, the emotional incontinence; not, certainly, the shambling, hate-filled campaign, or the ludicrously unworkable anti-policies.

The candidate out on bail in four jurisdictions, the convicted fraud artist, the adjudicated rapist and serial

sexual predator, the habitual bankrupt, the stooge of Vladimir Putin, the man who tried to overturn the last election and all of his creepy retinue of crooks, ideologues and lunatics: Americans took a long look at all this and said, yes please.

There is no sense in understating the depth of the disaster. This is a crisis like no other in our lifetimes. The government of the United States has been delivered into the hands of a gangster, whose sole purpose in running, besides staying out of jail, is to seek revenge on his enemies. The damage Donald Trump and his nihilist cronies can do – to America, but also to its democratic allies, and to the peace and security of the world – is incalculable. We are living in the time of Nero.

The first six months will be a time of maximum peril. NATO must from this moment be considered effectively obsolete, without the American security guarantee that has always been its bedrock. We may see new incursions by Russia into Europe – the poor Ukrainians are probably done for, but now it is the Baltics and the Poles who must worry – before the Europeans have time to organize an alternative. China may also accelerate its Taiwanese ambitions.

At home, Mr. Trump will be moving swiftly to consolidate his power. Some of this will be institutional – the replacement of tens of thousands of career civil servants with Trumpian loyalists. But some of it will be ... atmospheric.

At some point someone – a company whose chief executive has displeased him, a media critic who has gotten under his skin – will find themselves the subject of unwanted attention from the Trump administration. It might not be so crude as a police arrest. It might just be a little regulatory matter, a tax audit, something like that. They will seek the protection of the courts, and find it is not there.

The judges are also Trump loyalists, perhaps, or too scared to confront him. Or they might issue a ruling, and find it has no effect – that the administration has called the basic bluff of liberal democracy: the idea that, in the crunch, people in power agree to be bound by the law, and by its instruments the courts, the same as everyone else. Then everyone will take their cue. Executives will line up to court him. Media organizations, the large ones anyway, will find reasons to be cheerful.

Of course, in reality things will start to fall apart fairly quickly. The huge across-the-board tariffs he imposes will tank the world economy. The massive deficits, fueled by his ill-judged tax policies – he won't replace the income tax, as he promised, but will fill it with holes – and monetized, at his direction, by the Federal Reserve, will ignite a new round of inflation.

Most of all, the insane project of deporting 12 million undocumented immigrants – finding them, rounding them up and detaining them in hundreds of internment camps around the country, probably for years, before

doing so – will consume his administration. But by then it will be too late.

We should not count upon the majority of Americans coming to their senses in any event. They were not able to see Mr. Trump for what he was before: why should that change? Would they not, rather, be further coarsened by the experience of seeing their neighbours dragged off by the police, or the military, further steeled to the necessity of doing "tough things" to "restore order?"

Some won't, of course. But they will find in time that the democratic levers they might once have pulled to demand change are no longer attached to anything. There are still elections, but the rules have been altered: there are certain obstacles, certain disadvantages if you are not with the party of power. It will seem easier at first to try to change things from within. Then it will be easier not to change things.

All of this will wash over Canada in various ways – some predictable, like the flood of refugees seeking escape from the camps; some less so, like the coarsening of our own politics, the debasement of morals and norms by politicians who have discovered there is no political price to be paid for it. And who will have the backing of their patron in Washington.

All my life I have been an admirer of the United States and its people. But I am frightened of it now, and I am even more frightened of them.#

simulating passenger loads. Engineers are closely monitoring braking systems, power distribution, and train synchronization to ensure seamless operation once the system is fully launched.

According to the City of Pointe-Claire, dynamic testing has expanded to include increased train frequency and extended hours, further preparing the system for real-world conditions. The testing period will ensure the REM meets rigorous safety and efficiency standards ahead of its official launch planned for fall 2025.

The REM, once completed, will revolutionize public transportation in Montreal by offering a fully automated, high-frequency service connecting key hubs, including downtown Montreal, the South Shore, and Pierre Elliott Trudeau International Airport. The dynamic testing phase is a crucial step before full-scale service can commence later this year.

Transit authorities have assured that public trials will soon be introduced, allowing residents to experience the system firsthand before its official launch. Additionally, REM authorities have confirmed an extension in testing hours to assess the system's performance under various operational conditions, ensuring full readiness for passenger service.

Next Steps and Anticipated Launch

Following the completion of dynamic testing, the REM will move into a final phase of validation and certification by government transit regulators. If all goes according to schedule, the first sections of the network are expected to be operational by mid-2025, with full network completion slated for 2027.

The REM project continues to progress despite early delays, reaffirming its role as a transformative force in urban mobility. As Montrealers await their first rides on the fully automated system, the latest testing results indicate that the future of transit in the city is on track.#

Trump moves with dizzying speed on his to-do list. But there are warning signs in his first month

As U.S. President Donald Trump approaches the first-month mark in his second term, he has moved with dizzying speed and blunt force to reorder American social and political norms and the economy while redefining the U.S. role in the world.

At the same time, he has empowered Elon Musk, an unelected, South African-born billionaire, to help engineer the firing of thousands of federal employees and potentially shutter entire agencies created by Congress.

Those efforts have largely overshadowed Trump's crackdowns on immigration and the U.S.-Mexico border, and his efforts to remake social policy by wiping out diversity, equity and inclusion programs and rolling back transgender rights.

The president has also imposed scores of new tariffs against U.S. trade partners and threatened more, even as economists warn that will pass costs on to U.S. consumers and feed inflation.

Here's a look at the first four weeks:

Mass federal firings begin

The Trump administration fired thousands of workers who were still in probationary periods common among new hires. Some had less than an hour to leave their offices.

Those potentially losing jobs include medical scientists, energy infrastructure specialists, foreign service employees, FBI agents, prosecutors, educational and farming data experts, overseas aid workers and even human resources personnel who would otherwise have to manage the dismissals.

At the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau, which was created to protect the public after the 2008 financial crisis, employees say the administration not only wants to cut nearly the entire workforce but also erase all its data from the past 12 years. The administration agreed to pause any further dismantling of the agency until March 3, under a judge's order.

While Trump promised to turn Washington upside down, his moves could have far-reaching implications for thousands of federal employees around the country and drive up the unemployment rate if large numbers of layoffs happen at once.

Legal challenges mount

Court challenges to Trump's policies started on Inauguration Day and have continued at a furious pace since Jan. 20. The administration is facing some 70 lawsuits nationwide challenging his executive orders and moves to downsize the federal government.

The Republican-controlled Congress is putting up little resistance, so the court system is ground zero for pushback. Judges have issued more

than a dozen orders at least temporarily blocking aspects of Trump's agenda, ranging from an executive order to end U.S. citizenship extended automatically to people born in this country to giving Musk's team access to sensitive federal data.

While many of those judges nominated by Democratic were Trump has gotten presidents, unfavorable rulings from judges picked by Republican presidents, too. Trump suggested he could target the judiciary, saying, "Maybe we have to look at the judges." The administration has said in the meantime that it will appeal, while White House press secretary Karoline Leavitt railed against the orders slowing the president's agenda, calling each "an abuse of the rule of law."

The administration has notched a few wins, too, most significantly when a judge allowed it to move forward with a deferred resignation program spearheaded by Musk.

The economic outlook worsens

Amid the policy upheaval, the latest economic data could prompt some White House worries.

Inflation rose at a monthly rate of 0.5 per cent in January, according to the Labor Department. Over the past three months, the consumer price index has increased at an annual rate of 4.5 per cent -- a sign that inflation is heating up again after having cooled for much of 2024.

Trump told voters he could lower inflation, and do so almost immediately after taking office. But Leavitt, while blaming Trump's predecessor, Democrat Joe Biden, acknowledged the latest inflation indicators were "worse than expected."

More trouble signs came when the Commerce Department reported that retail sales slumped 0.9 per cent on a monthly basis in January. A drop that large could signal a weakening in consumer confidence and economic growth.

The Federal Reserve's report on industrial production also found that factory output slipped 0.1 per cent

in January, largely due to a 5.2 per cent drop in the making of motor vehicles and parts.

These could all be blips, which means the monthly data in February will really matter.

The 'fair trade' Trump wants isn't necessarily fair

After previously imposing tariffs on China and readying import taxes on Canada and Mexico., Trump rolled out what he called the "big one." He said his administration would put together new tariffs in the coming weeks and months to match what other countries charge.

Other nations hardly find Trump's approach fair.

From their vantage point, he is including items other than tariffs such as value added taxes, which are akin to sales taxes. That means the rates could be much higher than a standard tariff in Europe.

On top of that, Trump plans separate additional tariffs on autos, computer chips and pharmaceuticals, in addition to the 25 per cent tariffs on steel and aluminum that he announced on Monday.

It is not clear whether these trade penalties are mainly negotiating tools or ways for Trump to raise revenues. So far, he has suggested that they are both.

Congress watches its authority erode. But there are signs of pushback

Congress finds itself confounded by the onslaught as its institutional power — as the Constitution's first branch of government with its unmatched authority over federal spending — is being eroded in real time.

House Speaker Mike Johnson, R-La., said he finds the work of Musk's team "very exciting." Johnson said Trump is "taking legitimate executive action."

But even among congressional Republicans there were small signs of protest emerging — letters being written and phone calls being made — to protect their homestate interests and constituents as funding for programs, services and

government contracts is being dismantled.

Rep. Carlos Gimenez, R-Fla., urged the Homeland Security Department not to issue blanket deportations for Venezuelan migrants who fled their country and now call the Miami-area home. "I'm not powerless. I'm a member of Congress," he said.

Democratic lawmakers have joined protesters outside shuttered federal offices, arguing Trump and Musk had gone too far. Democrats suggested legislation to protect various programs, and even filed articles of impeachment against the president over his plans to bulldoze and redevelop Gaza.

Trump wants a new world order

With his phone call to Russian President Vladimir Putin this past week, Trump is hoping he initiated the beginning of the end of the Kremlin's war on Ukraine.

The leaders agreed to have their teams "start negotiations immediately." After getting off the phone with Putin, Trump called Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy to discuss getting both sides to the negotiating table.

The Putin call is a monumental development in a war that has left hundreds of thousands dead or seriously wounded.

But the way ahead remains complicated.

Zelenskyy said he will not meet with Putin until a plan for peace is hammered out by Trump. Trump has gotten blowback when European leaders sharply criticized him and Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth for suggesting that NATO membership was not in the cards for Ukraine.

The White House faces a further quandary with Zelenskyy wanting the U.S. and other countries to provide security guarantees for Ukraine, and Zelenskyy insisting that he and Trump iron out an agreement on the contours of any peace deal.#
