

Manuel and Tabamo vie for FAMAS Presidency

Running for FAMAS presidency next month are Cesar Manuel and Dante Tabamo. They've few things in common. Manuel has a BSE degree (social science) while Tabamo holds a degree in Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education. Both of them think that lack of unity is the biggest problem in the community. Both of them have run for FAMAS presidency and lost. In 2011 Manuel and Au Osdon garnered votes of 821 and 762, respectively. Although Manuel won by 69 votes, he still lost the election due to the implementation of 150-vote deduction from his total votes. One of his directors violated the COMELEC's Rules and Regulations. On the other hand, Tabamo ran for presidency last election but lost to the outgoing president, Cora Aberin.

NAFS – What is your reason for running as president?

Manuel – Not long after Cora Aberin was elected, a rumor circulated around that I would be the next one running for president. A few months ago, it was published that I would be running unopposed. There's no grain of truth to

the rumors. In fact, I didn't know then if I would run or not until recently. After nights of soul searching, I decided to run because of the disunity in the community that has been going on. It's sad. I've to do something about it. Uniting the community will be a big challenge but I'm ready to do it. I'll do anything for the community.

Tabamo – I have served a few FAMAS presidents and learned from them. Now, I am convinced that I will be able to serve the community better. I want to have a legacy of clean, dynamic, progressive and productive leadership, not only for myself and my family but for the whole community.

NAFS – What do you think is the biggest problem in our community and what is your plan to solve it?

Manuel – As I've said, disunity' of the Filipinos is one of the biggest problems

Trump's pick for ambassador to Canada to push for even stronger ties

OTTAWA -- President Donald Trump's choice to serve as the next ambassador to Canada said she will work hard to maintain -- and improve -- the strong economic relationship between both countries during her time in Ottawa.

"I will work tirelessly to further enhance our strong economic partnership -- the most extensive and integrated economic relationship of any two nations in the world," Kelly Knight Craft said Thursday during her Senate confirmation hearing in Washington, D.C.

"I believe we can do better," she added.

"If confirmed, I will seek new opportunities to foster further growth to create more jobs for both countries, while promoting free and fair trade to ensure that American businesses and workers can compete on a level playing field."

The Trump administration wants to have its ambassador in Canada quickly, since negotiations for the new North American Free Trade Agreement are set to begin next month.

Knight Craft did not divulge many other details about the role she expects to play in the NAFTA talks, except to say that she will work closely with U.S.

Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer and U.S. Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross on advancing American priorities on the file.

Later on, when asked to share her plans for promoting U.S. exports to Canada, Knight Craft mentioned softwood lumber, dairy and poultry as

The Filipino Association of Montreal and Suburbs, popularly known as FAMAS, is the oldest and biggest organization of Filipino-Canadians in Quebec. Each time there is an election, community issues are brought up for discussion. Each leadership candidate offers his or her own solutions.

Sometimes, FAMAS elections seem predictable and we readily can guess who will win the popular vote. But based on the interview of the two candidates, they have some similarities in their vision of what Famas needs - to see a united community. Both have loyal followers and common goals - to improve Famas and serve all the members better.

Community unity has always been an issue and may not be easily solved. By having so many organizations that split up due to personal conflicts of its leaders, it really seems that we are not united. We do not seem to go out of our way to patronize our local businesses. We find it easier to buy from the bigger stores rather than go to the smaller ones usually owned by Filipinos. Our lack of unity was also shown when another association was formed to raise funds for a community center instead of approaching the administration of FAMAS to see what could be done together. Eventually, this other group folded up and realized how difficult it was to raise enough funds to build a bigger center.

Past presidents of FAMAS were able to purchase the building while other presidents renovated and improved it. Obviously, something more needs to be done in order to accommodate our community that has grown bigger and we need to find a way to achieve our long felt dream to have a place which can accommodate all kinds of activities of different associations.

FAMAS, being an established organization has a lot of potential to play the biggest role in the community. Many past presidents had already

started some projects that had some value. . Reviewing them and selecting which ones are worthwhile continuing will show appreciation of past efforts and give credit to those who tried to serve the community with their best intentions.

On the other hand, after so many years, our community needs to build something more substantial and meaningful. The incoming administration of FAMAS must seize the opportunity to do greater things in promoting unity. What else is better than building a lasting institution such as a community cultural center?

We commend all candidates in this election. We encourage them to keep up their good work . And when the election is over, may they become united in the pursuit of a bigger goal - to make FAMAS reach its full potential. Politics should last only as long as campaigning for an election and should end after the last ballot is counted. President Rodrigo Duterte's top legislative agenda is the federalism of the Philippines. Actually, federalism was not the idea of Duterte, two of our

Dear Editor,

It has been three years since former Philippines Ambassador to Canada Leslie B. Gatan took his retirement after a distinguished career in the Department of Foreign Affairs.

He now resides in New Jersey as his wife Debbie works at the United Nations. They will eventually return to the Philippines when she retires. It has been my pleasure to maintain contact with Mr. and Mrs. Gatan since they left

Canada.

Recently we had the occasion to meet during the Gatan's short visit to Montreal. Leslie wanted Montreal's Filipino community to know that he maintains a keen interest in assuring the success of the growing relationship between Canada and the Philippines.

He lauded the hard work of the Philippines Embassy in Ottawa under the leadership of current Ambassador Petronila Garcia in its efforts to enhance the Canada - Philippines relationship to foster trade, tourism and cooperation. He especially praised the continued success of the annual Ambassador's Winter Escapade to the Philippines, a program he initially launched.

Leslie was very aware of my efforts to build on the Montreal - Manila agreement and urges the Filipino community to support my desire to have the entente be more than just a simple expression of friendship.

When the original agreement was adopted in 2005 after discussions between Manila Mayor Lito Atienza's office and myself it was hoped that there would be substantive cooperation between the municipalities. For a variety of reasons, this just never happened.

Over the past years I have visited Manila City Hall twice, meeting with Mayor Joseph Estrada and then Vice Mayor Isko Moreno to push for a new and stronger agreement. These visits were facilitated by the Philippines

Embassy in Ottawa.

There is good news. Manila adopted a motion to move forward this past February and our Borough reciprocated by adopting my motion to that effect on June 5. It now only requires Executive Committee ratification.

Leslie Gatan suggested we could easily integrate cultural and sporting exchanges. But he wants to see tangible economic gains for the partners.

Together we have discussed that Montreal could provide expertise that would aid Manila improve public transit and reduce traffic congestion. As the former Vice President of the STM, I feel this is certainly an area where Montreal could help make a difference.

Leslie wisely cautioned that this is an election year in Montreal and hoped the agreement would not be a political football. I will count on the wisdom of the community to assure that we work together in a cooperative and non-partisan manner to assure that the final product is something in which everyone can take pride.

Recently I held a meeting at FAMAS to hear citizens' proposals as to what we would like to see in the agreement. Readers of the North American Filipino Star can help the process by sending their proposals to me at mrottrand@ville.montreal.qc.ca

I will ask the new FAMAS Board which will be elected soon to also offer counsel as to what it believes should be part of the agreement. I am convinced that this agreement - now still only statement of friendship - will one day offer the partners real and tangible benefits.

During the presidential elections of 2004, president Gloria Macapagal Arroyo campaigned for constitutional reforms. After winning the elections, she created the Consultative Commission, headed by Dr. Abueva. The task of the commission was "to propose the necessary revisions on the 1987 Constitution that included a shift to a unicameral parliamentary form of government, decentralization of national government, and empowering local governments by a transition to a parliamentary-federal



government system."

The proponents of charter change, while agreeing on a parliamentary system, are divided between the supporters of Federalism and those that decry Federalism as an unworkable political system. Instead, the anti-federalist group is pushing for the adoption of a unitary parliamentary system.

Today, President Duterte is pushing hard to change the government to a federal system using the model similar to the one proposed by Abueva in 2004. He has been pressuring the House of Representatives to pass legislation to effect a charter change. Well, it doesn't seem as easy as it sounds.

While a unitary government – the central government — has all the power, federalism would seem to be more democratic. But don't be fooled by it. There are lots of variables and unknowns before the House could responsibly fashion the necessary amendments to fit the fundamental tenets of a Philippine democratic system as enshrined in the 1987 Constitution.

Australia divided into six states.

Allow me to share excerpt from my column, "The Folly of Federalism," which I wrote in October 2005. I said, "To get a pretty good 'feel' of how Federalism works, let's look at Australia. In 1901, Australia adopted

here. One cause of disunity is the lack of communication that leads to misunderstanding.

To avoid misunderstanding, there should be communication - an open communication. I plan to reach out to our kababayan here. Should I win, I'll make sure that the centre will be open to everybody, not only to Filipinos but also to non-Filipinos. Sometimes, people ask me "Bakit nandiyan si Pedro? Bakit nandiyan si Jose? I want people to know that FAMAS doesn't belong to the incumbent administration. The centre is for everybody. To reach out to our kababayan, I'll ask them to have coffee at the centre, I'll talk to them. I'll make them feel important. I'll make them know that I care. I'll give them a feeling of belonging. Things will be easier if we can work together in harmony.

Tabamo--The biggest problem that besets the community at the moment is the division and the lack of unity and cooperation. Others would say there are lots of other pressing problems in the community, but for me, if only we're united, other problems would not be too difficult not to be solved. Nothing is impossible, when people work together, or when people are governed by the same vision. Ultimately, we are all working towards the same goal - to be able to serve the Filipino-Canadians in Montreal and its suburbs. This is very good starting point for unity to be attained. We can harness that motivation and use it as a catapult for the community to be sprang into a different direction - that of brother-

areas where she would direct some of her efforts.

Otherwise, Knight Craft, who shared the stage with other, more high-profile nominees at the U.S. Senate foreign relations committee including Trump's picks for NATO and the United Kingdom, faced few questions, with two of them about years-old results of college basketball games in her home state of Kentucky.

Knight Craft, who would be the first woman to serve as U.S. ambassador to Canada, said she would also work to advance shared goals on energy security, which she mentioned is linked to the environment.

"I will also work to advance our shared environmental goals, stewardship of our common watersheds, land mass, wildlife, farm life and the air we breath, from coast to coast to coast, as the Canadians say," she said.

Knight Craft said she also valued the partnership Canada has with the U.S. in Norad and NATO.

"The United States is fortunate to have a neighbour that shares a strong

Whenever there were expenses submitted, official receipts were produced for transparency. I was always up-to date with my treasurer's report which made it easier for the auditor to do his job. As membership director, I had produced a lot of members during my term. The membership fees were a source of income for FAMAS. And when the building was converted into a centre, we were never allowed to have tenants anymore so we lost income. I was one of those who broached the idea of asking donations from the associations renting rooms to help defray the miscellaneous expenses like electricity, toilet paper, etc.

Tabamo - During my term as FAMAS vice president, Internal 2013-2015, together with the other members of the board, I provided a strong and solid support to the President, Nida

the Federal Parliament and government with the six States giving up some of their powers, but remaining independent. The Australian Constitution states, 'The legislative power of the commonwealth shall be vested in a Federal Parliament.' In addition, the constitution gives a range of powers and responsibilities to the Federal Parliament. Powers not identified in the constitution reside with the States. Each of the six States has its own constitution, parliament and government.

"But there is a lot of overlapping between the Australian Federal and the

Quirapas. I managed the Philippine Community Centre smoothly with the help of volunteers gaining income from rental that contributed to the financial state of the community. I chaired the profitable Pista sa Nayon that made an income of \$16,000. The benefits from each of the event I chaired far exceeded other materials and financial gains. NAFS - What is the biggest misconception about you?

Manuel - People often ask, "How could you serve as president when you're busy with your job?" The constitution doesn't say that the presidential candidate should be retired. There were some good FAMAS presidents in the past who had full-time jobs but still did a sterling job. Why is it my running a restaurant becomes an issue now? I have help from family and friends. The center is near the restaurant so I can immediately go there when necessary and with the modern technology, communication is easier.

Tabamo - Simply because I am quiet doesn't mean I am weak. Deep inside I am a strong and a tough leader in the sense that nobody can push me around. I make my own decision but others' idea and suggestions, especially when they are great, are given attention and consideration. After all, FAMAS belongs to the community members. They are the ones who will elect us.

What is your vision?

Manuel - I want to see an expansion of State governments. A history of competition between the Federal government and the State governments exists. Since the Federal government controls tax collection, it has established its dominance in the political system. The States became

the centre. I want a separate entity to do the application for grants with the help of the three levels of the government - municipal, provincial and federal. Right now, I can't really see it happening because of lack of continuity. For example, if I apply for a grant in the middle of my term, nobody will be interested to continue it anymore in the next administration. The best solution is to form a group of people that are not members of the executive board. It should be a separate entity that should be managing this. Perhaps, a foundation that will be run by this group of people for five or ten years. Someday, when we finally have the expansion of the centre, we'll no longer rent the Hellenic Community Centre or go to the hotels to hold parties. It's an ambitious dream but it can happen if we all work together. Who would ever imagine that we would have a centre where we are now.'

Tabamo - Should we win, I want FAMAS to be more welcoming to the public by giving better access and services. We will strive to rid FAMAS of the partisanship. We want FAMAS to be an extension of their home. We will struggle to improve the relationship of FAMAS with its members with the end-goal of making them feel that they are important and are a vital part of the association.

governments. This created ongoing financial negotiations - and haggling - between the Federal government

and the States.

“There are advantages and disadvantages of Australian Federalism. However, the disadvantages far outweigh the advantages, some of which are: duplication of government; overlapping or conflicting policies in different parts of the country; State education systems with differing curricula and grading methods; financial inequality which leads to unhealthy competition and rivalry between the States; neglect in important areas of, to cite a few, public policy and public transportation; and over-government. The website

Federalism, it begs the question: Should the Philippines pursue a Federal system of government?

In my opinion, Federalism for the Philippines is a folly. Let’s look at some numbers. Its Gross Domestic Product (GDP) was worth \$304.9 billion in 2016 and the GDP per capita was \$7,728 (ranked 118 by International Monetary Fund) compared to Australia’s \$48,899 (ranked 17). Simply put, the Philippines would not be able to afford the cost of Federalism.


and manpower resources are concentrated in Metro Manila and its surrounding provinces, Cebu City, Davao City and a few other places. Provinces that are agricultural-based would be hard-pressed to collect taxes to maintain their government structure, which would consist of a legislative body, judicial system, education system, health professionals, law enforcement, social services and several other agencies. After the Federal government has taken its bigger share of the tax revenues, the amount left for the regional governments would not be enough to sustain their existence.

ARMM and CAR

In 1989, the law creating the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) was passed. It was composed of the provinces of Basilan, Lanao del Sur, Maguindanao, Sulu, and Tawi-Tawi and the cities of Marawi and Lamitan. The political intent was to satisfy the aspirations of the Bangsamoro people for self-rule and self-determination. It was created to address the “Moro problem.” But instead of solving the “Moro problem,” ARMM divided Bangsamoro into several factions run by regional warlords.

In 1997, the Philippines passed Republic Act 8438 creating the Cordillera Autonomous Region (CAR), which states: “The Cordillera Autonomous Region is a territorial and political subdivision administered by the Regional Autonomous Government consisting of the regional government and local government units under the general supervision of the President of

Region.

On paper, ARMM and CAR are ideally suited to address the “needs” of the Bangsamoro people and the cultural minorities in the Cordillera region, comprised Abra, Apayao, Benguet, Ifugao, Kalinga, and Mountain Province. However, ARMM and CAR do not have the financial independence or the ability to create revenue-generating industry. As a result they become pauper entities that depend on the central government for all the things

freedom and independence to the Filipinos. In today’s globalized economy, what is freedom and independence? In my opinion, freedom is “financial freedom” and independence is “financial independence.” Real freedom and real independence can only be achieved with wealth and the ability to compete in the global market. If we free the Filipinos into creating their own country without financial freedom, then they will become slaves of their own country.

"Gusto nila ang ganitong buhay," sinasabi natin. Maling akala ang mga ito dahil hindi natin alam kung bakit sila nagkakaganoon. Tiyak na may dahilan. Maaaring nauunawaan natin, maaaring hindi.

At dahil homeless sila, ang hindi magagandang bagay lamang ang nakikita natin. Hindi natin naiisip na balang araw ay magbabago ang ating pagtingin sa kanila.

Tulad noong May 22 nang may sumabog na bomba sa Manchester, England Arena kung saan may concert si Ariana Grande. Dalawampu't dalawa ang namatay at 59 ang nasaktan. Dalawang homeless ang itinanghal na bayani dahil sa ginawa nilang pagtulong sa mga biktima ng pagsabog ng bomba. Si Chris Parker, 33, ay namamalimos malapit sa arena. "Sa halip na tumakbo ako nang palayo, nagbalik ako upang tulungan ang mga nasaktan. Tinanggal ko ang mga pako sa mukha at braso ng mga batang duguan," sabi ni Parker. "Ibinalot ko sila ng mga T-shirts na itinitinda roon." Sa kabilang dako, si Stephen Jones ay natutulog sa isang lugar na malapit din sa arena. "Ibig din naming makatulong sa mga taong nangangailangan ng aming tulong. Hindi ako patatahimikin ng aking budhi kung umalis ako noon na hindi nakatulong sa mga biktima, lalo na sa mga bata, ng pagsabog ng bomba. Dahil homeless kami, hindi nangangahulugan na wala kaming puso."

Tama ang sinabi ni Jones. Tao rin silang katulad natin. Sa sandali ng pangangailangan, ibuwis din nila ang kanilang buhay upang makatulong sa kapwa. At sa pagkakataong iyon, hindi na natin makikita ang kanilang pagiging homeless. Sa halip, ang makikita natin ay ang kanilang kabutihan. Ang kabayanihan.

BAKIT HINDI PA TAPOS ANG DALAWANG TAON AY MAGBABAYAD NA NAMAN NG FAMAS MEMBERSHIP?

May mga nagtanong sa akin pagkatapos ng FAMAS eleksyon noong 2015 tungkol sa validity date ng membership ng asosasyong ito na dapat ay dalawang taon. Hindi ko sila masagot dahil ako rin ay naghahanap ng kasagutan sa kanilang katanungan. Lalong lumabo ang usapan namin nang sumagot naman ang isang nakikinig sa aming pag-uusap, "Baka iba ang membership sa FAMAS. Iba rin ang membership kapag eleksyon."

Sa susunod na buwan ay FAMAS eleksyon na naman kaya nagtanong na naman ako sa isang dating presidente ng asosasyong ito. "Bakit nga ba hindi pa tapos ang expiry date ng membership ng ibang members ay magbabayad na naman sila? Halimbawa, kung may utang ako sa Master Card at may isang araw pa akong palugit para bayaran iyon, hindi ako puwedeng patawan ng interest" Sumagot ang dating presidente, "Iba ang FAMAS. Ang itinatanong mo ay nasa Rules and Regulations ng constitution ng asosasyong ito." "Saan sa constitution nakasaad iyon?" tanong ko. Kung minsan, sinasabi ko sa mga kababayan natin na huwag silang mag-atubiling magtanong sa FAMAS kung may problema sila sa asosasyong ito. Kapag nagtanong ang isang tao, hindi nangangahulugang bobo siya. Pero paano sila magtatanong kung ang mapagtanungan nila ay tulad ng kausap ko. Lider at dating president ng FAMAS pero walang diplomasya sa pakikipag-usap. At pilosopo pa. Hindi ako nagtataka kung nawawalan na nga ng interest na maging miembro ng FAMAS ang marami sa atin.

ANG PRESS AND TINIG AT PULSO NG KOMUNIDAD

FAMAS ang pinakamalakang asosasyon ng mga Pilipino sa Montreal at karatig na lugar. Ito ang dahilan kung bakit FAMAS ang malimit na pinag-uusapan ng mga Pilipino lalo na sa panahon ng eleksyon. Kamakailan ay nasabi ng isang kaibigan na kahit ano ang i-suggest niya sa mga opisyal ng FAMAS, hindi nakikinig ang mga ito. Hindi ko siya masisisi. Noong g una, akala ko ay walang nagbabasa sa mga isinusulat ko tungkol sa FAMAS pero mali ako. Naglalakad ako sa Plamondon nang masalubong ko ang isang kilalang miembro ng komunidad.

ANG RETIREMENT AY HINDI KATAPUSAN NG ATING BUHAY KUNDI SIMULA PA LAMANG




Computer Knowledge Test: Battery Life From Computer Geeks Blog

It is far better for battery life to leave your laptop plugged in than to do deep discharges. It is specifically deep discharges that reduce battery life. It seems that this point is often misunderstood. Let me overview the causes of lithium ion batteries to lose their battery life (capacity), and some steps that can be taken to avoid it.

the biggest killer of battery life is high temperature. High temperatures, it doesn't help that laptop batteries are often in the vicinity of the hot underside of the laptop. This kills off batteries like nothing else. So ideally you want to keep the battery cool. This means if you have a laptop that runs very hot, and you are concerned about battery life, the



1. Lithium ion battery lifetimes will reduce as you use it. The deeper you charge/discharge your battery, the more it will reduce. If you made 200 full deep discharges (from 100% to 0%), you will find that your battery now has less battery life than doing 2000 light discharges (100% to 90% for example). For this reason it is far better to leave your laptop plugged in than to do deep discharges, you'll soon find your battery totally worn out if you regularly drain the battery all the way.

However, that's not the only issue at play:

2. Temperature. Probably

two things you can do are: invest in a laptop cooler (though you should also consider the cost of a laptop cooler vs just buying a new battery later on), and disconnecting the battery once it's charged (balanced against the risk of accidentally unplugging the power while the battery is not in).

Finally, a lesser issue:

3. Lithium ion batteries have a limited shelf-life anyway. If you left a lithium-ion battery on the shelf unused, it will deteriorate in battery life anyway. The amount of charge that the battery holds while

it is being stored affects its lifetime, a battery stored at 100% charge ends up with shorter battery life than one stored at 40-50% (the ideal storage charge). So if you are going to leave a laptop for a long time and are worried about battery life, run it down to 40% (and optionally put it in a water-tight bag, in a fridge, not a freezer, a fridge). Technically this does mean actually that it would be better for laptop battery life to keep the battery charge at around 40-50% all the time, but that kind of defeats the purpose of having a laptop battery.

HOWEVER, there may be one situation where you might want to do a full discharge - all laptops have a small circuit that keeps track of the charge level on the battery, called the battery fuel gauge. Measuring the capacity of a battery is not an exact science, so this circuit needs calibration. This is why manufacturers recommend that you should do a full charge and then discharge when you get a new battery or

capacity. Nothing happens if you don't do this, other than an incorrect battery life reading.


After you've used a battery for a long time, particularly if you keep it plugged in all the time, the battery fuel gauge might get a bit "out of sync" with the battery (accumulated measurement errors, change in battery life, etc.) and no longer show a correct battery life reading. Doing a full charge/discharge cycle recalibrates the fuel gauge, allowing it to display a more accurate battery life reading. But this is a purely cosmetic thing - it doesn't do anything for the actual battery life.

Be careful about a lot of the myths about battery care, a lot of them stem from advice given for NiMH/NiCad batteries (which are very rare in laptops these days), many of which either do not apply, or are completely opposite to the recommendations for Lithium ion batteries. ■

EMPANADA

Ingredients
 *Pastry:
 4 cups all-purpose flour (spooned and leveled)
 2 teaspoons baking powder
 1 tablespoon coarse salt
 ¾ cups cold unsalted butter, cubed
 1 + ¼ cups ice water
 Filling:
 8 ounces full fat or light cream cheese
 2 overflowing cups cooked shredded chicken
 ½ cup sour cream
 1 + ½ cups fresh shredded sharp cheddar cheese
 4 ounce can diced jalapenos, drained
 ½ cup corn
 coarse salt and fresh black pepper, to taste
 1 beaten egg
 1 tablespoon milk or water
 Instructions
 Make the pastry:
 In a food processor pulse the flour, baking powder and salt together. Add the butter and pulse until mixture is the texture of coarse meal with a few pea-size pieces butter remaining.
 Add 1 cup ice water to start and pulse until dough is crumbly but holds together when squeezed adding more water 1 tablespoon at a time if needed. Turn dough out onto a lightly floured work surface and knead just until dough comes together about 4 or 5 times. Divide into 3 equal portions, flatten them into disks and wrap in saran wrap. Refrigerate while making the filling.
 Melt the cream cheese in a microwave proof bowl until warm enough to stir about 25 - 50 seconds.
 Add the chicken to a large mixing bowl with the cream cheese, sour cream, cheddar, jalapenos and corn. Mix well and season to taste with salt and pepper. In a small bowl beat the egg and milk together. Fill a separate small bowl with cold water. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper or lightly grease them with oil.
 On a lightly floured work surface roll out one of the disks to about ⅛-inch thick. Cut out 4-inch circles using a biscuit/cookie cutter or a bowl and paring knife. Place about 1 tablespoon of the filling onto each circle.
 Use a pastry brush or your fingers to paint the edges of each circle with water then fold over and press the edges together with the tines of a fork. Refrigerate them for 20 minutes. Repeat until all the filling is used re-rolling scraps of dough if needed.
 Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. Brush the empanadas lightly with the egg mixture and bake 14 - 17 minutes until golden brown and piping hot in the centers. Serve hot or at room temperature.



1 cup coconut milk
 ¼ cup fresh milk
 1 piece salted duck egg, sliced
 ½ cup grated cheese
 3 pieces raw eggs
 Pre-cut banana leaf
 Instructions
 Preheat oven to 375 degrees Fahrenheit. Combine rice flour, baking powder, and salt then mix well. Set aside. Cream butter then gradually put-in sugar while whisking. Add the eggs then whisk until every ingredient is well incorporated. Gradually add the rice flour, salt, and baking powder mixture then continue mixing. Pour-in coconut milk and fresh milk then whisk some more for 1 to 2 minutes. Arrange the pre-cut banana leaf on a cake pan or baking pan. Pour the mixture on the pan. Bake for 15 minutes. Remove from the oven then top with sliced salted egg and grated cheese (do not turn the oven off). Put back in the oven and bake for 15 to 20 minutes or until the color of the top turn medium brown. Remove from the oven and let cool. Brush with butter and sprinkle some sugar on top. You can also top this with grated coconut. Serve. Share and enjoy!1

Pour-in the beef broth; let boil. Cover and reduce the heat to a simmer. Continue to simmer for 20 minutes. Add more water or beef broth if needed. Meanwhile, heat the remaining 2 tablespoons of cooking oil in a pan. Once the oil becomes hot, pan-fry the cubed potatoes for 5 minutes. Add the pan-fried potato on the casserole where the corned beef is cooking. Make sure that the liquid in the cooking pot is almost dry. Stir. Add salt and pepper and cook for 3 minutes more. Transfer to a serving bowl. Sprinkle the chopped parsley on top. Serve for breakfast with toast or steamed rice.





John Lloyd Cruz to newbies: Don't look at me

Many actors want to become John Lloyd Cruz. They admire his pained look when his character breaks down. They adore his naughty smile he flashes at his rom-com leading ladies, Sarah Geronimo among them.

The AshLloyd (Sarah Geronimo-John Lloyd) love team has produced not one, but three hits: "A Very Special Love" (2008), "You Changed My Life" (2009), and "It Takes A Man and A Woman" (2013). So Star Cinema's decision to field their reunion movie, "I Finally Found Someone," starting today, July 26, is not surprising.

What is surprising is John Lloyd's reaction to his growing cult following among newbie actors.

"They shouldn't study my acting," John Lloyd says in Filipino.

Instead, he wants newbies to chart their own path, to discover their own way of playing a role. He calls it "living a life geared towards originality and self expression."

He frowns on copycats because John Lloyd sees them as persons who take shortcuts, who do not want to work harder and dig into their role.

"Having a peg is the easier way," he explains.

If John Lloyd talks this way, it is because he chose to enter by the narrow gate as an actor. He immerses himself into his role and refuses to be distracted before a take. He holes himself up where there is peace and quiet, and emerges from his "hiding place" once he's in the zone and the cameras start to roll.

Then he morphs into a

character he can call his very own, not a duplication of the work of his idols (Daniel Day-Lewis in "Lincoln," Ronnie Lazaro and Irma Adlawan).

John Lloyd's eyes light up and the words come tumbling down like a waterfall when he talks of the joys of discovering his character.

"It's a special journey you can make your own. Living someone else's life is a privilege not all of us enjoys. Can you imagine how beautiful that is? So why mess it up in ways you think are superficial?"



John Lloyd's tone is not holier-than-thou. It is concerned.

He wants actors to savor the joys of expressing themselves as much as he does. He wants them to find their own way, so they will end up, not as another John Lloyd, or any one else but themselves.

"I want to see them dying to be original," he stresses.

Oh yes, John Lloyd adds. Go ahead, watch movies that help you play your character. But you

need not pattern yourself on them.

He cites watching gay-themed movies as preparation for a gay role as an example.

"It's not enough that I watch these movies when I play a role. You have to find its heart," he points out.

John Lloyd prefers to follow his heart, even in real life. He falls in love, speaks in riddles when media grills him about it, and does not mind if they crucify him for it.

His detractors call it refusal to play the game. John Lloyd calls

it protecting his core.

"What you see is what you get. Life is too short. You only live once. I don't want to live a boring life. So I follow my gut instincts."

His steady stream of movies and endorsements prove that the public can deal with his colorful life. After all, what matters more is how John Lloyd makes them laugh, cry and forget their worries as he plays one convincing role after another.

At the end of the day, excellence is the way to go. ■

"Du'n lalabas talaga 'yung glow mo kapag masaya ka sa loob," she related.


Yassi is into traveling describing it as something that feeds her soul.


