

New Pastor Installed at Notre Dame des Philippines Catholic Mission of Montreal

(Montreal, July 9, 2023) Father Jamilcar Rommel T. Cruz, M.S.P., was installed as the new pastor of Notre Dame des Philippines Catholic Mission on July 9, 2023 by Father Pierangelo Paternieri,C.S. Episcopal Vicar, Director, Cultural Communities and Ritual on behalf of His Excellency, Archbishop Christian Lépine of the Archdiocese of Montreal, to replace the late Father Roberto Ruben Elago MSP, who passed away on January 29, 2023.

The Installation Ceremony at Notre Dame des Philippines was concelebrated by Father Francisco Alvarez, PME, the previous pastor for 25 years, in the presence of Filipino devotees and guests.

With humility, Father Cruz accepted the responsibility, cognizant of the enormous responsibility and challenges, and prayed with the faithful for God's blessings, for the intercession of the Blessed Mother and the Filipino martyrs, San Lorenzo Ruiz, and San Pedro Calungsod, for help in the evangelization apostolate.

He will be assisted by an elected administrative team in the management of Notre Dame des

Philippines with the pastoral council in ministering to the spiritual, religious and moral needs of the faith community and with the various committees which admittedly will be a test and a challenge to his

administrative and pastoral experiences from abroad and in the Philippines. The consultations, group meetings and the on-going visits to homes should help create meaningful dialogues toward a harmonious and fruitful ministry.

Notre Dame des Philippines has survived 34 years because of the unwavering support and loyalty of church members, but has also experienced problems with attendance, revenue just like other church institutions because of the pandemic.

The Catholic Mission has always been providentially blessed and served by exemplary pastors. The arrival of Fr. Jamilcar Rommel Cruz, MSP, has sparked interest with his brand of pastoral leadership attuned to the changes in the Catholic Church and by empathizing with the concerns of the faithful.

Metaphorically, Father Cruz will be the biblical Moses to lead the Catholic mission to the "promised land" which is, a successful and fruitful evangelization of peoples (ad gentes) and sanctification of its members.

Past traditions and customs are good, but their observance need to consider the realities of contemporary society whose values tend to be more materialistic and have less regard for spirituality. Many of the liturgical celebrations, namely, long masses,



Climate change is caused mainly by human activity subsequent to the Industrial Revolution, a major part due to fossil fuel use, and secondly due to changes in land use. The effects of changing global climatic conditions on human health are significant, say experts, and the rate of change at present is the fastest it has been in a thousand years.

Global warming refers to the

structured our day-to-day lives around historical and current climate conditions. We are accustomed to a normal range of conditions and may be sensitive to extremes that fall outside of this range.

Climate change could affect our society through impacts on a number of different social, cultural, and natural resources. For example, climate change could affect human health,

warming of surface air and sea surface temperatures worldwide over a period of three decades, due to human activity. Scientists say the earth's mean surface temperature will rise by $1.5 \,^{\circ}$ C above pre-industrial levels, at the current rate of 0.2°C per decade. Such an increase has already been observed in many regions, housing up to 40% of the global population, in one or more seasons.

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) shows that the effects include rising temperatures, altered patterns of rainfall, a greater number of more severe extreme weather events, altered vector and pest habitat ranges, increased spread of vector-borne diseases, and a rise in the sea level as well as coastal erosion. In response to these changes, there will be changes in the pattern of food and water availability, the air quality will change, heat-related complications and deaths will occur, as well as disease and death due to malnutrition and malaria.

As a society, we have

infrastructure, and transportation systems, as well as energy, food, and water supplies.

Some groups of people will likely face greater challenges than others. Climate change may especially impact people who live in areas that are vulnerable to coastal storms, drought, and sea level rise or people who live in poverty, older adults, and immigrant communities. Similarly, some types of professions and industries may face considerable challenges from climate change. Professions that are closely linked to weather and climate, such as outdoor tourism, commerce, and agriculture, will likely be especially affected.

The greatest impact will be on those who are least responsible for this change, that is, people living in developing countries, though highincome countries are also at significant risk for poor health. These are also those with the least reserve, unable to prevent their slide into deeper poverty. References: EPA, Nature Conservancy

Injured road worker speaks out about hit-and-run that killed his colleague

One of the road workers injured in a hit-and-run at a Montreal construction site last week says he's had enough.

Fabrizio Altieri, 39, wants drivers to know how dangerous it is when they try to cut corners around work sites.

"I understand the frustration of anyone that is driving who finds the street blocked so you cannot go where you have to go. But I would love to make everybody understand that we are working, we are not playing," he told CTV News nearly a week after the incident, still recovering from the event.

Altieri reports he suffered a concussion and bruising on his upper body -- but his coworker, also a 39year-old flagman, was much more severely injured, dying of his injuries in hospital on Monday. DRIVER TURNS HIMSELF IN

Last Wednesday night, Altieri and his coworker were installing traffic cones at a paving site near Industriel and Saint-Jean-Baptiste Boulevards in the Pointe-Aux-Trembles borough.

Altieri says a driver tried cutting through the closed street, and when they tried stopping the car, it

Construction work stops July 21 to August 6, 2023

Quebec's "construction holiday" kicks off Friday, the most popular time for summer vacations in the province. In 1970, Quebec legislated an annual holiday for the construction industry that begins on the second to last Sunday of July and lasts two weeks.

The holiday officially came into effect in the summer of 1971.

Many Quebecers outside the construction industry also take their holidays during this time.

It's also one of the deadliest times for road accidents and fatalities when it comes to waterways in the province.

"The Sûreté du Québec (SQ) would like to encourage all users of the road and recreational tourism networks to be careful," said provincial police in a press release.

Judging is done online. Qualified nominations are allocated to the panel of judges to review and judge according to a defined set of criterias and its weighted percentage. The judging portal is a web-based tool with embedded scoring and judging algorithm that allows judges to navigate and perform their judging/scoring tasks.

There is a panel of judges who reviews qualified nominations. The panel consists of previous winners and/or respected individuals, community leaders, professionals, etc. The panel of judges are presented to the public during the Awards Night.

Judging is done online. Qualified nominations are allocated to the panel of judges to review and judge according to a defined set of criterias and its weighted percentage. The judging portal is a web-based tool with embedded scoring and judging algorithm that allows judges to navigate and perform their judging/scoring tasks.

A detailed judging report is generated by the system. It is then validated by an affiliated accounting group, AFCA (Association of Filipino Canadian Accountants).

Nomination Categories

1) Educational Excellence Award (Secondary)

This award recognizes a high school student who has showcased

exceptional academic achievement, extra-curricular involvement and a significant contribution to his/her community.

2) Educational Excellence Award (Post-Secondary)

This award recognizes a postsecondary student who has showcased exceptional academic achievement, extra-curricular involvement and a significant contribution to his/her community.

3) Educator of the Year Award

This award recognizes an exceptionally dedicated, knowledgeable, skilled and active educator in any Canadian province for his/her remarkable achievements and commitment to inspiring and engaging students in order to help them achieve their full academic and social potential; and, made significant contribution to the local community beyond the classroom. 4) Young Leader of the Year Award

This award recognizes a youth leader, below 30 years of age, who inspires the youth to promote just, peaceful and inclusive society; and, exemplifies the integrity and commitment towards improving the lives of others.

5) Young Entrepreneur of the Year Award

This award is given to the founder and/or owner of a small to medium business that is in operation for at least two (2) years. Must be below 30 years old. The awardee should exemplify solid financial performance, excellent leadership, personal integrity and influence, innovative and demonstrate entrepreneurial spirit.

6)Entrepreneur of the Year Award

This award is given to the founder and/or owner of a small to medium business that is in operation for at least two (2) years. Must be 30 years of age or older. The awardee should exemplify solid financial performance, excellent leadership, personal integrity and influence, innovative and demonstrate entrepreneurial spirit. 7) Executive of the Year Award

This award recognizes the outstanding achievements and exemplary contribution of a full-time

exemplary contribution of a full-time senior/management employee to his/her company and the Canadian community and has demonstrated exemplary courage, leadership, vision and innovativeness.

8) Business Excellence Award

This award is given to a Filipino-Canadian company whose significant business achievements have made an important contribution to the economic and social well-being of Canada. 9) Manggagawang Pilipino of the Year Award

This award recognizes an individual who has made an outstanding impact to his/her place of work and the community; inspired other people; earned the respect, trust and confidence of his or her employer, superior(s) and co-worker(s); and, has proven his/her competence by being promoted in status or in rank, or awarded citation or recognition for distinguished and outstanding performance of his or her work duties and responsibilities, which in turn contributed to the growth or wellbeing of the work environment. 10) Excellence Award in Arts & Culture

This award recognizes an

individual who has demonstrated exemplary achievement in the promotion, understanding and acceptance of the Filipino arts & culture in their community, and whose work has made a significant impact and inspired the community.

11) Excellence Award in Sports & Fitness

This award recognizes an individual who has demonstrated exemplary contribution and dedication for the betterment of a sport or a fitness activity, and whose work has touched and enriched the lives of others. 12) Excellence Award in Media

This award recognizes an individual who has demonstrated

outstanding achievements in the field of mass media; continues to demonstrate an ongoing commitment to pursuing excellence; and, whose work has made a significant impact and inspired the community.

13) Excellence Award in Music & Entertainment

This award recognizes the performing artist who displayed an impressive competence in various aspects of the entertainment field and has demonstrated an ongoing commitment to pursuing excellence. Consideration is given to recorded and live performance, public acceptance, attitude, leadership, and over-all contribution to the entertainment industry within and/or beyond the Filipino Canadian community.

14) Senior Achievement Award

This award recognizes a citizen, 60 years of age and above, who has made an outstanding contribution to his/her community by making their community a better place to live. He/she must not hold a political office and achievements must not be related to a political service.

This award recognizes an individual who is making a significant contribution to their community through their time, actions, talents and dedication in their volunteer activities; demonstrates qualities of compassion, and service to either one organization or a variety of volunteer activities; and serves as a role model for compassion, dedication and service.

17) Pinoy of the Year Award

This award recognizes a Filipino Canadian who has made the most significant impact to the community through his/her contribution in his/her chosen field of endeavor. 18)Golden Balangay Lifetime Achievement Award

Storm and tornado warnings aftermath

As fears of a tornado in the Montreal area subsided Thursday afternoon and the dramatic rainfall abated, the city began wading through some of its aftermath, with flooded homes and underpasses, and closed roads.

closed several roadways in Montreal, firefighters were deployed to pump including a portion of Highway 15 - a water out from some homes and busy downtown expressway also known buildings. as the Décarie - at the height of Jean-Talon Street.

Residents watched, some through their car windshields, as walls of

Environment and Climate Change Canada reported that between 50 and 100 millimetres of rain fell over the city in the space of a couple hours, calling it a torrential downpour in an assessment of the storm published after 7 p.m.

While Mirabel was confirmed to have experienced a tornado and the federal agency said a funnel cloud was reported in Vaudreuil-Dorion, the city appears to have been spared.

Montreal Mayor Valérie Plante acknowledged the storm's intensity, saying city crews were working to make sure roads are safe and responding to requests for help.

"Montreal faced another difficult climatic episode," Plante wrote in a statement on Twitter in the evening. "There are significant accumulations of water in certain streets and arteries, as well as in Metro stations."

She encouraged residents to call 311 to report issues and to contact 911 in case of emergency.

The heavy rainfall lasted throughout rush hour and flooding ominous clouds obscured the evening sun over the city. Then, the rain hit -hard, lasting more than an hour with episodes of lightning and loud thunder.

Water accumulated in underpasses, such as the one on Highway 40 service road near l'Acadie Boulevard, where cars could be seen driving through a pool nearly covering their tires.

At about 7:15 p.m., Transports Québec tweeted that Highway 20 at Angrignon was closed in both directions because of flooding.

The Centre-Sud neighbourhood was especially affected by flooding, Plante wrote, noting "municipal emergency facilities will be open and ready to welcome you in the neighbourhood if you need them."

Philippe Sabourin, a city spokesperson, told CBC News six underpasses were closed at around 6:30 p.m. due to flooding, most of them in central Montreal.

He said the city has received for help from residents calls experiencing flooding and that

Confusion in applying the provisions of Bill 96 related to health care

A Montreal woman is speaking out about her recent experience with Quebec's health insurance board after she said a public servant hung up on her because she spoke to him in English.

"I was so angry. So humiliated, frustrated and angry that it took me a couple of days to digest it," said 75-yearold Susan Starkey, who believes Quebec's new language law, Bill 96, is the reason why he ended the call.

Starkey spoke to CTV News on the condition of using her maiden name to protect her husband's privacy.

Her 82-year-old husband has had several health complications in recent years and now must use a feeding tube connected to his stomach.

When she called the Régie de l'assurance maladie du Québec (RAMQ) in early July she was inquiring about the ISO-Pro formula, her spouse's only source of nourishment.

> When she called RAMQ to

inquire, she said the person who answered the phone refused to help her.

"He told me to speak French, and I said, 'I'm sorry, my French isn't good enough for you to understand [me] or for me to understand you because this is complicated.' And he said, 'I don't have to speak to you in English.' I said, 'I'm afraid I can't do it in French,' and he said, 'Go and find somebody," she recalled, adding that she told him there was no one around who could do so.

"I understood from the CAQ that in situations to do with hospitalization or illness or whatever, we were allowed to be served in English. At that point, I said, 'If you can't talk to me, can you put me onto somebody who can speak English?' And he hung up on me."

The storm also caused some sewers to overflow. Last year, the city said it would be investing \$300 million over the next decade to build infrastructure capable of draining water and redirecting it from its sewers.

"No city in the world has the infrastructure to handle that much rain," he said.

The city says it wants to create more green spaces that can act as sponges, so water gets absorbed into the ground rather than drained into sewers during rain deluges.

Sabourin said the city typically gets 90 millimetres of rain in July meaning Montreal received almost as much rain it usually sees in July in the span of two hours. The city's sewers simply don't have the capacity to hold that much water, he said, explaining the floods. The area south of the downtown core was most affected.

About 130 homes were flooded, and the city's 311 line received over 1,300 calls. About 300 trees and branches fell, and blue collar workers will be on cleanup duty Friday, said Sabourin.

"We have enough manpower today, it's nothing compared to the ice storm we saw in April," he said.

Sabourin says it's important to follow Environment Canada warnings,

especially as intense weather events become more common due to climate change. He stresses homeowners should ensure their check valves, which help water flow, are in working order.

Over 200,000 Hydro-Québec customers were still without power as of 7 a.m. Friday, including a trade school, the Gordon Robertson Beauty Academy, in Beaconsfield, Que., which had to close for the day. As of 6 p.m., about 45,000 customers were still without power.

In the hours leading up to the storm, half a million Hydro-Québec customers across the province lost power as forest fires in the James Bay region triggered grid protection mechanisms. Just as power was beginning to be restored, the numbers shot up again as the storm swept through.

Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC) said the storm front that hit the Montreal area on Thursday afternoon caused two tornadoes to touch down - one in Ottawa and one in Mirabel, Que. - as torrential rains fell and strong winds blew.

Though the tornado in Ottawa damaged 125 homes, Mirabel was left without damage.

Ontario family offering two years' rent in advance, can't find a home in the GTA

rental home in Aurora, Ont., the Eliesen family have been struggling for months to find a new place to live in the town. Their offer of two years' rent up front, or "nearly \$100,000 cash," according to David Eliesen, has been declined multiple times.

"(We) put in an offer of \$200 a month over the asking price," David's wife, Kayla, told CTV National News. On top of that, they've tried offering other deal-sweeteners, such as \$2000 damage deposits, but nothing seems to be working. Each of their multiple offers to rent a family home in the area north of Toronto have been declined.

In June, thanks in part to the recent surge in immigration, the country's population surpassed 40 million. While a growing population is being touted as essential to Canada's economy, real estate experts believe

Forced to move out of their the country has forgotten an important piece of the equation.

> "Government really should have tried to solve how to build more homes first before increasing our population growth, because the side effect of that is skyrocketing home prices," John Pasalis, president of Realosophy Realty, told CTV National News.

> When it comes to housing affordability in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA) and the rest of the country, Pasalis believes "the weight of this crisis quite frankly is felt by renters, because they're seeing their rents surge and they're not benefiting the way home owners are from rising home prices."

The Eliesen family have lived in the same home for the last eight vears, but their landlord has family immigrating to Canada from Ukraine,



and now the landlord needs to move into the home.

Seizing the economic opportunities of the future is a focus for all Premiers. This includes supporting environmental stewardship along with economic growth and competitiveness to sustainably build the economy now, and for the next generations.

Key priorities discussed today by Premiers include: • competitiveness, Canada-United States relations and trade;

strategic infrastructure;

•energy security and critical minerals; and sustainable development and climate action.

Premiers are addressing these issues in cooperation with key partners. Premiers call upon the Prime Minister to convene a First Ministers' Meeting dedicated to the linked priorities of competitiveness and strategic infrastructure.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Nova Scotia Premier Tim Houston assumed the Chair of the Council of the Federation. Nova Scotia will host the summer meeting of Canada's Premiers on July 15–17, 2024. Competitiveness Strategic and Infrastructure

Premiers recognize that strong, integrated supply chains are the best way to enhance competitiveness across North America. Provinces and territories remain concerned about trade-limiting actions in the United States. Premiers discussed ongoing concerns with unwarranted duties on Canadian softwood lumber exports to the United States, and the need to resolve this longstanding dispute, as well as concerns regarding the expansion of protectionist Buy America provisions in all forms.

Premiers also discussed the urgent need to boost productivity and competitiveness, and develop policies that support business investment to encourage economic growth across Canada.

Provinces and territories are investing in strategic infrastructure to power economic development, facilitate market access for goods and resources, maintain secure and efficient supply chains, connect Canadians to the digital economy, build strong communities, and support climate-resilience.

Premiers reiterated their call on the federal government to adhere to the following principles for the next phase of federal infrastructure funding to best serve people and communities across our diverse country:





• Make the dough by combining the dry ingredients in a mixing bowl starting with the all-purpose flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt. Mix well using a wire whisk.

• Cut the butter into small thin pieces place in the mixing bowl with the dry ingredients.(the butter should be cold and solid before doing this) •Add water gradually and mix all the ingredients thoroughly until a dough is

formed. You may use a pastry blender to ease the process. • Divide the dough into individual

pieces by grabbing a piece from the whole mixture and rolling it in your hand until a spherical shape is formed. Do this until all the dough is consumed. Set aside in a cool place for at least 20 minutes

• Flatten the spherical dough by pressing it with your palm against a flat surface. Use a rolling pin to flatten it fully while creating a round shape. Arrange about a quarter to half a cup of filling (the chicken that you cooked in the first few steps) at the middle of the flattened dough. Fold the dough so that opposite ends meet (you should have formed a half moon shaped dough)then press the edges and seal. (refer to the video for the technique)

•After all the fillings are consumed, crack the egg and separate the white from the yolk. Beat the egg white lightly and mix a little water.Glaze the crust by brushing the egg wash. • Put a wax paper on top of a baking tray or grease the baking tray then arranged the sealed doughs.

 Pre-heat oven at 400 degrees Fahrenheit for 10 minutes. Bake the

sealed doughs for 25 minutes at the same temperature. Remove from the oven.





New book explains how human brains are predisposed to believe conspiracy theories and political lies

CTVNews.ca Writer A new book explores how human brains are predisposed to believe conspiracy theories and political lies.

"I studied the words of big liars throughout contemporary history, from Hitler to Trump and found common patterns," University of Toronto linguist Marcel Danesi told CTVNews.ca. "As Cicero and other ancient rhetoricians knew, who controls the language controls thought."

In his new book Politics, Lies and Conspiracy Theories: A Cognitive Linguistic Perspective, Danesi dissects the speech of prominent liars, dictators and hate groups and finds common threads, like the use of visually evocative and dehumanizing metaphors.

"Using such coded language reinforces the mind control that autocrats aim to exercise," Danesi said. "Calling a group 'dogs' or 'parasites,' over and over, eventually becomes accepted as true."Danesi points to the Nazi regime, which described its targets as "pests" and "parasites" – terms that have been echoed more recently by white supremacists in the U.S. and

"Research shows that central metaphors 'switch on' existing circuits in the brain by linking together images and ideas, as for example linking a certain group to pests," the semiotics and linguistic anthropology professor explained. "The more these circuits are activated the more hardwired they become."

Danesi says our brains appear to be "predisposed" to these kind of thought formulas, which also allow us to accept conspiracy theories.

"When we are exposed to systemic lies, such as those of dictators and mind manipulators, repeated over and over, the brain seems to create a false memory code for them," Danesi said. "Conspiracy theories resist counter-argumentation because they cannot be disproved only believed or disbelieved."

Another common thread

between the "big liars" Danesi studied was the belief that a "deep state" or "cabal" secretly controls the world. Once someone is deeply entrenched in a conspiracy theory like this, Danesi notes they will often twist contradictory evidence to fit their own beliefs. A government denial, for example, could be seen as evidence of a cover-up.

"People will seek out information that confirms their own attitudes and views of the world, or else reinforces aspects of conditioned behavior, avoiding information that is likely to be in conflict with their worldview," Danesi added. "For this reason, it is unlikely that people with strong convictions will ever change their mind about anything."

With the internet-fuelled rise in disinformation and extremist vitriol, Danesi says it's important to remember how this kind of rhetoric can result in instability and violence.

"The believability of a conspiracy theory is reinforced by what psychologists call apophenia, defined as the proclivity to perceive meaningful connections among unrelated things," Danesi said. "History shows that violence against others is often related to the power of this effect."

James Cameron calls Titan sub tragedy 'extreme outlier' after half-century of safe dives

James Cameron described the Titan submersible tragedy as an "extreme outlier" after more than 50 years of safe deep sea exploration.

"I think it's really important for people to remember that we have over a half-century of a perfect safety record," the Canadian filmmaker and explorer told reporters in Ottawa on Tuesday ahead of a CTV News worldwide exclusive event. "This is an extreme outlier of a data point that that in a sense proves the rule, and the rule is we've been safe for half a century... Half a century is a long time to not have killed anybody."

Cameron was in Ottawa to launch a Canadian Geographic exhibit about his feats of deep-sea exploration, which have included 33 dives to the Titanic wreck on three expeditions. The first involved shooting footage for his Oscar-winning 1997 film about the infamous ship, which sunk in 1912.

"I wasn't worried about the engineering," Cameron said of his undersea expeditions. "I certainly wasn't worried about imploding because we had tested everything. That's how it should be."

Cameron says he uses the safety testing at NASA as his model.

"NASA knows how to manage risk, and they also know that there will be failures," Cameron explained. "It's our responsibility as engineers to test, test, test: don't just guess that it's going to work. The ocean is a very, very unforgiving environment."

Operated by OceanGate, the Titan submersible lost contact with the surface less than two hours after it plunged into the ocean on the morning of June 18. Following an international air and sea search effort, the sub's imploded remnants were discovered near the Titanic on June 22 by a remotely operated underwater vehicle. Experts say the Titan's experimental design and carbon-fibre hull made it unable to withstand the immense pressure of the deep ocean where the Titanic rests at 3,800 metres below sea level. All five people aboard the Titan were killed in the "catastrophic implosion," including French explorer and Titanic expert Paul-Henri "P.H." Nargeolet, who Cameron described as a "good friend" and a "legendary submersible pilot."

Cameron said news of the deep-sea disaster was like a "gut punch."

"You don't expect it because you don't expect an implosion to happen, because that's what you spend all your time and all your finite element analysis and your computer simulations and everything else to prevent," Cameron recalled. "But they obviously didn't do that. They didn't approach it with that same rigour and discipline, unfortunately."

While Cameron expects the Titan tragedy will result in new regulatory efforts, he hopes they treat deep-sea submersibles like other passenger vessels.

"People could easily go out and spend more sitting around talking about a bunch of rules that we don't need, spend more money doing that than we actually have as funding to explore the deep ocean," he said. "This is not the most dangerous thing for the human race to be worried about right now."

The incident also hasn't dampened Cameron's passion for exploration, which has seen him pilot a submersible to Challenger Deep, the deepest known point on earth at nearly 11,000 metres.

"Curiosity is not a bucket list: you're born with it, I had it as a little kid," Cameron said. "I think it's absolutely critical for explorers to be the sort of tip of the spear for all of humanity, and to bring that singular experience back and share it the best way they know how... Otherwise, send a robot."#

Russia comes under pressure at UN to avoid global food crisis and revive Ukrainian grain shipments

UNITED NATIONS - Russia came under pressure at the UN Security Council on Friday from its ally China and developing countries as well as Western nations to avert a global food crisis and quickly revive Ukrainian grain already led to a rise in wheat prices.

Gabon's U.N. Ambassador Michel Biang said the grain deal had avoided a spark in grain prices and calmed the risk of food insecurity in the drought-affected Horn of Africa and other regions. He urged talks "to break the current deadlock" and avoid a

shipments.

Moscow was also criticized by the UN and council members for attacking Ukrainian ports after pulling out of the year-old grain deal and destroying port infrastructure -- a violation of international humanitarian law banning attacks on civilian infrastructure.

In response to Russia declaring wide areas in the Black Sea dangerous for shipping, the U.N. warned that a military incident in the sea could have "catastrophic consequences."

Russia said it suspended the Black Sea Grain Initiative because the U.N. had failed to overcome obstacles to shipping its food and fertilizer to global markets, the other half of the Ukraine grain deal. The Kremlin said it would consider resuming Ukrainian shipments if progress is made in overcoming the obstacles, including in banking arrangements.

China's deputy U.N. ambassador Geng Shuang noted U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres' commitment to make every effort to ensure that both Ukrainian grain and Russian food and fertilizer get to world markets. He expressed hope that Russia and the U.N. will work together to resume exports from both countries "at an early date" in the interest of "maintaining international food security and alleviating the food crisis in developing countries in particular."

U.S. Ambassador Linda Thomas-Greenfield accused Russia of using the Black Sea as "blackmail" and playing political games, pointing to Moscow's export of more grain than ever before at higher prices. She called on the Security Council and all 193 U.N. member nations to come together and urge Russia to resume negotiations in good faith.

Several developing countries warned of the impact of the cutoff in Ukrainian grain shipments, which has

humanitarian crisis.

Mozambique's U.N. Ambassador Pedro Afonso said Russia's action is certain "to amplify global socioeconomic stresses in a world already grappling with a perfect storm of conflict, climate change" and a loss of confidence in multilateral solutions.

Russia's deputy U.N. ambassador Dmitry Polyansky said Russia stands ready to consider rejoining the deal if seven principles from the Russia-U.N. memorandum are implemented. He listed them as "the real not theoretical" lifting of Western sanctions on Russian grain and fertilizer exports, and the lifting of obstacles to Russian banks that service exports, including the immediate connection to the SWIFT global banking system.

Russia also wants the delivery of spare parts for agricultural production to resume, a resolution to issues related to chartering vessels for Russian exports including insurance, the war-damaged ammonia pipeline from Russia to Ukraine to be fixed and other fertilizer issues resolved, Russian assets linked to agricultural production unfrozen, and "the resumption of the initial humanitarian nature of the grain deal," he said.

Under the deal, Ukraine was given a green light to ship grain from three Black Sea ports, but following Monday's withdrawal Russia said it will consider a ship traveling to Ukrainian ports as being laden with weapons and will treat the country of its flag as a participant in the conflict on Kyiv's side. Ukraine announced that it will also treat ships traveling to Russian Black Sea ports as military targets.

Thomas-Greenfield told the council the United States has information that Russia laid additional sea mines in the approaches to Ukrainian ports and that Russia's military may attack civilian shipping in the Black Sea "and lay blame on Ukraine for these

U.N. political chief Rosemary DiCarlo strongly condemned Russian attacks on Ukraine's Black Sea ports and urged Moscow to stop them immediately. She said threats to target civilian vessels "are unacceptable" and warned that sea mines can endanger civilian navigation.

"We strongly urge restraint from any further rhetoric or action that could deteriorate the already dangerous situation," she said. "Any risk of conflict spillover as a result of a military incident in the Black Sea -- whether intentional or by accident -- must be avoided at all costs, as this could result in potentially catastrophic consequences to us all."

China's Geng called on the parties "to remain calm and exercise restraint," abide by international humanitarian law and refrain from attacking civilian infrastructure, "and make every effort to curb the expansion of the conflict to prevent a larger scale

able to handle the rent increase, but many landlords want a tenant whose monthly salary is triple the monthly rent. The Eliesens don't earn more than \$12,000 a month, so to put potential landlords at ease, a wealthy family member is co-signing their rental applications, and even that appears to be insufficient.

"We still can't get a home," notes the worried mother. The family is now considering moving to Atlanta where they have additional family and where homes are comparatively much more affordable.

Kayla says she never thought a lack of housing would lead them to feel "forced to move (out of the country), we always thought it would be by our own choice."

According to Pasalis, "Landlords can sit back and wait because they're getting multiple applications."

The Eilesens aren't the only family being squeezed out of a hypercompetitive housing market. According to market research firm Urbanation, rental costs for GTA condos continue to climb and are at an average of about \$2,800 a month— a nearly 32 per cent

•minimize administrative redundancies, duplicative processes related to governance, and red tape related to approvals, claims and reporting; and

The most effective way to achieve these goals is through block infrastructure transfers, which will allow provinces and territories to make efficient and strategic use of funding and create opportunities for long-term capital planning to build the infrastructure that Canada needs.
