Carney calls snap elections for a strong mandate on April 28, leads current polls


Montreal, March 23, 2024 -Marc Carney asked the Governor General to dissolve parliament during a meeting at 12:00 noon today. After this meeting, reporters waiting outside the Governor-General's mansion listened to his speech in which he outlined his main objectives to develop a strong, unified Canadian economy by Canada Day. He asked to have a strong mandate to enable him to do the job: "I'm asking Canadians for a strong. positive mandate to deal with President [Donald] Trump and to build a new Canadian economy that works for everyone because I know we need change," Carney said on Sunday of the ongoing trade war with the United States.

The election will be held on April 28 and will see Carney face off against his main rival, the Conservative Party leader Pierre Poilievre.

Carney assumed his role as Liberal leader and prime minister after his predecessor, Justin Trudeau, announced his resignation in January amid a polling slump and an internal revolt in his cabinet.

For months, polls indicated that the Conservatives had a strong lead in the election. The Liberal Party has since seen a surge in popularity following a trade war with the US and Trump's threat to Canada's sovereignty.

"We are facing the most significant crisis of our lifetimes because of President Trump's

unjustified trade actions and his threats to our sovereignty," Carney said Sunday. "Our response must be to build a strong economy and a more secure Canada."

He added: "President Trump claims that Canada isn't a real country. He wants to break us so America can own us. We will not let that happen."

The Conservative leader Poilievre, who launched his campaign for the premiership on Sunday with a "Canada First" message, repeatedly portrayed Carney as a leader ill-equipped to deal with Trump.

During a press conference ahead of Carney announcing the poll, Poilievre said: "Today, the Liberals are asking for a fourth term in power after swapping Justin Trudeau for his economic adviser and handpicked successor, Mark Carney."

When asked how he would handle his relationship with Trump, Poilievre said he would insist the "independence and sovereignty of Canada" was recognized and "I will strengthen our country so that we can be capable of standing on our own two feet and standing up to the Americans where and when necessary."

Carney, in turn, has accused Poilievre of following Trump's lead in suggesting Canada should cut its foreign aid budget. On Sunday, the prime minister suggested that Canada's Conservatives mirror the Trump administration in "language" and "intent."

Carney was sworn in as

Canada's prime minister in March and was expected to call the election as he sought a mandate. Carney, who is the former governor of the Bank of Canada and the Bank of England, has emphasized his financial background as the future of the Canadian economy looks uncertain.

During his address in Ottawa, the Liberal leader outlined his vision to reposition the Canadian economy. He said that after meeting with Canada's provincial ministers on Friday, a "consensus" was reached to remove trade barriers within the country and unify the Canadian economy. He also promised to introduce a middle-class tax cut that he said would benefit dualincome families.

Canada would continue to diversify its trade partners and lessen its reliance on the United States, he said. Carney also emphasized the need to "act dramatically and act rapidly to build an economy that's strong for Canada" and "control what we can control."

Marc Carney, after winning the Liberal Party leadership with a huge vote of 85.9% on March 9th was inducted as the 24th prime minister of Canada on Friday afternoon, March 14th in Ottawa. Since that time, he has been busy engaging in important meetings with the premiers, making his first foreign trip to France and the U.K. and holding several press conferences

11 at Manila airport on the orders of Marcos Jr and turned over to the ICC. The Philippines, which the former president withdrew from membership of The Hague-based court in 2019, said the move was in compliance with a request made by Interpol.

Supporters of Duterte have staged a series of protests across the country, calling for his release and return to the country.

Throughout the infighting, Senator Imee Marcos has tracked a course largely independent of her brother, although she is running for reelection under the administration ticket for the midterm elections.

Hours after the arrest, she had challenged the wisdom of the arrest of "poor President Duterte", warning, "This can only lead to trouble."

Members of the Duterte family had threatened in recent months to withhold their support for her reelection, and polls currently suggest she could lose her Senate seat in the voting on May 12.

On 14 March 2025, Rodrigo Roa Duterte appeared before Pre-Trial Chamber of the International Criminal

Duterte was arrested on March Court. Mr Duterte is suspected of the crime against humanity of murder, allegedly committed in the Republic of the Philippines between 1 November 2011 and 16 March 2019.

> The Chamber verified the identity of the suspect and ensured that he was clearly informed of the crimes he is alleged to have committed and of his rights under the Rome Statute of the ICC in a language he fully understands and speaks. The hearing was held in the presence of the ICC Prosecutor and the Defence. Mr Duterte was represented during the hearing by Mr Salvador C. Medialdea, and assisted by the Office of Public Counsel for the Defence.

> The Chamber provisionally scheduled the confirmation of charges hearing to begin on 23 September 2025. The purpose of the confirmation of charges procedure is to determine whether there is sufficient evidence to establish substantial grounds to believe that the person committed the crimes he or she is suspected of. If the charges are confirmed, totally or partly, the case will be transferred to a Trial Chamber, which will conduct the subsequent phase of the proceedings:



Duterte's confirmation of charges is set for September 23, 2025.

Historical patterns suggest that if his case follows similar timelines, and if the judges decide to commit the case to trial, then he may face a wait of 10 months to over a year before trial proceedings begin right after the chamber's decision.

In a news article published March 24 in the Panay News, a lawyer Nicholas Kaufman, was interviewed by the local media over the weekend,

stated that they are doing all means to bring the former Chief Executive back to the Philippines before or after the May 2025 midterm elections.

"Why not? That's his country. That was where he was born. Why should he not go back?" Kaufman said. "As far as I'm concerned, he's being illegally detained here, and he should go back to The Philippines as soon as possible."

Marcos may visit Trump in first half of 2025

President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. may visit the White House to meet with US President Donald Trump in the next couple of months following twin visits by two top US officials to the Philippines, the Philippine Ambassador to the US said Monday.

Philippine Ambassador Jose Manuel Romualdez said Marcos' visit may be scheduled after US Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth's visit to the Philippines on March 28-29 where he is set to meet President Marcos and Defense Secretary Gilbert Teodoro.

The US Department of Defense earlier said Hegseth "will travel to the Philippines to advance security objectives with Philippine leaders and meet with U.S. and Philippine forces." US Secretary of State Marco Rubio is also set to visit the Philippines sometime in April, Romualdez said.

"Most likely after these visits of

these 2 officials from the United States, malalaman natin ang exact timing ng President Marcos' visit to the United States. Sinabi naman sa amin ng White House na definitely we will invite the President to come," the ambassador said in a TeleRadyo Serbisyo interview.

Romualdez added President Trump is still in the thick of ongoing negotiations for a truce between Russia and Ukraine.

"Wala pa siła sa Southeast, South Asian countries. Hopefully, [the visit will be] within the first half," he said.

Marcos earlier congratulated Trump on taking office, saying he looked forward to "working closely" with the new US administration. "Congratulations to POTUS @realdonaldtrump and to the American people on another peaceful transfer of power in their Nation's nearly 250-year history. I look forward to working closely with you and your

The impact of Duterte's arrest on Philippine politics and ICC's role in international law

Duterte's arrest is expected to exacerbate political discord among Filipinos. His influential allies in government and loyal supporters are crying political persecution.

Meanwhile, human rights groups and the victims' families of extrajudicial killings view the arrest as a moral vindication. Some regard Duterte's downfall as the start of the end of a political dynasty, while others may exploit the incident with mass protests. With the impeachment case against Sara Duterte closing in and the 2025 midterm elections due in May, the Dutertes might rally around the arrest in a bid to gain public sympathy with the goal of regaining political power to avenge their patriarch.

How Duterte's ICC trial will unfold remains unclear. The burden is on the international court to show how it will handle the case amid global criticism about the slow pace of proceedings and low conviction rate. The pressure is also on the Marcos administration as to how it will manage the political backlash from Duterte's supporters.

Regardless, Duterte's trial will be an unexpected blessing for victims and human rights groups that have long clamoured for accountability and justice - something that local courts have failed to provide given a track record of acquitting or favouring powerful political personalities in the face of evidence of their corruption and abuses. According to Kristina Conti, ICC Assistant to Counsel, "the arrest of Duterte will finally allow the victims of [the] drug war and Duterte to face off on equal footing". His

arrest on Philippine soil and extradition to the Hague also offers a ray of hope for justice for millions around the world who suffer from the intimidation and apparent impunity of strong-man leaders.

Reaction to the arrest in the Philippines is highly polarized. For the families and friends of the victims, who have long strived for justice, the arrest brought some relief. Prominent activists, including Nobel Prize winner Maria Ressa, celebrated the move as a historic moment in an "age of impunity." But supporters of Rodrigo Duterte have come out to protest and hold prayer rallies in various parts of Metro Manila, Mindanao and the Visayas. These mobilizations and outcry of support for Duterte are persistent with his public popularity even during his murderous war on drugs campaign. It is worth recalling that despite his murderous track record, Rodrigo Duterte ended his presidency with a nationwide approval rating of 80 percent. Now, his daughter, Vice President Sara Duterte, remains popular with satisfaction ratings that are close, or at times slightly better, than Marcos Jr.'s approval ratings. Duterte's youngest daughter, Veronica Duterte, is a social media influencer. She features prominently in videos and pictures taken of her father when Duterte was arrested by the ICC. The videos are seen through the lens of a family protecting an ailing and elderly father. An idealization and victimization that resonates with Filipinos, perhaps more so than the international accountability mechanisms and procedures.

Duterte's arrest and extradition

to The Hague could draw new supporters for Marcos Jr. from progressive circles, but it could also consolidate support for the Dutertes and the political families who support them. For certain, Marcos Jr.'s camp accounted for the political blowback that comes with cooperating with INTERPOL and the ICC. It is too soon to say to what extent Marcos Jr. might benefit from this political strategy. It remains to be seen if there will be more coordinated and wellattended mobilization efforts, both offline and online, in the coming days leading to the pre-trial of Duterte. Marcos Jr. and his allies cannot underestimate how victimization. forgetting, and memorializing are shaped in the digital space. The Marcos family, after all, benefited from a similar dynamic and managed to return to the highest public office after thirty-six years in exile. Some will argue that the pro-Duterte voices in social media are paid trolls or come from organized troll farms. Since the arrest of Duterte, fake news has proliferated online and the social media account of ICC pre-trial judge Iulia Motoc has been a target of pro-Duterte supporters. The "architects of disinformation" in the Philippines, who influenced the outcomes of the 2016 and 2022 national elections, are a force that can influence the electorate in the coming elections and should be taken seriously.

The Marcos family knows what it means to rise from the ashes. The Marcos' return to politics shows that Filipino voters can forget human rights abuses; and that loyal supporters of powerful dynasties never go away. They can bring back even the most discredited politicians to power. The Marcos family cannot discount the fact that this formula can work for another political family. This time, their rivals, the Dutertes.

There is no doubt that Duterte's arrest has brought a sense of optimism for victims of his extrajudicial killings that they will finally get justice at The Hague. But within the Philippines, justice for past atrocities remains elusive, especially when the accused hold powerful positions and the institutions of accountability remain weak.

The ICC relies on state cooperation from the country where the accused individual is located in order to carry out its mandate. Without cooperation, the international court cannot enforce its arrest warrants, effectively leaving it powerless. Yet, as recently as a few months ago, President Marcos dismissed the idea of working with the ICC. So why now?

Marcos' newly willingness to cooperate, as well as the pace of the extradition, demonstrates how relations have deteriorated between the Marcos and Duterte families. Duterte's supporters are adamant that Marcos' change of heart is a direct consequence of this feud, and that cooperation with the ICC is being used to deal a fatal blow to his adversary.

One move that could signal Marcos' commitment to international law and deter critics accusing him of using the arrest warrant as a political tool would be to rejoin the ICC. The Philippines withdrew in 2019 under Duterte, after growing criticism from the ICC about his violent methods used to prosecute his "drug war." Pressure from lawmakers and human rights groups are building on Marcos to rejoin the ICC, especially after he signaled his willingness to work with them on Duterte's arrest. Geraldine Roman, a lawmaker and Marcos ally, said "it's about time we return to the ICC and show the entire world that this country respects domestic and international laws."

If the Philippines doesn't rejoin the ICC, it risks leading those beyond Marcos' usual critics to suspect that the swift extradition of Duterte was purely politically motivated. As The Diplomat's Southeast Asia editor Sebastian Strangio writes, "whether [Marcos] does rejoin the ICC will be a test of how far [his] support for international criminal justice, and domestic accountability, really extends."

Whatever the long-term relationship between the Philippines and the ICC looks like, it's clear Marcos faces an immediate political landscape littered with potential flashpoints that could prompt anger off of social media and onto the streets in the form of civil unrest or violence.

However, perhaps the greatest overall risk to Marcos' legacy would be a failure to see the grieving families of "drug war" victims receive some form of justice. Whether the component of justice is at the forefront of Marcos' considerations remains to be seen.#

but he has not taken the time to talk to U.S. President Donald Trump who has constantly been engaged in his rhetoric of referring to Canada in becoming the 51st state. Carney has said that he's ready to meet with Trump, if he shows respect for Canadian sovereignty.

Chandra Arya, a Liberal backbench MP whose short-lived bid to replace Justin Trudeau as leader was cut short by the party, says he has been dropped as the candidate for the Ottawa riding of Nepean. He has represented the riding since 2015.

National campaign director Andrew Bevan informed Arya of the decision in a letter Thursday, just days before an expected election call. The move to remove him comes almost two months after the party also told Arya it would not accept him as a candidate for the party leadership. This decision then gives way to Marc Carney to run to represent Nepean as he now currently lives in Ottawa.

Previously, various Liberals have suggested Carney could run in Edmonton, where he grew up; or in Toronto, where the Liberals tend to do well.

The election will take place against the backdrop of a trade war and sovereignty threats from U.S. President Donald Trump.

The governing Liberals had appeared poised for a historic election defeat this year until Trump declared a trade war. Trump has repeatedly said that Canada should become the 51st U.S. state and he acknowledged Friday that he has totally upended Canadian politics.

What Trump hasn't said is that the almost daily attacks on Canada's sovereignty have infuriated Canadians, who are cancelling trips south of the border and avoiding buying

American goods when they can. The surge in Canadian nationalism has bolstered Liberal poll numbers.

The opposition Conservatives hoped to make the election about former Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, whose popularity declined as food and housing prices rose and immigration surged. But after decades of bilateral stability, the vote is now expected to focus on who is best equipped to deal with the United States.

An election campaign lasting about five weeks is going to be the shortest as there will be only 37 days before the election on April 28.

People throughout Canada will elect all 338 members of the House of Commons, one for each constituency. There are no primaries or runoffs, just a single round of voting.

Canada is like Britain in that it uses a "first past the post" system of voting, which means that the candidate that finishes top in each constituency will be elected, even if they don't get 50% of the vote.

This has generally cemented

the dominance of the two largest parties, the Liberals and Conservatives, because it's difficult for smaller parties to win seats unless they have concentrated support in particular areas.

The party that commands a majority in the House of Commons, either alone or with the support of another party, will form the next government and its leader will be prime minister.

Carney replaced Trudeau, who announced his resignation in January, but remained in power until the Liberal Party elected a new leader on March 9 following a leadership race by the governing Liberal Party. Carney won 85.9% of the votes to become the leader.

Carney, 60, is among the two main candidates. He navigated crises when he was the head of the Bank of Canada and when in 2013 he became the first noncitizen to run the Bank of England since it was founded in 1694.

His appointment won bipartisan praise in the U.K. after

Canada recovered from the 2008 financial crisis faster than many other countries.

A highly educated economist with Wall Street experience, Carney worked for 13 years for Goldman Sachs in London, Tokyo, New York and Toronto, before being appointed deputy governor of the Bank of Canada in 2003. He has both financial industry and public service credentials.

Pierre Poilievre, the leader of the Conservatives, is Carney's main challenger. The party and Poilievre were heading for a huge victory in Canada's federal election this year until Trump's near-daily trade and annexation threats derailed them.

Poilievre, 45, is a career politician and firebrand populist who says he will put "Canada first," similar to Trump's slogan of "America First." He attacks the mainstream media and vows to defund Canada's public broadcaster. His party announced that it won't allow media onboard his campaign buses and planes.

President Trump's tariffs and his rhetoric about Canada becoming the 51st state have clearly helped the Liberals in the polls while putting the Conservatives in an odd position, as their rhetoric exhibits some similarities with Trump's and a significant minority of their supporters like the President's populist style and ideas," said Daniel Béland, a political science professor at McGill University in Montreal.

The Conservatives, even before Carney won the Liberal leadership, focused on posting negative ads against him by accusing him of just being like "Justin." They had apparently predicted that Carney would eventually win the Liberal Party leadership.

"Elbows up Canada" rally against Trump's tariffs

Jim Cuddy, Arlene Dickinson, Shawn Majumder and Mayor Olivia Chow joined a crowd of more than 1500 in Nathan Phillips Square Saturday, March 22, 2025.

Canadians decked out in maple leafs gathered to show their national pride and support amid tensions with the U.S. Peter Wall, the rally's co-organizer, discusses what the movement hopes to achieve.

Part of the grassroots "Elbows Up, Canada!" campaign, Saturday's rally was billed as a "peaceful show of unity, resilience and strength," at a time when Trump is making threats against Canada's sovereignty and slapping tariffs on Canadian goods.

Fittingly, chants of "elbows up!" echoed through the crowd several times as organizers and homegrown celebrity speakers took the stage.

The hockey phrase — which originated with the legendary player Gordie Howe — became a national rallying cry this month after comedian Mike Myers, who grew up in Scarborough, mouthed the words on Saturday Night Live while wearing a

"Canada is not for sale" T-shirt. The March 1 episode aired just days before the U.S. slapped 25 per cent tariffs on Canadian goods. Most of those tariffs were subsequently paused until April 2.

Saturday's gathering in Toronto was the second "Elbows Up"

rally in Ontario this month after about 1,000 people rallied at Parliament Hill a few weeks ago.

Toronto Mayor Olivia Chow was invited to speak, along with famous Canadians like Dragons' Den star and business leader Arlene Dickinson, comedian Shaun Majumder and Blue Rodeo's Jim Cuddy, who performed his new trade war-inspired song, We Used to be the Best of Friends.

Majumder, who'd been living in California for about 20 years, told CBC News ahead of the rally that he "could not have picked a better time in Canadian history to repatriate back to this country."

Although this is only the second official "Elbows Up" rally, Majumder said the idea is gaining steam across the country.

"Every time I post something about an 'Elbows Up' thing that's happening, people are like, 'Come to our city, come to our town, we want this to happen across the country." Majumder said.

Co-organizer Peter Wall says he and other volunteers started "Elbows Up, Canada!" as a way to bring Canadians together and send a peaceful message.

"We're all kind of feeling something right now as a country," Wall said. "The message is really that

A Call to Action

The Women of Diverse Origins emphasized the critical need for international solidarity to address the intersectional issues faced by women globally. The conference aimed to foster a deeper understanding of how imperialism and corporate greed

Voices from the Frontlines

The press conference featured a diverse panel of speakers addressed the systemic challenges women face, particularly in marginalized and oppressed communities. Key topics included the impacts of imperialism, colonial violence, labor exploitation, and the urgent need to dismantle oppressive power structures.

Among the featured speakers was Viviane Michel, an Innu community leader, who discussed the fight for Indigenous sovereignty and the unique challenges faced by Indigenous women in Canada. Michèle highlighted the deep-rooted impacts of colonialism and the importance of reclaiming Indigenous power.

Ami, a Palestinian writer and member of the Palestinian Feminist Collective, addressed the resistance against Zionist aggression and the broader implications of colonial violence. She shared insights on the generational trauma and active genocide faced by Palestinians,

The Women of Diverse Origins stood in solidarity with all women resisting violence and exploitation, asserting that global liberation is achievable only through collective action and unwavering resistance.

Dollard-des-Ormeaux, QC - In a significant move to bolster food security services in Montreal's West Island, West Island Mission (WIM) and Volunteer West Island's Meals on Wheels program have collaborated to inaugurate a shared kitchen facility. This initiative aims to address the growing demand for nutritious meals among vulnerable populations,

including homebound seniors and individuals facing food insecurity.

The new facility, located at 72D Rue Dollard-des-Ormeaux, Brunswick, serves as the central hub for both organizations. WIM, known for its commitment to providing high-quality food assistance, has been experiencing an overwhelming demand, prompting the need for expanded operations. 

Student advocacy within an educational institution

Student advocacy within education plays a crucial role in maintaining an inclusive and functioning environment for all students. The Dawson Student Union is a good example of how a student group can promote an environment that connects, supports and inspires students. Student President Kenneth Clarence Oledan states, "Dawson Student Union is the student union that represents all 10,000 students at Dawson. We cater to everyone at Dawson whether they are Filipino, from France or Indonesia, etc. as we cater to every student's needs."

The Dawson Student Union of 2024-2025 is composed of executive officers involved in addressing the concerns of students, namely, Student President, Kenneth Clarence Oledan; VP of Finance, Chris Maniratanga; VP of Academic Affairs & Advocacy Victoria Ormiston; VP of Operations & Services, Olivier Lamoureux; VP of External Affairs, Leilah Doyle; VP of Internal Affairs & Communications, Philippe Beauchemin; VP of Student Life, Faye Rasno and VP Sustainability Equity, Leila Pozzi.

The student union executives maintain services and resources offered in the CEGEP such as Dawson Dinin' which offers students free vegan meals to address food insecurity; The Hive, a gender-focused program that offers free mental or sexual resources and products; DSU Health & Dental and Plan the OPUS fare reimbursement program for financially challenged students.

Alongside student support programs, the DSU advocates for causes such as the Law 14 petition and other education related issues.

Its achievements are in the increase of meals served in the Dawson Dinin' program and the expansion of this program for students in night classes, the maintenance of The Hive program, the successful launch of the OFReP, OPUS card program with over 100 applicants in the first few days and the petition signing for Indigenous exemption from Law 14.

Obstacles faced by the DSU include legal challenges and budget limitations during the process of organizing student services or political events. Students can work with the student government to advocate for their beliefs and to directly challenge those creating barriers in education. Future projects highlighted by the student group are the launching of Dawson Snackin' - a program providing students with free snacks and coffee, the release of statements

The DSU (Dawson Student Union) envisions a future where the student government continues to grow recognition gain encouraging students to engage and participate in student government. Oledan explains, "After leaving the office and with the elections next month, I hope that there will be a lot of candidates because I think if there are a lot of students who get inspired by the work that we do and decide to run for the different positions that we have at the DSU - that's my gauge of how successful I was as president."

In an educational setting, advocacy is vital as it enables students' voices to be heard and cultivate a supportive environment where students actively work together to promote positive changes. As a Filipino student president at Dawson College, Kenneth Clarence Oledan encourages Filipinos to take leadership positions and take up space in the community to fight for things you believe in. He explains, "I was in Pinoys on Parliament and MP for Mississauga and Minister of Small Business, Rechie Valdez, the first Filipino to attain this position who said that there was a 17shouldn't wait for another 17 years for that to happen. So, if there is an opportunity to be in a leadership position or to take a space and to be the voice of your community, go for it."

Indigenous healthcare services through Centre Tiohtià:ke

The Indigenous Health Centre, Tiohtià:ke, located on the first floor of Queen Elizabeth Health Complex is a healthcare centre focused on catering to the needs of the Indigenous and Inuit populations. The centre's main objective is to provide effective health care services for Indigenous and Inuit people in the Montreal area, especially for those who are not able to access RAMQ, status cards or ID. It also aims to adopt holistic care in a culturally safe and accepting environment. Tiohtià:ke mainly serves the Indigenous, Inuit and Métis communities residing in the Greater Montreal regions who require medical assistance in all aspects of their lives.

The Indigenous Health Centre officially began operating in 2016 after a project by the Montreal Urban Community Aboriginal Strategy Network revealed several gaps in the healthcare services provided for Indigenous people in Montreal. This led the executive director, Carrie

Martin, alongside founding members, Pascale Kaniasta Annoual and Dr. Sean Yaphe, to open a healthcare centre for Indigenous communities, similar to that of the Wabano Health Centre in Ottawa. The centre is able to function through the help of different workers such as health navigators who provide clientele with translation services, access to clinics, doctor appointments and hospitals, psychologists, intervention workers, opthamologists, addiction workers and

services to the First Nation communities and gaining more recognition from community members through the increasing numbers of clientele

with positive feedback about the services. Throughout the years, there have also been several obstacles. These include setbacks such as the limited amounts of healthcare professionals like doctors and nurses and insufficient funding as they are a nonprofit organization using funds from the grants. These challenges lead to uncertainty about the centre's ability to continue its operations after March as expressed by the Healthcare navigators. To aid the Indigenous Healthcare Centre Tiohtià:ke in its goals, raising awareness about the centre, donating and partnering or volunteering with the centre are appreciated.

There are a few upcoming events and projects in the Tiohtià:ke centre as explained by the Healthcare Navigators. A pop-up optometry and vaccination clinic for influenza, shingles, HPV, poxes, tetanus and other diseases will be accessible on March 18 from 9:30am to 3:30pm. Focus workshops for the Sixties Scoop survivors to encourage healing are offered alongside cultural workshops for activities such as bead working, drum and glove making. The organization hopes to expand its space and buildings to provide more services and area for their growing

spiritual healers.

Healthcare navigators at Tiohtià:ke Centre, Shirley Pien-Berube and Alanna Mitchell, present services and programs that address the needs and concerns of the community. They explain, "We have two new programs, which are for family violence and for the Sixties Scoop survivors. We have a year gap between the first Filipino who food bank for our members, so they held that position and then her. And we can come in anytime to get food. We also have a mobile clinic that comes at least once a month and a diabetic care clinic. We're also looking to start physiotherapy services, a dental mobile clinic and drama therapy as well."

The Tiohtià:ke centre continues to provide services for and Indigenous, Métis communities in the Greater Montreal area. This allows the community to obtain adequate services and aid for physical and mental health alongside the promotion of culture within the organization. Healthcare Navigator, Shirley Pien-Berube states, "It is a great organization. It provides services to community members that generally will never be able to get the medical services and help because some do not have RAMQ or status cards. So, I think that's one of our biggest accomplishments. We are able to provide services to people who generally would not be able to get these services."

The Foundation of Greater Montreal's philanthropic role

Montreal (FGM) is a community foundation that manages philanthropic funds, connects communities and participates in the solving of issues to aid the collective wellbeing of Greater Montreal. Linda Tchombé, Director of Philanthropic Development states, "We work with community groups in order to manage donations for them and remove the administrative hassle while also working closely with the community organizations to make sure we identify the most urgent needs of the community and fund those initiatives." Their main objective is to provide philanthropic resources, support the community and encourage knowledge and initiative in Greater Montreal.

The FGM began offering its services in 2000 after a group of leaders from other organizations found importance in creating a community foudation in Montreal. It has continued to grow over the years, fostering a community for the people. The main individuals and groups involved in maintaining the foundation are team board members, directors, committees, partner groups and volunteers. The Foundation of Greater Montreal has partnered with several groups such as Native Montreal, The Girls Write the Future Fund, The Fonds Bernadette Gratton in Memoriam and many others. It has also distributed grants to organizations for important causes such as Women on the Rise, Moisson Montréal and Weredale Foundation alongside several other non-profit institutions. Tchombé also highlights the aim to provide necessary philanthropic capital to large and small organizations to help solve problems within the community.

The achievements accomplished by the Foundation of Greater Montreal within the past few years include creating strong relationships with partnering community organizations and funding important community groups that ensure the maintenance of community wellbeing.

Setbacks within the foundation are the lack of service recognition and the lack of financial resources as they do not receive government funding for initiatives. The ways the community can contribute to the mission of the FGM are by becoming an organization partner, donating to the foundation and supporting the different causes by getting to know the organizations within the Foundation of Greater Montreal.

There are several upcoming events and projects of the foundation as explained by the Director of Philanthropic Development, Linda Tchombé. 





Philly Cheesesteak Meatloaf

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 small yellow onion, diced
- 1 small green bell pepper, diced
- 8 ounces brown mushrooms, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- 2 tablespoons ketchup
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 2 large eggs
- 2 lbs lean ground beef (80/20 or 85/15)
- 1 cup panko breadcrumbs
- 8 ounces Provolone cheese slices Instructions 1)Preheat the oven to 375°F, Spray
- 1)Preheat the oven to 375°F. Spray a large (9×5) loaf pan with cooking spray.
- 2)Melt the butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the diced onions, bell peppers, mushrooms, salt, and pepper. Sauté for 1-2 minutes before stirring, then let brown for another 1-2 minutes. Remove from heat and let cool for 5 minutes.
- 3)In a large bowl, blend the ketchup, Worcestershire sauce, and eggs until smooth. Add the ground beef, sautéed vegetables, and panko breadcrumbs, and mix thoroughly with your hands until well combined. Press half of the meat mixture into the prepared loaf pan. Lay half of the provolone cheese slices in a single layer through the center of the meatloaf, about 2 inches wide. Top with the remaining meat mixture. 4) Bake for 40 minutes. Remove from the oven, top with the remaining provolone cheese slices, and return to the oven. Bake for an additional 15-20 minutes, until the cheese is melted and bubbly.

Let the meatloaf rest for 10 minutes before slicing and serving. Enjoy! Notes

Be gentle. Mix the meatloaf ingredients until just combined. Overmixing can make the loaf dense and tough.

Ingredients
Chicken and Seasoning

- 1 lb boneless skinless chicken
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1 teaspoon finely minced ginger
- 1 teaspoon finely minced garlic

Tempura Batter

- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/2 cup cake flour
- 1/2 cup cornstarch
- 1/2 cup ice-cold water
- 1 teaspoon baking soda vegetable oil for frying
- Instructions
- 1)Pound the chicken breast: Use a meat tenderizer to pound the chicken so that its thinner and flatter. This allows the chicken to cook more
- 2)Cut the chicken into thin strips. Season the chicken: Add chicken strips to a large bowl. Then season with salt, pepper, soy sauce, ginger, and garlic. Mix well.
- 3)Make the tempura batter: In a large bowl, sift cake flour, baking soda and

cornstarch. Then add the beaten egg. Gradually add water and mix until everything is combined. (Make sure not to over-mix the batter.)

4)Coat the chicken: Add the seasoned chicken strips to the batter and coat well

5)Heat the oil: Heat the oil to 350°F in a deep fryer or Dutch oven.

Fry the chicken: Add a few pieces of the battered chicken at a time. Fry for about 4 minutes total until crispy and golden brown (flipping half way through). Remove with a slotted spoon and place the chicken onto a plate lined with paper towel. Repeat with the rest of the chicken strips. Serve and enjoy!



Pan seared duck

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon crushed dried rosemary 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 ½ tablespoons dried thyme leaves
- 1 teaspoon freshly ground black
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 4 potatoes, cubed
- 2 pints fresh or frozen blueberries
- ½ cup water
- ½ cup apple juice
- ½ cup white sugar
- 1 jalapeño pepper, finely chopped 3 slices pancetta or bacon, cut into thin strips
- 6 shallots, thinly sliced
- ½ cup sliced shiitake mushrooms
- 2 pounds bok choy, sliced
- 4 (8 ounce) boneless duck breasts
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter
- 2 tablespoons aged balsamic vinegar
- Directions

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C).

Step 2

Step 1

Combine rosemary, salt, thyme, and black pepper in a small bowl; reserve for seasoning potatoes and duck. Step 3

Toss cubed potatoes in a 9x13-inch baking dish with olive oil; sprinkle with 2 tablespoons spice blend until evenly coated. Spread into a single layer across the bottom of the baking dish; bake in the preheated oven, 35 to 40 minutes.

Step 4

While potatoes roasting, combine blueberries, water, apple juice, sugar, and jalapeño in a small saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat, then reduce heat to low; simmer until reduced to the consistency of syrup, about 10 minutes.

Step 5

Cook pancetta in a large skillet over medium heat, turning occasionally, until crispy. Drain on paper towels; reserve drippings in the skillet. Add shallots and mushrooms to the skillet; cook and stir until soft and just beginning to brown. Transfer shallots and mushrooms to a bowl; set aside. Increase heat to medium-high; add bok choy to the skillet. Cook and stir until leaves wilted and white stalks tender, about 5 minutes. Return shallots, mushrooms, and pancetta to the skillet, set aside off heat. Step 6

Rinse duck breasts; pat dry. Rub remaining spice blend onto both sides of breasts. Heat a large skillet over medium-high heat, when hot, add vegetable oil and butter. Immediately place breasts in the skillet, skin and fat sides down. Do not move breasts until the skin is deep brown, about 5 minutes. Flip breasts; cook until an instant-read thermometer inserted into the thickest part reads 160 degrees F (71 degrees C) for well done. Transfer breasts to a plate; cover with foil and rest 5 minutes. While breasts resting, heat bok chov mixture over medium heat until warmed through.

Step 7

Slice breasts diagonally into 1/2-inch strips. Divide bok choy mixture among four plates; drizzle each with 1/2 tablespoon aged balsamic vinegar; arrange sliced breasts on bok choy, then ladle on blueberry sauce. Serve potatoes on the side.

But for the American government, Wall said the rallies hold a different message: "We're neighbours, we're friends, but we don't want to get married."



CTV News reached out to Villa Maria for an interview, but school officials did not want to comment.

Russian strikes injure scores in Ukraine as US and Kremlin officials meet for ceasefire talks

(CNN) A United States delegation met Monday with Kremlin negotiators in Saudi Arabia, where the Trump administration is pushing for progress toward a ceasefire in separate talks with Russia and Ukraine, just as Russian strikes injured scores of people in Ukraine, including children.

Talks between Russian and US officials concluded late Monday evening after more than 12 hours, the state-run Russian news agency RIA Novosti said.

The high-stakes meeting came one day after discussions between a US contingent - led by officials from the State Department, the National Security Council and members of Ukraine Special Envoy Keith Kellogg's team and Ukraine's Defense Minister Rustem Umerov, which were described by the latter as "productive and focused."

The Kremlin said earlier that "the issue of the Black Sea Initiative and all aspects related to its renewal," would be at the top of the agenda of Monday's talks.

Earlier in the war, the so-called Black Sea Grain Initiative enabled the safe export of Ukrainian grain through Black Sea waters. Russia withdrew from that agreement, which was brokered by Turkey and the United Nations, in 2023, complaining that Russia faced obstacles exporting its own food.

Washington's delegation - led by real estate tycoon-turned-diplomat Steve Witkoff - is eyeing a potential maritime ceasefire in the Black Sea and hoping that some of the initial positivity in peace talks can be translated into a broader 30-day truce and longer-term negotiations. But a wide gulf in expectations exists between Russia, Ukraine and their US interlocutors.

Russian attack on Sumy injures dozens

As talks continue, so do the attacks on Ukraine, where Russian

strikes have killed at least four civilians in the last 24 hours, according to regional officials on Monday morning, and injured dozens more - including a pregnant woman.

On Monday, a Russian missile strike on a "densely populated" residential area in the northeastern Ukrainian city of Sumy injured 88 people, including at least 17 children, Ukrainian officials said. Acting Sumy Mayor Artem Kobzar said on Telegram: "The city's residential sector and facilities, infrastructure including children's facilities and a hospital, were damaged."

Russian President Vladimir Putin offered to temporarily halt attacks on energy targets in Ukraine after a lengthy telephone call with US counterpart Donald Trump last week, but has continued to bombard civilian targets. Ukraine has also fired back at Russia.

Russia and Ukraine traded blame on Friday over an attack on a gas metering station that lies in Russia's Kursk region, just a few hundred meters from their shared border.

Carlton Hotel in Riyadh, the Russian delegation included seasoned Kremlin diplomat Grigory Karasin and former spy chief Sergey Beseda, according to Russian state media. Beseda is viewed by many in Ukraine as a hard-nosed nationalist and early supporter of Russia's full-scale invasion in February 2022.

"We should not so much wait for breakthroughs as understand that work is underway in a number of areas," Russian foreign ministry spokeswoman Maria Zakharova said Monday of the negotiations.

Ukraine's Umerov said Monday that "another meeting with the US delegation is planned" in Saudi Arabia.

The trust deficit on the Ukrainian side has not been helped by Witkoff's recent rhetorical support for many of Russian President Vladimir Putin's maximalist positions ahead of talks. Speaking to podcast host Tucker Carlson on Sunday, Witkoff appeared to show some sympathy toward Russia's territorial ambitions in Ukraine, describing the four regions Russia wants to formally annex — Kherson, Monday's talks at the Ritz Zaporizhzhia, Donetsk and Luhansk

as "Russian speaking."

"There have been referendums where the overwhelming majority of the people have indicated that they want to be under Russian rule," he said.

Russia held the referendums in occupied areas of the four territories in September 2022. The votes were widely viewed as a sham and heavily criticized by the US at the time as well as by allies in Europe.

"The Russians are de facto in control of these territories. The question is: Will the world acknowledge that those are Russian territories?" Witkoff asked Sunday. "Can (Ukrainian President

Volodymyr) Zelensky survive politically if he acknowledges this? This is the central issue in the conflict. Speaking Sunday night, Zelensky put the responsibility on Putin to end the war.

"The one who brought this war must take it away," the Ukrainian

Moscow says a ceasefire will not be possible unless Kyiv agrees not to use it to resupply or reorganize its troops. It has also publicly voiced key demands such as Ukraine never being allowed to join NATO.

Middle East latest: Israeli strikes kill scores in Gaza as Egypt offers new ceasefire proposal

(Associated Press, March 24, 2025)

Israeli strikes across the Gaza Strip killed more than 65 Palestinians over the past day, including women and children, the Gaza Health Ministry said Monday. In less than a week of air and ground operations since Israel broke the ceasefire with Hamas, its forces have killed hundreds of people in Gaza sending the death toll from 17 months of war soaring above 50,000.

Meanwhile, officials say Egypt has introduced a new proposal to try and get the ceasefire back on track.

Hamas would release five living hostages, including an American-Israeli, in return for Israel allowing humanitarian aid into Gaza and a weekslong pause in the fighting, an Egyptian official said Monday. Israel would also release hundreds of Palestinian prisoners.

A Hamas official said the group had "responded positively" to the proposal, without elaborating. Both officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not

"The incident will be reviewed," the brief statement said.

The Red Cross says the building was damaged but no staff members were hurt.

Israeli drone kills 1 in south

Lebanon, health ministry says Lebanon's Health Ministry says an Israeli drone strike in south Lebanon has killed one person.

State-run News Agency quoted a Health Ministry statement as saying that the Monday night drone strike took place in the village of Qaaqaaiyet el-Jisr. It was not immediately clear who the target was.

'Hoping for better': Hudson's Bay liquidation sales begin at all but six stores

-Canadians headed Hudson's Bay stores Monday in hopes of scooping up the first of the retailer's liquidation deals, but many left confused about whether markdowns had even begun.

Shoppers who visited department stores in Quebec and Alberta noticed plenty of sales signs the company uses seasonally but none advertising a clear-out or liquidation underway.

I was hoping for better," said Mireille Girouard as she sifted through the racks of women's clothing at a Hudson's Bay in La Salle, Que.

"I think I'll spend more when the deals are a little better."

Hudson's Bay was given court approval on Friday to begin liquidating all but six of its 80 department stores, 13 Saks Off Fifth locations and three Saks Fifth Avenue shops in Canada.

Lawyers for the struggling retailer known for being Canada's oldest company said its plan was to start the selloff Monday.

Ten minutes before the Bay was set to open at Southcentre Mall in southeast Calgary, about a dozen people were already gathered outside and more were streaming in from the parking lot.

"It's amazing what we'll do to save a dollar," one woman could be heard saying.

As shoppers began filing through the doors, staffers announced that liquidators hadn't been by the store vet and so there would be no sales above and beyond items already marked for clearance. Nonetheless, the store filled with people digging through overcrowded and disheveled clearance racks marked up to 50 or 60

Catherine van der Poel was clutching a set of grey twin sheets, unsure if they were on sale. She said she would only be interested in braving the line if they were at least 50 per cent off. She didn't realize liquidation sales had not yet begun at the Southcentre location.

"The signage is lacking. In fact, I don't know what the sale is for the linens," she said. "I don't see a lot of staff around. I was downstairs and trying to find the elevator to ask somebody. It was hard to find."

Van der Poel said she's relied on the Bay to find clothing that fits her tall frame, with so many brands in one

Sweaters, coats and other place. She's not big on online cold-weather gear appeared to make shopping and isn't sure where she'll go

The liquidation slated for About a half-hour after Hudson's Bay is the product of creditor protection proceedings the retailer began earlier this month, when it said lower consumer spending, reduced downtown traffic and trade tensions between Canada and the U.S. had it facing significant financial difficulties.

> Hudson's Bay originally thought it would need to shutter all of its stores but, when sales soared so much after it publicized its early liquidation plans, it made enough cash to spare six locations.

In recent decades, Hudson's Bay's competition has morphed from the few other Canadian department stores still around such as La Maison Simons and Holt Renfrew to the plethora of online retailers who sell much of the same merchandise. Even its vaunted beauty counters have come under threat from Sephora.

The Bay's prime real estate and broad selection, however, kept it
