

Canadians have re-elected a Liberal minority government

Final seat tally may not look very different from composition of the House of Commons when it was dissolved

Liberal Leader Justin Trudeau has won enough seats in this 44th general election to form another minority government — with voters signalling Monday they trust the incumbent to lead Canada through the next phase of the pandemic fight by handing him a third mandate with a strong plurality.

After a 36-day campaign and a \$600-million election, the final seat tally doesn't look very different from the composition of the House of Commons when it was dissolved in early August — prompting even more questions about why a vote was called during a fourth wave of the pandemic in the first place.

As of 4 p.m. ET, Liberal

Delta variant changing rules of the game, but unvaccinated prolonging pandemic

Canadians are entering one of the most confusing chapters of the

pandemic — and many may be left wondering why we're not where we'd hoped to be after becoming one of the most vaccinated countries in the world.

Reports of waning immunity from COVID-19 vaccines, the potential

need for booster shots and the possibility of breakthrough infections among the fully vaccinated may be leading many of us to second guess what we can and can't do safely in the fourth wave.

And the more contagious, potentially more deadly delta variant has prolonged the pandemic, made daily life more difficult to navigate and turned back the clock on our collective plans to return to a relatively normal life.

"Everyone needs this damned virus to go away," said Dr. David Naylor, who led the federal inquiry into Canada's national response to the 2003 SARS epidemic and now co-chairs the federal government's COVID-19 immunity task force. "But it's not done with us yet."

It was easy to think that once most of us rolled up our sleeves and did our part to get vaccinated and protect ourselves and our communities from COVID-19 that this would all be over, but the unfortunate truth is that we still have a ways to go.

"We need to rethink this," said Linsey Marr, an expert on virus transmission at Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, Va. "It is emotionally upsetting because we thought we saw the light at the end of the tunnel — but apparently the tunnel is longer."

Unvaccinated driving Canada's 4th wave

The hard truth is that despite our collective efforts to stave off another wave of the pandemic through widespread vaccination, Canada is continuing to see a troubling rise in COVID-19 levels across much of the country.

Over the past week, new COVID-19 cases have risen to an average of 2,848 per day — an increase of 29 per cent over the previous seven days.

Daily hospitalizations have also climbed 39 per cent week-over-week to an average of 917 across the country, while ICU admissions are also

I would like to thank the Filipino community leaders who attended en masse Ensemble Montreal's Meet and Greet event recently held at Mackenzie King Park.

I appreciate the community's strong endorsement of my candidacy for Mayor of the Borough of Côte-des-Neiges – Notre-Dame-de-Grâce as well as for our local candidates for City Council, Stephanie Valenzuela in Darlington, Sonny Moroz in Snowdon and Dimitra Kostarides in Côte-des-Neiges. 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National Day for Truth and Reconciliation is Sept. 30, but some provinces won't make it a stat holiday

WINNIPEG -- Much of Canada will observe a second holiday this month.

On Sept. 30, federal offices, banks and post offices will be closed to mark the first National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.

"The idea is really to set aside a day that we honour all the children who survived residential schools, as well as honour and recognize those who did not return," Brenda Gunn, academic and research director at the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation, told CTV National News.

The new federal statutory holiday coincides with Orange Shirt Day, which was started in 2013 as a way to honour Indigenous children and educate Canadians about the impact the residential school system had on Indigenous communities.

Creating such a federal holiday was one of the 94 calls to action by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission back in 2015.

Many provinces and territories have followed the federal government's lead in marking in the day as a designated holiday and day off for students.

Private companies and

organizations can decide if they want to honour optional or unofficial holidays, and provinces can also designate holidays.

However, Alberta, Saskatchewan, New Brunswick, Quebec and Ontario have chosen not to recognize Sept. 30 as a statutory holiday. It's a decision some say is callous, but not unexpected.

"It kind of goes along with that 'get over it' attitude that many Canadians have, but we must never forget, or we end up repeating our mistakes." Robert Kakakaway, a residential school survivor, told CTV

News. "It should not be a time of celebration, but a time of education."

Kakakaway spent six years at Marieval Indian Residential School in Saskatchewan, where more than 700 unmarked graves were discovered in June.

Beyond the statutory holiday, work to recognize the damage done to Indigenous peoples through colonization continues. Dozens of First Nations have started searching for graves at former residential school sites, and across Canada more people are educating themselves to learn what reconciliation means.

"To our groups, reconciliation means, 'How can I take action in my personal life and affect change within my own community?'," explained Lori Abraham, Indigenous cultural program director at 1JustCity.

At the former Kamloops Indian Residential School, where a suspected 215 graves were found in May, members of the Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc First Nation will play an honour song on Sept. 30. It will be played at 2:15 P.T., coinciding with the number of graves that "shocked the world," the First Nation said.

glimpse of the reality inside the province's ICUs.

Wong said he's heard dying patients express regret about not getting

taken to the ICU to be intubated, a procedure to assist someone when they are no longer able to breathe on their own.

"He told them how sorry he was over and over again," Wong said, "and, unfortunately, three days later, he died alone."

Wong believes many of those who come into the hospital without a vaccine do so because Saskatchewan's reopening plan for the summer gave them a false sense of security.

The people felt that COVID-19 was over or, at the very least, was no longer a concern, Wong said.

"We've seen so many people in a hospital like this, and they are so regretful."

It is so hard right now

Wong and other health-care workers have shared their stories, hoping that they would serve as lessons for those who remain unvaccinated or who have family members who are unvaccinated.

Vaccination remains one of the most important tools against the virus. It reduces the most serious effects of COVID-19. A vaccinated person with

Elected officials in Saskatchewan need to send a clear, strong message to residents about 'how serious this really is,' said infectious diseases specialist Dr. Alexander Wong. 'People don't see what's going on in the hospitals,' he said.

As Saskatchewan makes its way through its fourth wave of COVID-19, health-care workers across the province are sharing their difficult experiences continuing to treat those suffering from the virus.

Dr. Alex Wong, an infectious diseases doctor at Regina General Hospital, is one of the workers who has taken to social media to give the public a

He used an example of one man who was unvaccinated.

"I should have had my shots ... my wife had hers. She kept telling me to get mine. I'm going to die, aren't I?" Wong recalled the man saying.

It's a reversal of fortunes for Trudeau. He launched this campaign with a sizeable lead in the polls — only to see his support crater days later as many voters expressed anger with his decision to call an election during this health crisis. Two middling debate performances by Trudeau and renewed questions about past scandals also put a Liberal victory in

up by an average of 29 per cent per day to 340 over the past week. That's despite having 66 per cent of the Canadian population fully vaccinated — a number that has plateaued in recent weeks, but is remarkably high nonetheless.

So why isn't that enough? The answer lies with those who haven't yet gotten a shot.

Since vaccines became available in December, just 0.8 per cent of cases, one per cent of hospitalizations and 1.4 per cent of deaths from COVID-19 have been in fully vaccinated Canadians, according to the latest available data from the

"When we look at where cases and certainly hospitalizations are showing up right now, we're seeing massive over-representation in unvaccinated communities," said Jason Kindrachuk, an assistant professor of viral pathogenesis at the University of Manitoba and Canada Research Chair of emerging viruses. "So the vaccines are working."

But there are still millions of Canadians who have yet to get vaccinated — either by choice or due to a lack of access or eligibility — and that's putting all of us at risk. Unvaccinated Canadians pose risks to vaccinated

But in the end, voters decided the Liberal team should continue to govern a country that, while battered and bruised by a health crisis, has also fared well on key pandemic metrics like death rates and vaccine coverage. Trudeau called this election on Aug. 15, saying he wanted Canadians to weigh in on who should finish the fight against the pandemic and lead the country into a post-pandemic recovery. He promised a plan for child care, more aggressive climate action and a fix for Canada's housing

Dr. Allison McGeer, a medical microbiologist and infectious disease specialist at Toronto's Mount Sinai Hospital who worked on the front lines of the SARS epidemic in 2003, says the unvaccinated pose two different threats to vaccinated Canadians in the fourth wave.

"Firstly, they pose a direct risk of transmission, and while the vaccine is very effective at protecting you from serious illness and death — it's not 100 per cent. Nothing in life is 100 per cent," she said.

"The second thing that unvaccinated people do is they increase the spread of coronavirus in the population. So if you release restrictions, unvaccinated people contribute substantially more to the growth of transmission in the community."

To put it bluntly, the longer the remaining Canadians put off getting a shot — and until we can get kids under 12 vaccinated — the more the pandemic drags on. And while we've come a long way since the beginning of the pandemic, we're still nowhere near where we need to be to control the delta variant.

Naylor says that even though Canada has vaccinated over 83 per cent of our eligible population over the age of 12 with one dose and more than 75 per cent with two, that's still not enough to stave off a fourth wave.

"That's very helpful and should mitigate the toll of the fourth wave

compared to earlier waves," he said. "But it makes no sense to leave a lot of immunological room for this virus to spread and cause more harm."

In his victory speech in Montreal in the early hours of Tuesday morning, Trudeau said the result suggests Canadians are "sending us back to work with a clear mandate to get Canada through this pandemic and to brighter days ahead."

"The moment we face demands real, important change, and you have given this Parliament and this government clear direction."

After a divisive campaign that saw a great deal of partisan sniping, Trudeau struck a more conciliatory

a recent report that the delta variant has kicked the possibility of herd immunity further down the road — meaning we may now need an estimated 90 per cent of the population fully vaccinated to get there.

"Vaccines are not a panacea, but if everybody got vaccinated — this is done," said Raywat Deonandan, a global health epidemiologist and associate professor at the University of Ottawa. "Despite the fact these vaccines aren't perfect."

Delta changing rules of the game

The problem we face at this stage of the pandemic is that delta has changed the rules of the game — raising the immunity threshold we need to hit, increasing risk in our day-to-day lives and meaning even fully vaccinated Canadians need to keep their guard up.

But instead of coming together in a cohesive way, the country is once again divided over vaccine passports, mask mandates and reinstating public health restrictions — leaving a patchwork system across the country that leaves room for the virus to spread.

Ontario and Alberta have vehemently rejected the idea of vaccine passports to date, although Ontario may soon change course, while British Columbia joined Quebec and Manitoba in announcing passports for the fully vaccinated in response to the fourth wave

Saskatchewan announced this week that not only would it not be

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9/11 20 years updates: Tribute in Light shines at end of anniversary

The memorial, which opened in 2008, is located just feet from where the hijacked American Airlines Flight 77 struck the west wall of the Pentagon.

The wreath-laying ceremony was Biden's final scheduled event to mark the 20th anniversary of 9/11, following visits to Shanksville, Pennsylvania, and New York City.

Biden visits with Shanksville Volunteer Fire Department President Joe Biden made an unannounced stop Saturday afternoon at the Shanksville Volunteer Fire Department -- the first to respond to the United Flight 93 crash in Shanksville, Pennsylvania, on Sept. 11, 2001.

The president spent nearly an hour taking photographs and speaking with over 100 first responders and their families.

After his visit, Biden spoke briefly with reporters, where he reflected on the importance of memorials, like the ones erected in Shanksville to commemorate the victims of the 9/11 attacks.

"These memorials are really important, but they're also incredibly

difficult for the people who were affected by them because it brings back that moment you got the phone call. It brings back that instant you got the news, no matter how many years go by," he said.

Unprompted, Biden said he thought former President George W. Bush gave a "really good speech" Saturday about about who Americans are.

"The core of who we are is not divided," Biden said.

When asked how the nation can get back to that state of unity, Biden said, "By being honest when I make a mistake. By being straightforward, telling people exactly what I want to do."

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China claims Kovrig, Spavor freed for health reasons

Foreign ministry sought to downplay connection between their release and the return of Meng Wanzhou

-China's foreign ministry says Michael Kovrig and Michael Spavor, who were allowed to return to Canada late last week after nearly three years in detention, were released on bail for health reasons.

A ministry spokesperson made the comments Monday as Beijing sought to downplay the connection between their release and the return to China of a long-detained executive of Huawei Technologies.

Spavor and Kovrig were detained in December 2018, days after Huawei's chief financial officer, Meng Wanzhou, was arrested in Canada at the request of U.S. authorities.

Many countries labelled China's action "hostage politics," while China accused Ottawa of arbitrary detention. The two Canadians were jailed for more than 1,000 days. Foreign Affairs Minister Marc Garneau touched on the arrests during his speech before the 76th session of the United Nations General Assembly on Monday.

"Canada observed the rule of law and two Canadian citizens paid a heavy price for this commitment," Garneau told delegates in New York.

"Canada will never forget this experience and this lesson. We shall continue to press for an end to arbitrary detention, wherever and however it occurs."

Garneau did not indicate that Ottawa would pursue any further action against China.

Meng fought the U.S. demand for extradition from Canada. She landed in China on Saturday after reaching a deferred prosecution agreement with the U.S. Justice Department that led to a prisoner swap.

"The case of Meng Wanzhou is completely different from that of Michael Kovrig and Michael Spavor in nature," foreign ministry spokeswoman Hua Chunying told reporters at a daily briefing on Monday.

The two men were suspected of endangering national security, Hua said

White House says 'no link' between cases

On Monday afternoon, White House press secretary Jen Psaki said there is "no link" between the U.S. Justice Department's deal to release Meng and China's decision to free Kovrig and Spavor.

"We have an independent justice department that made independent decisions, law-enforcement decisions," she said. "At the same time, we have made no secret about our push to have the two Michaels released. That's certainly positive news and good news."

Psaki noted that Biden raised

"the two Michaels" in his last call with Chinese President Xi Jinping and said that every member of the administration who has contacts with Chinese officials has pushed for the release of the Canadians over the last nine months.

John Bolton, who was U.S. President Donald Trump's national security adviser at the time of Meng's arrest, described the development as a "hostage swap." He went on to argue that the Biden government should have pressed on with its case against Meng.

Two Canadians who languished in Chinese prisons for nearly three years held emotional reunions with their loved ones on Saturday after the culmination of a geopolitical saga that saw them return safely to Canadian soil.

Michael Kovrig and Michael Spavor first landed in Calgary aboard a Canadian Forces plane early Saturday morning and were personally welcomed home by Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and Global Affairs Minister Marc Garneau, according to a spokesperson from Trudeau's office.

After exchanging hugs with the prime minister and bidding goodbye to his fellow captor, Kovrig then boarded another plane bound for Toronto. His wife Vina Nadjibullah and sister Ariana Botha greeted him with emotional embraces on the tarmac, prompting Kovrig to offer a brief assessment of his changed circumstances.

"It's fantastic to be back home in Canada," Kovrig told reporters. "I'm immensely grateful for everybody who worked so hard to bring both of us back home."

Greetings and well-wishes poured in from across the country after the return of the men who have come to

making her way back to China from Vancouver after resolving the legal saga that mired all three of them in a geopolitical melee.

The case connecting the three detained citizens' fates came to an

abrupt conclusion when Meng, the chief financial officer at Huawei Technologies and the daughter of the telecom's founder, reached a deal with U.S. prosecutors over fraud and conspiracy charges related to American sanctions against Iran.

In a virtual appearance in a New York courtroom, Meng pleaded not guilty on all charges as the judge signed off on a deferred prosecution agreement that would see the indictment against her dismissed after Dec. 1, 2022 — four years from the date of her arrest — provided that she complied with all her obligations under the terms of the deal.

Prosecutors also agreed to drop a request that Meng be extradited to the U.S. from Canada. Soon after, Meng walked out of a British Columbia Supreme Court after a judge agreed to a discharge order that withdrew a U.S. extradition request that led to her 2018 arrest in Vancouver.

Meng's arrest in Vancouver in December 2018 at the behest of the U.S. has been a source of simmering tensions between Ottawa, Washington and Beijing. Kovrig and Spavor were arrested in China on espionage charges just days later in apparent retaliation. China has publicly

maintained that there is no connection between her case and the men's imprisonment, but had also dropped broad hints that her freedom could benefit the two Canadians.

Many countries labeled China's action "hostage politics," while China accused Ottawa of arbitrary detention.

Last week, Trudeau said Canada spearheaded an international declaration denouncing state-sponsored arbitrary detentions because of China's decision to imprison "The Two Michaels."

Guy Saint-Jacques, a one-time Canadian ambassador to China and Kovrig's former boss, said the events of recent days further highlight the true nature of the situation.

"Clearly, the Chinese were so eager to get Meng back that they jettisoned all pretensions that the two Michaels had been arrested for good reasons," he said. "They must acknowledge that their reputation has been severely tarnished."

While Meng was kept under house arrest at a mansion in that city, the Canadians faced much harsher conditions in Chinese prisons where their access to the outside world was extremely limited.

Trudeau alluded to those conditions at a Friday news conference where he announced their release from China and imminent return home.

"These two men have gone through an unbelievably difficult ordeal," Trudeau said.

be known around the world as "The Two Michaels."

"Welcome home, Michael Kovrig and Michael Spavor," Trudeau tweeted after their arrival. "You've shown incredible strength, resilience, and perseverance. Know that Canadians across the country will continue to be here for you, just as they have been."

Kovrig and Spavor's safe return to Canada marks an uplifting end to a tense international standoff surrounding the U.S. extradition case against Huawei executive Meng Wanzhou.

Just as Spavor and Kovrig took off for Canada late Friday, Meng was

COVID-19 is also less likely to infect others. But vaccination isn't the only tool available to help stop the spread, Wong said. Saskatchewan residents can wear masks indoors — as mandated by the province — but they can also avoid large gatherings.

"Honestly, some people will listen to this and just roll their eyes and think again that I'm just fear-mongering or whatever," he said. "But it is so hard right now, what it is that we're dealing with in our hospitals, in our ICUs."

But vaccination isn't the only tool available to help stop the spread, Wong said. Saskatchewan residents can wear masks indoors — as mandated by the province — but they can also avoid large gatherings.

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Wong's plea comes as the fourth wave of COVID-19 has plunged the province into the worst stage of the pandemic so far, despite the adoption of vaccines.

Multiple COVID-19 records have been broken in the past week, including

the number of new cases, number of active cases, hospitalizations, patients in the province's intensive care units and deaths.

Rising ICU numbers have resulted in the slowing down or pausing of non-critical and elective services, while Saskatchewan's organ donation program has been halted as the province's health services shift to focus on COVID-19 efforts.


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Liberal Rechie Valdez Wins Mississauga-Streetsville Riding; Makes History in the Fil-Can Community

In the 44th Canadian federal election held on September 20, 2021, Filipino Canadians welcome a historical development in parliamentary politics. Filipino Canadian Rechie Valdez wins the electoral riding in Mississauga- Streetsville in Ontario. R. Valdez wins the seat for the Liberal Party of Canada (LPC). With her victory, she becomes the First Filipina and the Second Filipino Canadian to become a Member of Parliament at the House of Commons, after the final term of Liberal MP for Winnipeg North (Dr.) Rey Pagtakhan in 2004.

Political newcomer Rechie Valdez won her Member of Parliament seat against four opponents from the other political parties. Rechie garnered 24,054 votes, more than 6,875 against

her nearest Conservative rival.

During the snap parliamentary pandemic election, seven Filipino Canadians ran for Member of Parliament seats across the country, the largest number of Filipino candidates to date. Of the seven brave candidates, six Filipino Canadians did not make it. Among the unsuccessful candidates for Member of Parliament were Liberals Elizabeth Quinto of Oxford County, ON., Virginia Bremner of Vancouver-Kingsway, B.C., Paul Ong of Winnipeg, MB., New Democrats Naden Abenes of Vancouver-Quadra, B.C., Elaine Perez of Lethbridge, AB., and Green Party's Phil D Luna of Toronto-St. Paul's, ON.

The Liberals, led by Justin Trudeau, are returning to power in Ottawa with a minority government.

Unofficially, the election results showed the Liberals are winning 158 seats, the Conservatives picking up 119 seats, the Bloc Quebecois with 34 seats, the New Democrats counted 25 winners, and the Green Party with 2 seats. A party needs to win 170 of the 338 ridings to form a majority government. With this outcome, Canadians have decided to "stay the course", that is minority government as in 2019.

Under a Liberal government, with R. Valdez's win, many Filipinos are hoping and expecting that the Filipina legislator will represent and articulate the voice of her many compatriots in the Canadian Parliament. Albeit, not a "big deal", observers believe that her winning is a big step forward for Filipinos anew "to be at the table" in the realm of Canadian politics.

Conservative Leader Erin O'Toole has missed his chance to unseat a prime minister who has faced his fair share of challenges during six

Whenever that day comes, I will be ready to lead Canada's Conservatives.

"We worked hard, we made progress, but the job is not done yet." O'Toole reaffirmed his commitment to take the party to the centre of the political spectrum even as it faces challenges on its right flank from the People's Party of Canada (PPC).

"We must continue this journey

Liberal government will have to depend on at least one opposition party to help it pass its legislation.

Like O'Toole, Singh signalled he has no intention of stepping down as leader despite an underwhelming performance.

"Friends, I want you to know that our fight will continue. I also want you to know that we are going to keep on fighting to make sure that the super wealthy pay their fair share," Singh said in his concession speech, referring to his signature election promise to make the "ultra rich" pay much more in taxes to help cover the cost of new social programs.

"To all of your struggling, we see you, we hear you," Singh said. Greens' Paul loses but May poised for re-election

The Green vote collapsed and the party's leader, Annamie Paul, finished a disappointing fourth in her Toronto Centre riding. For months, the party has been beset with internal squabbling and that hampered its electoral efforts.

But in the southwestern

Ontario riding of Kitchener Centre, where the Liberal candidate dropped out amid allegations of harassment, Green candidate Mike Morrice was elected. The party's former leader, Elizabeth May, was also re-elected in her B.C. riding of Saanich—Gulf Islands.

Speaking to reporters in Toronto, Paul said she was disappointed to finish so poorly.

"It is hard to lose. No one likes to lose but I'm so proud of the effort," she said.

With nearly 16 million votes counted so far, the Conservatives have about 34 per cent of the ballots cast, the Liberals have 32 per cent and the NDP nearly 18 per cent. The Green Party captured 2.3 per cent of the ballots cast, while the PPC has more than five per cent — a much better result than the 1.6 per cent of the national vote it fetched in the 2019 election.

PPC Leader Maxime Bernier — a libertarian who has long railed

years in office. O'Toole ran on a plan to boost health care spending, shrink the deficit over 10 years and tighten ethics rules for politicians — a more moderate take on conservatism that ultimately fell short.

The Conservatives are on track to win in 119 ridings — two fewer seats than the party won under former Conservative leader Andrew Scheer.

Speaking to supporters in Oshawa, Ont., O'Toole said he had no plans to resign even though his party saw little if any growth in its vote share and seat count. He vowed to stay at the helm to take another swing at defeating Trudeau in the next election, which could come as soon as 2023.

"My family and I are resolute in continuing this journey for Canada," O'Toole said. "If Justin Trudeau thinks he can threaten Canadians with another election in 18 months, the Conservative Party will be ready.

With Trudeau and the Liberals committed to progressive policies such as child care and new housing supports, NDP Leader Jagmeet Singh ran even further to the left, promising a dramatic expansion of the federal government through \$200 billion in new spending commitments for promises such as national pharmacare.

Singh vows to continue fight to make 'super wealthy' pay fair share But Singh was criticized for putting out a platform with few details on how any of this transformative change would be implemented.

When all the ballots are counted, it could prove to be a disappointing night for Singh, with the NDP expected to pick up only one more seat than it won in 2019. Singh may have more clout in Parliament to look forward to, however — a minority

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Simple Chicken and Tomatoes Skillet with Garlic and Capers



INGREDIENTS

- 1 1/4 pounds boneless skinless chicken breasts (about 4 small or 3 medium breasts)
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt divided
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper divided
- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil divided
- 1/2 medium red onion diced (about 1 cup)
- 1 tablespoon minced garlic about 3 cloves
- 4 cups grape tomatoes or other assorted tomatoes, or diced plum tomatoes, halved
- 1/4 cup drained capers
- 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 1 teaspoon honey
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley

INSTRUCTIONS

1) lightly pound the chicken breasts to an even thickness. Sprinkle with 3/4 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. In a large, heavy-bottomed skillet, heat 1 tablespoon olive oil over medium high. Once hot, add the chicken breasts, top-side down, and let cook undisturbed for 4 minutes, until lightly browned. Flip and cook an additional 4 minutes. Turn again and continue cooking 3 to 5 additional minutes, flipping every few minutes, until the chicken is cooked through and reaches an internal temperature of 165 degrees F. The total

cooking time will vary depending upon the thickness of your chicken. Remove to a plate and cover to keep warm.

2) Without wiping the pan, reduce the skillet heat to medium. Add the remaining tablespoon olive oil, swirl to coat the pan, then add the red onion and let cook until slightly softened, about 3 minutes, scraping the browned bits off the bottom of the pan as it cooks. Add the garlic and let cook 30 seconds until fragrant, then add the tomatoes, capers, red wine vinegar, honey, and remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon black pepper. Let cook until the tomatoes begin to soften, about 2 minutes. Return the chicken to the pan. Sprinkle with fresh parsley and serve.

Pork Chops with Creamy Mushroom sauce



INGREDIENTS

- 4 pork chops, bone in or boneless (about 1-inch thick)
 - 1 teaspoon Seasoning salt (adjust to your taste)
 - 1/3 teaspoon cracked black pepper
 - 2 tablespoons olive oil
 - 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- Creamy Mushroom Sauce:**
- 1 cup sliced brown mushrooms
 - 2 tablespoons fresh chopped parsley, divided
 - 1 tablespoon fresh chopped thyme
 - 4 cloves garlic crushed
 - 3/4 cup reduced fat cream or half and half, (heavy cream or evaporated milk)

INSTRUCTIONS
Season chops with seasoning salt and pepper. Heat oil and butter in

a frying pan or skillet over medium-high until butter is melted.


When pan is hot, sear chops for about 3-4 minutes per side until golden browned and the centre is no longer bright pink (fry in batches if you need to). Transfer to a warm plate. Set aside.

Add the mushrooms to the buttery juices in the pan and cook for 3-4 minutes over medium heat. Scrape up any bits left over from the chops. When mushrooms are browned, add half parsley, half thyme and all of the crushed garlic; sauté for 30 seconds until fragrant.

Pour in the cream and bring to a gentle simmer for 3-4 minutes until slightly thickened. Season with salt and pepper, to your taste.

Add the chops back into the sauce, allow to simmer for a minute to heat through. Garnish with remaining herbs and serve immediately.

Stir-fried steak and veggies



INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch, divided
- 2 tablespoons plus 1/2 cup water, divided
- 1 pound boneless beef top round steak, cut into thin 2-inch strips
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 2 tablespoons canola oil, divided
- 4 cups fresh broccoli florets
- 1 small onion, cut into thin wedges
- Hot cooked rice

INSTRUCTIONS

Mix garlic powder and 2 tablespoons each cornstarch and water; toss with beef. In a small bowl, mix soy sauce, brown sugar, ginger and the remaining cornstarch and water until smooth.

In a large skillet, heat 1 tablespoon oil over medium-high heat; stir-fry beef until browned, 2-3 minutes. Remove from pan.

In same pan, stir-fry broccoli and onion in remaining oil over medium-high heat until crisp-tender, 4-5 minutes. Stir soy sauce mixture; add to pan. Cook and stir until thickened, 1-2 minutes. Return beef to pan; heat through. Serve with rice.

Wild Mushroom Chowder with Bacon and Leeks



INGREDIENTS:

- 4-6 Strips of thick bacon, sliced into 1/4 inch strips
- 2 tbsp Butter
- 1 cup Leeks, white and light green parts, thinly sliced
- 1/2 cup Celery, finely chopped
- 8 oz Chanterelles (or other mushrooms) roughly chopped
- 1 tsp Fresh thyme
- 1 Bay leaf
- 1 tbsp Flour (optional)
- 3/4 cup Dry white wine
- 4 cups Chicken stock
- 1 tsp Sea salt
- 1/4 tsp Freshly ground black pepper
- 1/4 tsp Nutmeg
- 1/4 tsp Cayenne pepper
- 1 lb Baby yukon gold potatoes, cut in half
- 1 cup Cream
- 1 tbsp Raw honey
- 1 tbsp Fresh squeezed lemon juice

INSTRUCTIONS

In a large, dutch oven or soup pot, over medium heat, fry the bacon pieces until slightly crispy. Add the butter, leeks and celery. Sauté the leek mixture for 5-7 minutes until the leeks and celery begin to soften.

Turn the heat to medium-high and add the chanterelles, thyme and bay leaf. Sauté for 3-5 minutes, until the mushrooms are soft.

Add the flour and stir to incorporate.

Slowly pouring the white wine in, scraping the bottom of the pot. Allow to simmer for 3-5 minutes until the wine reduces by half.

Add the chicken stock, potatoes, salt, pepper, nutmeg and cayenne. Bring to a boil. As soon as the stock begins to boil, turn heat back down and simmer for 15 minutes until the potatoes are tender.

Add the cream and raw honey. Heat through.

Finish with a squeeze of lemon juice and serve with freshly ground pepper and fresh herbs.

3-ingredient Strawberry Icebox Cake



INGREDIENTS (for 9 servings)

- 5 cups sweetened whipped cream (300 g)
- 11 large rectangular graham crackers
- 3 cups strawberry (450 g), chopped

INSTRUCTIONS:

Spread a thin layer of whipped cream in a square glass baking dish. Layer graham crackers on top, then cover with a layer of whipped cream. Sprinkle 1/3 of the strawberries on top, then layer with cream again. Repeat steps 2 and 3 until no more ingredients remain. (The top layer should be strawberries and should not be covered with cream.)

Refrigerate for at least 3 hours.

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

improved showing failed to produce any seats in Canada's first-past-the-post electoral system. Bernier finished a distant second in his riding of Beauce, which was easily won by the Conservative incumbent, Richard Lehoux.

"This is not just a political party. This is a movement. It is an ideological revolution that we are starting now," Bernier told supporters in Saskatoon.

The Liberals owe their re-election to strong performances in the country's two most populous provinces, Ontario and Quebec.

Toronto and its surrounding suburbs — colloquially known as "the 905" after its area code — proved to be a resilient Liberal fortress; the Conservatives failed to make any significant gains among GTA voters. Only one of the area's many seats, Thornhill, elected a Conservative MP. However, with votes still left to be

counted, Liberal cabinet minister Deb Schulte is also in a tough fight in her riding of King-Vaughan. Bloc looks to pick up two seats in Quebec

In Quebec, where the separatist Bloc Québécois is poised to pick up two more than the 32 seats it held in the last Parliament, the Liberal brand also performed well — although the Liberals were hoping for more gains there to vault it into majority government territory.

Conservative candidates have been declared elected in seven of the region's ridings. Conservative Rick Perkins has unseated Liberal incumbent Bernadette Jordan in the Nova Scotia riding of South Shore-St Margarets.

the Conservative brand took a hit in that province. Liberal candidate George Chahal beat the Conservative incumbent in Calgary Skyview and Edmonton Centre was also on track to go red, but the margin is so thin that the race is still too close to call.

Canada, China trade barbs at UN General Assembly over 2 Michaels, Meng Wanzhou

Canada and China were involved in a war of words at the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) on Monday over the detention of their citizens who were released over the weekend in an apparent prisoner swap.

Speaking on the closing day of the 76th session of the UNGA in New York, Canada's Foreign Affairs Minister Marc Garneau thanked international allies for their support in the case of Canadians Michael Kovrig and Michael Spavor, who returned to Canada after nearly three years in Chinese detention.

The announcement of their release by Prime Minister Justin Trudeau on Friday night came hours after a deferred prosecution agreement in the case of Huawei executive Meng Wanzhou, who was accused of committing fraud in order to circumvent

U.S. sanctions against Iran.

On Friday, a B.C. Supreme

Court judge withdrew the U.S. extradition charge against her, allowing

her to return home to China.

Garneau told the UNGA that Canada applied both Canadian and international law in response to the U.S. request for extradition of Meng, and that the "two Michaels," as they are known, paid a "heavy price" for Canada's commitment to the rule of law.

"We continue to oppose the way these two citizens were treated," Garneau said, adding that Canada "will never forget this experience."

China has long maintained that there is no connection between Meng's case and that of Spavor and Kovrig, who were arrested over espionage charges just days after the Huawei executive's apprehension.

Manila mayor announces bid for president of the Philippines

Isko Moreno takes aim at President Duterte for his 'failures' in responding to the COVID-19 pandemic and alleged corruption.

The mayor of Manila has launched his bid for the presidency of the Philippines, promising to fight poverty and taking aim at his former ally, President Rodrigo Duterte, for his alleged failures in the COVID-19 pandemic and corruption.

The election is due to take place in May 2022 and Duterte is barred from running for a second term.

Instead of flattening the curve we have flattened the economy, yet many people continue to flatline in our hospitals," Isko Moreno said on Wednesday, speaking from a new housing development in the Manila slums of Tondo, where he grew up and worked as a rubbish collector before he became an actor.

Moreno was born Francisco Domagoso, but he is more popularly known by his screen name.

He is the third high-profile politician and former ally of Duterte to declare a presidential bid. In recent days international boxing champion, Senator Manny Pacquiao, and Senator Panfilo Lacson also confirmed they would run.

Moreno has been performing strongly in recent opinion polls. In a Pulse Asia survey released in July, he was the second choice to become the country's next leader, behind Duterte's daughter, Davao City Mayor Sara Duterte-Carpio.

While Duterte himself cannot run for the presidency again, he has accepted his party's nomination to run for vice president – an unprecedented political move in the Philippines.

Duterte-Carpio had earlier said she was not running for president, citing her own father's unconventional bid for vice president. But she continues to travel around the country, meeting regional and provincial political powerbrokers, which has only fuelled

with Duterte and his allies.

When he failed in his bid for a Senate seat, Duterte made him chairman of the board of the North Luzon Railways Corporation and later a senior social welfare official.

As mayor of Manila, Moreno has earned praise for cleaning up the Philippine capital and building new housing for many poor settlers. But he has also been criticised for his silence on Duterte's deadly war on drugs in which thousands have been killed, including many drug suspects in the slums of Manila.

Moreno has become more critical of Duterte and his government in the last year amid the worsening pandemic, prompting Duterte to mock Moreno's life as an actor. He also withheld the mayor's power to distribute aid to those under the pandemic lockdown.

On Wednesday, he appealed for the support of the Filipino public, invoking his background as a former rubbish collector while alluding to the president's crude public pronouncements.

"It is not a crime to wear threadbare clothes because of poverty. What is wrong is to praise an emperor's clothes when in fact he is wearing none," he said in a mix of Tagalog and English.

"Yes, I grew up being poor. But I have never been bad-mannered. Although I've lived in the trash, not once did I become foul-mouthed," he said, while taking a swipe at the alleged corruption in the Duterte administration's purchase of medical equipment during the pandemic.

Moreno picked Dr Willie Ong, a physician and failed senatorial candidate, as his running mate.

Before his announcement on Wednesday, Moreno acknowledged that he was also in talks with Senator Pacquiao and Vice President Leni Robredo to forge a possible coalition.

News on Sunday, Garneau said the federal government's "eyes are wide open" when it comes to China.

"It's a spectacular policy about (the Chinese government)," Garneau told Mercedes Stephenson in an episode of Global News. He added that the arbitrary detention of "two Michaels" stopped relations between Canada and China.

But relations with China are constantly evolving, Garneau said, and said the two would still "coexist."

"We compete. We work in areas that require cooperation, such as climate change, and challenge China where appropriate, whether human rights or arbitrary detention," he said

UNGA, a representative for China's UN mission, speaking shortly after Garneau's address, said Meng's case is "completely different" to the Canadian men.

He accused the U.S. and Canada of arbitrarily detaining Meng, categorizing it as a "complete political incident and frame-up."

"We hope that Canada can face up to the facts squarely, correct their mistakes and draw lessons from what happened so that they could not make further mistakes," the Chinese diplomat added.
